Last time began to look @ 1st of the 4 major sections of 1 Thess, 1:2-10.

In this section have a prayer-rprt, in which P & team expressed thx.

 \triangleright Last wk. statement & when, v 2, \sim We give thanks to God always for all of you, constantly mentioning you in our prayers.

→ As noted, ~ basically, ~ in vv 3-10, ~ Paul & his team note ~ 4 reasons for giving thx.

Last time, 1^{st} reason, vs 3 (NIV).

➤ We remember before our God and Father your work produced by faith, your labor prompted by love, and your endurance inspired by hope in our Lord Jesus Christ.

➤ 3 aspects.

 $\triangleright 1^{st}$ aspect, ~ the faith of the Thessalonians expressed itself in works.

>Genuine Christian faith always displays the tangible evidence of its reality.

 \rightarrow It may start out small, \sim when a person is first saved.

 \hookrightarrow But \sim as a genuine Christian matures spiritually, \sim tangible evidence piles up.

 \triangleright 2nd aspect, ~ the Thessalonian believers' love for others prompted them to action on their behalf. 1/12

- >This ~ is what genuine Christ-like love does.
 - →It will always ~ prompt us ~ to action on other believers' behalf.
- ➤ And isn't that ~ what God's love for humanity did?
 - →Prompted him to action ~ on our behalf?
 - \hookrightarrow 1 Jn. 4:10 (NLT), ~~ This is real love ~~ not that we loved God, ~~ but ~ that he loved us ~ and sent his Son as a sacrifice ~ to take away our sins.
- >And the 3rd aspect, ~ they tenaciously endured opposition & hostility.
 - >The source \sim of this tenacious endurance \sim was not some \sim inner resolve \sim or personal strength.
 - >No, the source \sim of this tenacious endurance \sim was our blessed hope, \sim [i.e.] \sim the appearing of the glory of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ.
 - >This promise of a glorious eternal future ~ makes it possible for believers ~ to endure all manner of difficulty & hardship, ~ even persecution because of our faith.
 - \rightarrow At the end of things, \sim there is for us \sim a magnificent eternal future.
 - \rightarrow At the end of things, ~ there is for us ~ everlasting life and joy with our Savior.
 - →For Christians, ~ persecution, trouble, and affliction ~ are not the end.
 - \rightarrow Beyond these, \sim there lies \sim eternal glory. 2/12

- \rightarrow And in the sure, \sim certain, \sim and real hope of that glory, \sim Christians can endure anything \sim that this world throws at us.
- \rightarrow It seems to be one of the basic facts of life ~ that a person can endure anything ~~ so long as they have something to look forward to.
- → And Christians ~ have more to look forward to ~ than anybody.

(NIV) Vv 4-5 today.

- >Break it down.
- ➤Includes 2nd reason, ~ v 4 (NIV).
 - > For we know, brothers and sisters loved by God, that he has chosen you.
- ▶Plus an expansion on the 2nd reason (5a).
 - >How Paul knew they were genuinely part of God's people.
 - \triangleright Because the gospel did not come to them in word only, \sim it came empowered by the Holy Spirit & in a fully persuasive way.
- ➤ And this is followed by a parenthetical note ~ regarding the missionary team's conduct among the Thessalonian believers.
 - >Vs 5b (NIV), You know how we lived among you for your sake.

Ok, \sim let's dig in. 3/12

The 2nd reason for thanksgiving, 1:4 (NIV).

(NIV) For we know, brothers and sisters loved by God, that he has chosen you.

➤In brief, ~ Paul & his team gave thanks to God ~ because they knew ~ the Thess believers were genuinely part of the people/family of God.

Election/choice. Controversial. ~~ Humble. ~~ Not dogmatic.

>According to my research & thinking on this, ~ doubtful that Paul is talking about God choosing people for salvation.

ightharpoonupIt actually seems that for Paul, \sim election/chosen \sim is always a referent \sim to those who are already believers.

>And thus ~ it reflects ~ a reality ~ after the fact of salvation, ~ not before.

Here in vs 4, \sim Paul is referring to the whole group of Thess believers.

- ➤ And he's saying that God chose this group of believers for something.
 ☐ Does not tell us.
- ➤ 2 clues in Eph.

 $\triangleright 1^{st}$, ~ 1:4a, even as he chose us in him before the foundation of the world.

>Chose us for himself.

>The idea here: God actually selected believers for Himself as His own people.

>Before the foundation of the world he chose us in Christ to be his people. 4/12

 \triangleright And 2nd, ~ 1:5, ~ (ZECNT), ~ he predestined us to adoption through Jesus Christ to himself.

>Boiled down, ~ Paul's simply saying that a believer's destiny is determined beforehand

>And our predetermined destiny is our adoption as full-fledged children of God.

>NLT, ~ God decided in advance to adopt us into his own family by bringing us to himself through Jesus Christ.

 \triangleright The thought here, \sim in these 2 vv, \sim is that in advance God chose to take those who believe in Jesus for salvation and make them his special people & his children.

>& this is what Paul is most likely talking about in 1 Thess. 1:4 (NIV).

➤IOW, ~ not only did God the Father save us, ~ believers, ~ he chose to make us ~ his own people, ~ part of his own family.

So again, \sim the 2^{nd} reason for thx.

ightharpoonup Paul & his team gave thanks to God \sim because they knew \sim the Thess believers were genuinely part of the people/family of God.

➤No doubt the fact that they were part of God's family provided encouragement & comfort to these believers.

Going further, ~ this fact should provide encouragement & comfort to all believers.

- ➤God saved us from sin, ~ death, ~ hell, ~ & all the spiritual powers of evil.
- >Subsequently, \sim he did not then \sim put us into foster care, \sim or give us up for someone else to adopt us, \sim or leave us on our own. 5/12

▶Believers, ~ Paul says in Eph., ~~ are no longer foreigners and strangers, ~~ but ~ fellow citizens with God's people ~ and also members of his household ~ [or, ~ family]. & that makes believers brothers & sisters in Christ, ~ as Paul notes here in v 4 (NIV). >(NIV) For we know, brothers and sisters loved by God, that he has chosen you. >In fact, ~ in the 2 brief letters of Paul to the Thessalonians, ~ Paul used the word for brothers & sisters ~ ἀδελφοὶ ~ 21x. >This testifies ~ to the close & warm relationship ~ that Paul shared with the converts in Thessalonica. But it also emphasizes ~ the family relationship ~ between all believers. ⊳Mk. 3:32-35 >This does not demean the importance of the nuclear family, ~ which is maintained throughout the Scriptures. >Rather, ~ this connotes the appearance ~ of a new family, ~ the church. >Still, Jesus is saying that spiritual "brotherhood" ~ surpasses blood relationship. >There is a deeper relationship in the family of God ~ than in earthly ties. ightharpoonup In Addition, ~ the wd for brothers & sisters ~ $div d\delta \epsilon \lambda \phi o i$ ~ functions to create unity within the church 6/12

 \triangleright We are 1 family.

⊳Eph. 4:4-6

Before moving on to vs 5, ~ note the phrase, ~ loved by God (NIV).

➤ We, ~ believers, ~ are the objects ~ of his affection and care.

ightharpoonup The vb form for \sim loves \sim indicates that \sim God's love for believers \sim began in the past \sim and continues steadily.

Der. 31:3, ~~ I have loved you with an everlasting love.

>The Father's love for us ~ is continuous and everlasting.

Ps. 36, ~~ 26x ~~ God's faithful love endures forever.

>And think about this.

 \triangleright Not only has his love for us provided for our salvation through Christ.

>But also, \sim whenever we stray from him, \sim it is his constant love \sim that continually \sim works to restore us to him.

Ok, \sim to recap, \sim the 2nd reason for thx, v 4.

 \gg & i.e., \sim Paul & his team gave thanks to God \sim because the Thessalonian believers were genuinely part of the people/family of God. $\frac{7}{12}$

1:5a, ~ Expansion of vs 4.

Explains how Paul knew ~ they were genuinely part of God's family.

Decause our gospel came to you not only in word, but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and with full conviction.

>Simply put, ~ Paul & his team knew ~ because these Thessalonians responded positively ~ to the powerful gospel that came to them via the Holy Spirit.

The word for ~ gospel ~ was common enough in the Greek-speaking world.

- ➤It means simply ~ good news.
- ➤ However, ~ the Septuagint had already used it to designate the good news of salvation in the OT.
- ➤ And that ~ is its primary meaning in the NT.

The message of Christianity ~ is truly ~ a message of good news.

- ightharpoonup The heart of that message \sim is the offer of God's free salvation \sim through faith in Christ Jesus.
- ➤It's good news, ~ because as John says in his gospel, ~ For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him.
- ▶In 1 Jn. 4:9 we read, ~ In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent his only Son into the world, so that we might live through him.
- >And Jesus said, ~ I came that they may have life and have it abundantly. I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. 8/12

Notice carefully what Paul says here in vs 5a.
➤Our gospel came to you not only in word, but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and with full conviction.
▶In power and in the Holy Spirit, ~ expresses ~ a single idea.
➤In a powerful way through the Holy Spirit.
➤V 5a, ~ Because our good news did not come to you as a message only, but it also came in a powerful way through the Holy Spirit and deep conviction.
The gospel produces salvation in all who call upon Jesus for salvation.
➤In the opening vv of Rom., ~ the gospel is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes (NIV).
➤It is not merely a witness to God' power. □ It is an expression of his power.
>When the gospel is preached, ~ this is not simply so many words being uttered.
➤The power of God is at work.
$ ightharpoonup$ More specifically, \sim I would suggest, \sim the gospel is heavily loaded with the power of the Holy Spirit.
>He works through the message to convict the sinner and then regenerate those who respond positively to the gospel.
>The Holy Spirit empowers the message \sim and brings it home to people's hearts with deep conviction. $9/12$

- ➤ Furthermore, ~ God's singular purpose in thus exercising his power in the gospel is this.
 - \triangleright To change people's lives, \sim to liberate them from sin, death, & Satan, \sim and \sim to reconcile them to himself.
 - >To put it very succinctly, \sim to rescue them from the domain of darkness and transfer them into the kingdom of the Son he loves..
- ightharpoonup The gospel has power \sim to effect the salvation it announces \sim and \sim to impart the life it promises.

Lastly for the expansion in vs 5a, ~ with deep conviction.

- ➤Not talking about conviction of sin.
 - ▶ To be completely certain of the truth of something.
 Full assurance, certainty.
 - \triangleright The reference is to the Thessalonians' deep inward persuasion of the truth of the gospel.
 - >IOW, the Holy Spirit gave them full assurance that what the missionary team said was true.
 - Paul also refers to their certainty of the truth of the gospel in 2:13a (NIV).
 - >And we also thank God continually because, when you received the word of God, which you heard from us, you accepted it not as a human word, but as it actually is, the word of God.

 \triangleright This deep inward persuasion of the truth of the gospel \sim was a sign \sim of the Holy Spirit's work in their hearts.

 \triangleright 1 Cor. 1:18 (NET), For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.

 \triangleright The Thessalonian Christians \sim sensed the supernatural truthfulness of the gospel Paul preached \sim as the Holy Spirit brought this conviction home to their hearts.

>When Christians share their faith, ~ we do not merely give our particular viewpoint on life ~ as one among the endless variety of human theories.

>We announce ~ the divinely revealed truth of God.

Ok, ~ Paul & his team knew these believers were genuinely part of God's people.

>And here's how they knew.

>The gospel came to them empowered by the Holy Spirit.

>The Holy Spirit persuaded them that it was truth.

 \rightarrow And they responded positively.

<u>Vs 5b ~ parenthetical note regarding the missionary team's conduct among the Thess believers.</u>

(CSB) You know how we lived among you for your benefit.

➤Not sure why this is here. 11/12

DI would suggest ~ that Paul was perhaps simply implying an important truth ~ that is taught explicitly elsewhere in the NT. >& i.e., ~ there is a definite connection between our lifestyle & our evangelism. D1 Pet. 2:12, ~ Keep your conduct among the Gentiles [unbelievers] honorable, so that when they speak against you as evildoers, they may see your good deeds and glorify God on the day of visitation. ▶High moral character of Paul & his associates ~ confirms the quality & power of the gospel. >Paul will address this again in 2:1-12. >Not only the message ~ but also the life of the messengers ~ witnessed to the true value of God's truths for their lives. >So they could trust what they were being told. Nothing Paul did was to enhance his image or wallet. >Was all for the benefit of these new believers.

The parallelism here between word and deed is noteworthy.

>A definite connection between our lifestyle & our evangelism. 12/12
