John approached Jesus' incarnation ~ from a ~ theological standpoint.

ightharpoonup As noted,  $\sim$  he wrote  $\sim$  a doctrinal essay,  $\sim$  setting down  $\sim$  crucial theological truths  $\sim$  about Jesus and his 1<sup>st</sup> advent.

➤ We asserted that ~~ if we are to understand and celebrate Christmas ~ in its fullest meaning, ~~ we must not neglect the truths ~ which John's prologue ~ contains.

ightharpoonup As we saw,  $\sim$  John focused on  $\sim$  amazing,  $\sim$  deep,  $\sim$  theological truths  $\sim$  that enhance  $\sim$  our understanding and celebration  $\sim$  of Jesus' 1<sup>st</sup> advent.

>Additionally, ~~ these truths will boost ~ our understanding & praise ~ of our Savior.

Matthew & Luke,  $\sim$  on the other hand,  $\sim$  approached Jesus' incarnation  $\sim$  by reporting on the events surrounding Jesus' birth and his birth itself.

ightharpoonup In literary terms,  $\sim$  we could say that  $\sim$  they focused on  $\sim$  writing a report  $\sim$  regarding the  $1^{\text{st}}$  advent of Jesus.

➤ Last wk, ~ John's Christmas essay, ~~ today, ~ dip into Luke's report . . . .

⊳Lk. 2: ~ 1-20.

## <u>In ~ 2: ~ 1-5; ~~ Luke reports on the historical circumstances.</u>

In these vv,  $\sim$  Lk.  $\sim$  anchors his report  $\sim$  in reality. 1/13

- ➤ He's showing us ~ the historical roots ~ of the Christian faith.
- ➤ The roots of our faith ~ are totally unlike ~ the appearance of the other "gods" of false religions, ~~ whose appearance ~ was couched in ~ "once upon a time" terms.
- ➤No, ~ the coming of Jesus was ~ a real event ~ in real time ~ on a real day.

Jesus was born in a real town, ~ Bethlehem.

- It happened ~~ not in Narnia. ⇒ Not ~ in Middle Earth. ⇒ Not ~ in a galaxy far, far away.
- >No, ~ the coming of Jesus was ~ a real event ~ in real time ~ on a real day ~ in a real town.
  - Description Micah 5:2, ~~ But you, O Bethlehem Ephrathah, ~~ who are too little to be among the clans of Judah, ~~ from you ~ shall come forth for me ~ one who is to be ruler in Israel, ~~ whose coming forth ~ is from of old, ~ from ancient days.
- ➤If Luke was not writing a historical account, ~ he could easily be refuted ~ by the people of his day.
  - $\triangleright$  And he could also be easily refuted  $\sim$  by other historians down through the centuries.
- ➤ This is not ~ fantasy land literature. 
  ¬ This is ~ historically verifiable reporting.

And consider this re: Luke's historical acct.  $\Rightarrow$  On the surface,  $\sim$  Caesar called the shots.

- >And his imperial order ~ led Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem, ~~ where Jesus finds his first home ~ in an animal's feeding trough.
  - $\triangleright$  But all the while, ~ we know that it was God ~ directing the action ~ from behind the scenes.  $\Rightarrow$  Account much like ~ Esther. 2/13

 $\gt$ 50,  $\sim$  the historical description in this passage  $\sim$  is to be understood  $\sim$  not simply as  $\sim$  an accidental quirk.

DBut rather ~ it is to be understood ~ the following way.

 $\Rightarrow$ Luke shows us how God,  $\sim$  who rules over nations,  $\sim$  directed Caesar Augustus  $\sim$  to issue the census decree.

⇒This divine direction ~ was in order ~ to bring about the fulfillment ~ of what God had decreed ~ centuries earlier.

→That the seed of the woman would come ~ and crush the serpent's head.

 $\rightrightarrows$ Thus in God's providence  $\sim$  while J. & M. were in Bethlehem  $\sim$  the Savior was born.

## <u>In ~ 2: ~ 6-7, ~~ Luke reports ~ on the birth of Jesus.</u>

NIV, While they were there, ~ the time came for the baby to be born, ~ and she gave birth to her firstborn, ~ a son. ~~ She wrapped him in cloths and placed him in a manger, ~~ because there was no guest room available for them.

## Tech note.

▶Inn ~ is better translated ~ guest room in a private home. ~ NIV

The home, ~ probably belonging to a relative, ~ where Mary and Joseph would have stayed, ~ was full.

>So, ~ they sought refuge & privacy in an animal room adjacent to the home.

 $\triangleright$  This would be analogous  $\sim$  to an attached garage. 3/13

- >Or, ~ they sought refuge & privacy ~ in a nearby cave ~ used for housing animals.

  >In either case, ~ the idea ~ of the holy family being turned away from an inn ~ so Jesus
- With a surprising reserve and simplicity, ~ Luke described the birth of Jesus.
  - >And she gave birth to her firstborn son.
  - ➤ Many Christmas celebrations ~ miss ~ the enormity of Christ's birth.
  - ➤ This was not just ~ another baby ~ or ~ another birthday.

would be born in a stable ~ is probably ~ not quite accurate.

- >God was born ~ in human likeness. ⇒ And the Word was made flesh ~ and dwelt among us.
- ➤ The Divine ~ took upon himself ~ the limitations ~ of humanity.
- ightharpoonup As Paul wrote,  $\sim$  Jesus made himself nothing  $\sim$  by taking the very nature of a servant,  $\sim$  being made  $\sim$  in human likeness.
- In all likelihood, ~ the manger Jesus was placed in ~ was an animal's ~ feeding trough.
  - ➤ The contrast between ~ the birth's commonness ~ and the child's greatness ~ could not be greater.
  - ➤ The promised one of God ~ enters creation ~ among the creation.
  - ➤ The secular decree of a census ~ had yielded ~ a divine event.
  - ➤ A manger ~ was the Messiah's ~ 1st throne room. ⇒ But not his last. 4/13


## In ~ 2: ~ 8-14, ~~ Luke reports ~ on the visitation of the Angels to the Shepherds.

From the manger, ~ Luke moved ~ to the fields outside the village.

Vs 8 (CSB),  $\sim$  In the same region,  $\sim$  shepherds were  $\sim$  staying out in the fields  $\sim$  and keeping watch at night over their flock.

- >Among the occupations, ~ shepherding ~ had a lowly place.
  - >They were ~ outcasts, ~ not allowed in the city, ~ and not trusted by the general public.
- Luke gave this story about the shepherds for a reason.
- >Jesus would come, ~ not ~ to the proud and powerful.
  - $\triangleright$ No, ~ he came to ~ the outcasts, ~ the humble, ~ those considered last ~ on the social lists.
- ightharpoonup To these men  $\sim$  God brought  $\sim$  the first news  $\sim$  of his Son's arrival.
- ➤ The significance of this ~ should not be lost here.
  - $\triangleright$ Luke shows here  $\sim$  God's concern for people  $\sim$  regardless  $\sim$  of their social status or vocation.

As these shepherds were living in the fields under the sky,  $\sim$  suddenly  $\sim$  a bright light broke through the darkness. 5/13



➤This news of great joy ~ is for the benefit of ~ all the people, ~ the angel said.
>Not universal salvation.
>Salvation is universal ~ in offer.
$\rightrightarrows$ Jn. 3:16 (NIV), ~~ For God so loved the world ~ that he gave ~ his one and only Son ~~ that whoever believes in him ~ shall not perish ~ but have eternal life.
→For all people, ~ but not all people ~ will accept it.
In vs 11, $\sim$ the angel expressed $\sim$ both $\sim$ the content of the good news $\sim$ and $\sim$ the reason for great joy.
For unto you ~ is born this day in the city of David ~ a Savior, ~~ who is Christ the Lord.
➤No newspaper ~ ever carried headlines ~ more significant than this.
>No more important event ~ was ever announced.
➤Note the 3 titles ~ given the newborn babe.
$\triangleright$ The 1 <sup>st</sup> title is ~ Savior.
⇒That is why ~ he was called Jesus, ~ which means Savior.
⇒Appropriately ~ this is his ~ primary designation.
$\rightarrow$ For the main purpose $\sim$ of Jesus' appearance on earth $\sim$ was the salvation of humankind. $7/13$

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>The 2<sup>nd</sup> title is ~ Christ.
        ⇒The Greek ~ Χριστὸς ~ is equivalent to the Hebrew wd for ~ Messiah.
        ⇒Both mean ~ the anointed one.
        ⇒Jesus came ~ as the Messiah ~ who was predicted and promised ~ in the OT.
           → He was the fulfillment ~ of the Messianic hopes of the centuries.
    \triangleright The 3<sup>rd</sup> title is ~ Lord.

    The word ~ Lord ~ refers here to deity.

        ⇒That this tiny baby was the "Lord" ~ means ~ that God had arrived ~ in human form.

⇒ Thus ~ the angel gave no doubt ~ as to the identity ~ of this child.

The angel completed his message ~ by giving the shepherds ~ a sign.
 ▶ Vs 12, ~~ And this will be a sign for you: ~~ you will find a baby ~ wrapped in swaddling
 cloths ~ and lying in a manger.
 This would help them ~ recognize the right baby.
    DBut ~ it would also ~ demonstrate the truth ~ of the angel's words.
 ➤In Bethlehem that night ~ there might be 1 or 2 babies wrapped in swaddling cloths.
    >But surely ~ there would be only one ~ lying in a manger. 8/13
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➤ This shows the extent ~ to which the Creator of the universe went ~ to save us from our sins.

The angel was then joined ~ by a great company of other angels ~ engaged in praising God.

Vv 13-14,  $\sim$  And suddenly there was with the angel  $\sim$  a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying,  $\sim$  "Glory to God in the highest,  $\sim$  and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!.

➤Here the ~ highest ~ refers to the ~ highest heavens, ~~ not ~ to the highest degree.

 $\triangleright$ (NIV) Glory to God in the highest heaven.

- ➤ Through the angel choir's behavior, ~~ they demonstrate ~ the appropriate response ~ to God's gracious intervention ~ to bring a Savior.
- ➤Not the time or occasion ~ for detailed study of these 2 vv.

>Suffice it to say, ~ in summary, ~ the angelic praise contains ~ 2 basic ideas.

 $\rightrightarrows$ 1<sup>st</sup>, ~ Phrase ~ Glory to God ~ focuses the praise on the One ~ who set these events in motion.

- → The One ~ who controls ~ all events on earth.
- $\rightrightarrows\! And$  the  $2^{nd}$  basic idea the angelic praise contains.
  - $\rightarrow$  The people  $\sim$  to whom God draws near through Jesus  $\sim$  will experience the harmony & blessings  $\sim$  that God bestows on his own.
  - $\Rightarrow$ Here Luke narrows the focus  $\sim$  from the offer to all people  $\sim\sim$  to those who benefit from Jesus' coming. 9/13

(15-16)	As soon as	the angels left	~ t	the shepherds	immediately	decided to	go to	Bethlehem.

- ➤ They knew ~ there was not a moment to waste.
  - >The Savior was born ~ and they were determined to find Him.
  - >So they hurried to the village ~ and found Mary and Joseph.
    - And there was the baby, ~ lying in the manger.
  - $\triangleright$ They came with  $\sim$  great speed,  $\sim$  urgency,  $\sim$  and expectation.
  - >They were not about to ~ ignore such good news ~ and neglect the Lord.
- ightharpoonup Wouldn't it be wonderful  $\sim$  if all shared the passion of these shepherds for coming to Jesus?
  - $\triangleright$  Many have heard of Him,  $\sim$  especially at this time of year.
  - $\triangleright$ But sadly,  $\sim$  most never take the time to come to Him.
  - >Jesus entered this world clothed in humanity ~ for a purpose.
    - ⇒He came ~ to die ~ for the sin of humanity.
    - ⇒He came ~ to provide ~ the means of our salvation, ~
      - $\rightarrow$  The righteous One  $\sim$  dying for the unrighteous. 10/13

⇒He came ~ to give life eternal and abundant ~ to all ~ who come to Him ~ by faith.

>Sadly, ~ most are content ~ to simply hear the good news, ~~ but never have a desire ~ to draw near to the Savior.

(17-18) After seeing Jesus,  $\sim$  the shepherds told everyone  $\sim$  what had happened  $\sim$  and what the angel had said to them about this child.  $\sim\sim$  All who heard the shepherds' story  $\sim$  were astonished.

- ightharpoonup The shepherds were unable  $\sim$  to remain quiet about  $\sim$  the good news they had heard  $\sim$  and their miraculous discovery.
  - >They shared the good news of Jesus' birth ~ with everyone they encountered.
  - DIn essence, ~ they were the first missionaries ~ to share the good news of the gospel.
  - >They were so moved by this encounter, ~~ they couldn't ~ keep it to themselves.
- >If the shepherds were willing to share abroad the good news of Jesus' birth, ~ 7

Surely ~ we believers here @ North Hartland CC ~ ought to be willing ~ to share the good news of the Gospel.

>We know more ~ than the shepherds did ~ that first night.

 $\exists$  We know of Jesus'  $\sim$  sinless life,  $\sim$  atoning death,  $\sim$  resurrection,  $\sim$  & the promise of his return.

 $\triangleright$ Let us do ~ as the shepherds did ~ that 1st Christmas ~ and widely share ~ the good news about Jesus. 11/13

plets pray ~ that we won't ~ keep it to ourselves, ~~ but that we share ~ the greatest gift ever given.
(20a) The shepherds went back to their sheep, $\sim$ glorifying and praising God $\sim$ for all they had heard and seen.
➤This should come ~ as no surprise.
>The shepherds had encountered Jesus, ~ the Messiah and Lord.
⊳He had come to earth, ~ just as was prophesied.
>The means of our salvation ~ had invaded the darkness.
$\triangleright$ When the shepherds comprehended $\sim$ the enormity of this encounter, $\sim\sim$ they were moved $\sim$ to offer praise and worship to the Lord.
>They had seen the Lord.   → And as a result ~ they were led to praise God.
$\rightrightarrows I$ believe $\sim$ this is the normal reaction $\sim$ of those who accept the good news about Jesus.
$ ightharpoonup$ It's easy $\sim$ to become $\sim$ so busy and consumed $\sim$ with all the activities of Christmas, $\sim$ that we fail to worship the Lord during Christmas.
$\triangleright$ While many of us have probably been guilty of this, $\sim$ it's a great tragedy.
⇒To forget ~ the One ~ Christmas is all about.
$\triangleright$ Christmas ought to stir $\sim$ an attitude of thankfulness $\sim$ which leads us $\sim$ to offer praise and worship to our Lord $\sim$ for the gracious gift we received. 12/13

➤ And consider gifts for a moment, ~ my
$\triangleright$ We no doubt ~ have received countless gifts over the years.
$\triangleright$ But probably, ~ the majority of them ~ have long worn out and been thrown away.
$\triangleright$ However, $\sim$ through the coming of Jesus as our Savior, $\sim$ we have received a gift $\sim$ that we still possess.
>And it will never ~ wear out or be thrown away.
>We will carry it with us ~ beyond the grave.
>This gift ~ is eternal life.
>That ~ is definitely ~ worth praising the Lord for!
Have you received this precious gift of eternal life from the Lord?
If so, $\sim$ we ought to offer praise to God for our salvation.
$ ightharpoonup$ If not, $\sim$ if you have not yet received this precious gift, $\sim\sim$ in this life the gift of salvation $\sim$ remains available.
>All you have to do $\sim$ is come to the Lord by faith, $\sim$ as the shepherds did, $\sim$ and receive the gift of salvation. 13/13
