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Today ~ We'll Wrap Up ~ Our Review Of James.

James 3:1-12.

The power of the tongue ~ and its control.

Controlled tongue ~ is powerful influence for good, ~ out of proportion to its size.

- ▶▶Just as the bit determines ~ the direction of the horse ~ and the rudder the ship, ~ 77
 - >> so the tongue ~ can determine ~ the destiny ~ of the individual.
- ▶▶When the believer exercises careful control of the tongue, ~ it can be presumed ~ 77
 - $\triangleright \triangleright$ that they also are able ~ 77
 - → to direct ~ their whole life ~ in its proper, ~ divinely charted ~ course.
- ▶▶But when that tongue is not restrained, ~ small though it is, ~ 77
 - $\triangleright \triangleright$ the whole life ~ is likely to be ~ uncontrolled and undisciplined also.

Showed us the destructiveness ~ of an uncontrolled tongue.

▶▶Used image of a forest fire \sim to show what \sim an uncontrolled tongue can wreak in a believer's life. 1/11

▶▶What was on James' mind ~ was the ~ spreading of sin ~ from our speech ~ to the rest of our life. ▶▶If we do not discipline and purify our speech, ~ we will not discipline or purify ~ the rest of our life. Also showed us ~ the untamable nature ~ of the tongue. ▶▶Here James was indicating ~ that we need to look ~ outside humanity ~ for help in taming the tongue. >> While no human being can subdue their speech, ~ God, ~ and only God, ~ can help us control it. ▶► And there's excellent news. $\triangleright \triangleright God$ will help us subdue our tongues. And then showed us, ~ the inconsistency ~ of the tongue. ▶▶From the same mouth ~ come blessing and cursing, ~ James says. ▶▶This fact, ~ coupled with the fact ~ that we cannot tame our tongues, ~ emphasizes ~ our need for the Lord's help ~ in the matter of our speech habits. ▶▶We are ~ terribly inconsistent. ▶ But the good news is ~ our God, ~ the true and only God, ~ is not inconsistent in any ~ way ~ shape, ~ or form. \blacktriangleright And we can trust him always \sim to help us speak \sim in a godly manner. 2/11

godly wisdom. 3/11

Godly vs. Worldly wisdom.
▶▶James began with a question.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ Who among you ~ claims ~ to possess godly wisdom, ~ which is, ~ by its nature ~ absolutely true ~ and superior to all other wisdoms?
►►A challenge.
\triangleright Those who claim to possess godly wisdom ~ must prove it ~~ by living an honorable life, ~~ which is characterized by ~ doing good works ~ that are coupled with the humility ~ that comes ~ from godly wisdom.
▶▶Then describes \sim 2 characteristics, \sim the source, \sim the distinctive nature, \sim and \sim the fruit \sim of worldly wisdom.
⊳⊳Bitter jealousy and selfish ambition.
⊳⊳Earthly realm.
>>Earthly, ~ unspiritual, ~ demonic ~ is its distinctive nature.
▷▷Disorder and every vile practice ~ is its fruit.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ And as we summarized, \sim worldly wisdom is a sin-tainted, \sim flawed, \sim and inferior \sim type of wisdom, \sim which is in direct opp. to God.

 $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright$ Then follows up w/ description of the attributes & fruit ~ of the believer ~ who possess

>>Pure, ~ peace loving, ~ open to reason, ~ impartial, ~ and sincere. >> An attitude that is ~ reasonable, ~ fair-minded, ~ charitable, ~ non-combative, ~ and ~ that does not seek to retaliate. >> An attitude of compassion ~ toward those in distress ~ that leads to practical help. ▶▶James ended this paragraph ~ by stating ~ that the believer operating through godly wisdom ~ is a peacemaker ~~ who leaves behind a legacy ~ of righteous behavior and influence. James 4:1-3. Conflict in the Congregation. ▶▶Here James asks, ~~ what causes quarrels and what causes fights among believers? >>Our sinful, self-centered desires ~ which wage war ~ within us. ▶▶And James showed us that ~ unchecked ~ sinful, self-centered desires at war within ~ cause war without. >>TPID, ~ the battle within ~ if left to fester, ~ does not stay within. >>It manifests itself outwardly ~ in ugly ways.

→ Ugly ways ~ that can wreak havoc ~ w/in a church.

<u>James 4:4-6.</u>

▶▶This is a warning to all believers ~ who seek to embrace ~ both God & the world. >> By seeking friendship with the world we are, ~ in effect, ~ committing spiritual adultery. ▶▶Why it's sp. adultery. ⇒⇒ James said ~ being friends with the world ~ is the same ~ as hating God. ▶▶Follows with a reminder ~ of God's intense desire ~ that his people ~ be wholly and unreservedly ~ his. ▶ Ends with ~ an explicit offer of grace ~ to those who ~ reject friendship with the world and humbly submit to God. $\triangleright \triangleright$ Sp. ~ enabling grace. \rightarrow I.e., ~ the strength from God ~ to reject friendship with the world ~ and ~ to humbly submit to him. James 4:7-10. Submission to God. ▶ Exhorts us to submit to God. ▶▶Then gives series of rapid-fire impvs. ~ that spell out ~ what submission to God entails.

>> These are required ~ as a necessary accompaniment ~ to a claim of submission to him.

 \rightarrow IOW, ~ this is what submission to God looks like ~ in real life. 5/11

>>Resisting the devil ~ is a sign ~ of true submission to God. >> Also, ~ a commitment to ~ habitual, ~ heartfelt, ~ God-honoring prayer. >>Next, ~ getting rid of all sinful habits ~ and living godly lives ~ accompanies true submission to God. >> Additionally, ~ a single-minded commitment to God ~ is a sign ~ of true submission to him. $\triangleright \triangleright And$, ~ genuine repentance. ⇒⇒ Basically, ~ genuine repentance is ~ a change of mind ~ leading to a change of action. ⇒ It involves ~ a sincere turning from sin to serve God. → And it includes ~ sorrow for, and confession of, ~ sin ~~ and where possible ~ restitution. ▶▶James' point being here, ~ genuine repentance ~ is an indication ~ that one's claim of being totally submitted to God ~ is valid. James 4:11-12. Here James pointed out the seriousness ~ of chronic harsh criticism ~ and also ~ of judgementalism.

▶▶It's not ~ just simply ~ having a chronically negative attitude toward other believers, ~

which stops there. 6/11

$\triangleright \triangleright$ James clearly showed us that \sim it involves much \sim more serious repercussions.
▶▶The excuse ~ "As long as it doesn't hurt anybody it's fine," ~ is a denial ~ that there are negative consequences to sin.
⊳⊳That excuse ~ is bogus.
>>There are always repercussions to sin.
→→Minor, major.
▶▶In these 2 vv, ~~ James showed us that ~ having a chronically negative attitude toward other believers ~ carries ~ majorly serious repercussions.
<u>James 4:13-17.</u>
Making plans.
▶▶James used the example \sim of a self-confident declaration by businessmen, \sim who make their plans \sim without consulting God.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ Recognizably, ~ this applies to all believers ~~ who boastfully declare plans of any kind ~ for the future or otherwise, ~ w/out consulting God.
►►Making plans without consulting God ~ is misplaced ~ for 2 reasons.
$ ho ho 1^{ m st}$, ~ we don't know ~ what will happen even tomorrow, ~ let alone for a whole year.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ And 2 nd , ~ the uncertainty & brevity of life.
\rightarrow What is sure about life, ~ according to James, ~ is its ~ uncertainty. 7/11

▶▶James then gave us ~ the proper perspective that we are to have.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ If the Lord wants us to, ~ we will live ~ and do this or that.
▶▶Go ahead and plan, ~ James says.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ But leave room for the Master Planner to carry out ~ not our will ~ but his.
<u>James 5:1-6.</u>
Judgment upon wealthy unbelievers.
▶▶Speaking to people ~ who were not present, ~ for the benefit ~ of those who were.
▶▶James' primary purpose in this \P was ~~ to instill correct thinking & right behavior in us ~ regarding wealthy unbelievers.
▶▶A secondary purpose ~ is to encourage & comfort us.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ This, ~ of course, ~ lines up with the specific purpose of the OT prophets.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ In this \P , ~ James assures us ~ that if they don't repent ~ wealthy unbelievers, ~ as well as all unbelievers, ~ will face God's judgment.
>> They seem to get away with all sorts of bad stuff.
⇒⇒But they will be held accountable.
$ ightarrow$ How encouraging and comforting \sim knowing that any wrongs against us will be avenged. 8/11

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ But we should not gloat. → Weep for them. → And pray they turn to Jesus before it's too late. ▶▶Noted a couple implications from this passage as well. $\triangleright \triangleright 1^{st}$, ~ it could very well be that James is implying that we should not envy the wealthy. >> And 2nd, implies we're not to avenge ourselves on our enemies. → Because James makes it clear that God will judge. James 5:7-12 James counsels believers, ~ on how we are to behave when undergoing persecution by unbelievers. ▶▶Advised believers ~ to exercise patience ~ in view of Christ's return. ▶▶He counseled us ~ to avoid the natural tendency of the afflicted ~ to unjustly blame those around us. ▶▶James advised us ~ to look at 2 godly examples ~ of suffering and endurance in the past. $\triangleright \triangleright$ And i.e., ~ with the purpose ~ of gaining strength in present circumstances. ▶▶And finally, ~~ he counseled us ~~ to refrain from deceptive oaths ~~ and ~ to maintain integrity in speech ~ while experiencing hostility. 9/11

James 5:13-18.
Instructions on Prayer.
▶▶James began ~ by commanding prayer ~ for a variety of possible situations.
⊳⊳Suffering, ~ rejoicing, ~ & sickness, ~ vv 13-14a.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ 3 rapid-fire ques. ~ each one followed ~ by a command.
→→Proper course of action.
▶▶Next, ~ James provided more extended instructions concerning the procedure elders are to follow.
⊳⊳Prayer & anointing w/ oil.
$ ightharpoonup$ James encouraged believers to \sim confess their sins to one another and pray for each other.
>>Trusted, ~ spiritually mature ~ believers.
>>Confession then prayer.
▶▶Then tells us ~ the prayer of a righteous person ~ is very powerful ~ in its effect.
>>Understood here but not stated.
→Not the prayer ~ but God. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ Powerful in its effect ~ because God is the One who is answering. 10/11

►►And James shows Elijah as illustrative proof ~ that ~ the prayer of a righteous person ~ is very powerful ~ in its effect.
Finally, ~ James 5:19-20.
Restoring a wayward believer.
▶▶James did not ~ directly exhort us ~~ to seek out and bring back a wayward believer.
▶▶Rather, ~~ he motivates us by giving us ~~ the incentive ~ for doing so.
⊳⊳And i.e., ~ the results ~ of such a mission.
▶▶Namely, ~ if effective, ~~ it will achieve 2 things.
$ ho ho 1^{s\dagger}$, ~ it will ~ save the erring brother/sister from death.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ And 2 nd , ~ it will bring about ~ the forgiveness ~ of many sins.
▶▶This ~ is a statement ~ of assurance.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ That is to say, ~~ we can be sure ~ of these results ~ when a wandering believer ~ turns back to G od.
>>This is great encouragement. ~~~ And we need to tell them. ~~~ They can be restored!
►►As noted, ~ not direct exhortation.

 \triangleright But James does imply ~ that we have a responsibility ~ to do what we can ~~ to restore ~ an erring believer to fellowship. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ & Not let slip through cracks. 11/11
