A WORD OF ENCOURAGEMENT; 1 THESS. 4:13-18 (Ed O'Leary)

INTRODUCTION.

OUR CHURCH HAS GONE THROUGH A LOT IN THE PAST FEW YEARS WHEN IT COMES to home-goings.

- ▶▶And some of us have seen loved ones go home to be with the Lord who were not a part of our congregation.
 - \triangleright So I thought that in the light of the most recent home-going, ~ our brother Wayne's, ~ we should kind of pause, ~ catch our breath, ~ 77
 - → and look at a word of encouragement from our gracious Lord on this matter of the death of believers.
 - → Philippians on hold and turn to 1 Thess. 4:13-18

THE CHURCH IN THESSALONICA HAD QUESTIONS FOR PAUL ABOUT THOSE WHO DIE prior to the return of Christ.

- ▶▶In Paul's discussions, ~ the emphasis seems to have been on the imminence of Jesus' return. ~~ Their concern was the role of dead believers at His second advent.
 - \triangleright \triangleright What would be the lot of such? ~~ Would death rob them of participation in the Grand Event?
- ▶▶So Paul instructed them in this matter.
 - \triangleright He told them that, ~ on the contrary, ~ believers who die prior to the return of Jesus are to share fully in the glories of that day.
- ►► And in Paul's instruction to these believers, ~ 77
 - DPaul gives us a wealth of encouraging information and teaching regarding the death of believers and the believers who have to say good-bye to them.
 - → And that is what we're going to focus on this morning.
 - \rightarrow The plan is to just read through the passage, ~ making observations about the death of believers and the believers who have to say good-bye to them.

VERSE 13....

THE WORD "ASLEEP" IS A FIGURE OF SPEECH USED IN THE NT TO REFER to believers who have died.

- ▶ Though unbelievers in Paul's day used "sleep" as a metaphor for "death", ~ it would obviously not have the same implications.
- ▶▶This is not "soul sleep," ~ where our souls are sleeping. ~~ Unbiblical. ~~ Next week

>>At this point, ~ I'll just say this. ~~ After death a believer is not unconscious. ~~ Believers are very much conscious in Jesus' presence. ~~ Elijah and Moses

THE WORD "SLEEPING" IS A GREAT WORD PICTURE.

▶▶In life, ~ when we are sleeping, ~ we're still alive, ~ aren't we? ~~ Well, ~ the same is true for believers who die. ~~ They are very much alive, ~ more alive than ever.

Do In Ex. 3:6, ~ God said to Moses, ~ "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." ~ Not "I was."

 \triangleright And in Jn. 8:56, ~ Jesus said, ~ "Your father Abraham rejoiced at the thought of seeing my day; he saw it and was glad."

▶▶Also, ~ in life when we are sleeping, ~ we don't cease to exist.

>> Well, ~ the same is true of anyone who dies, ~ believer or unbeliever. ~~ They don't cease to exist.

- →→But there is a big difference in destination for them.
 - $\rightarrow \rightarrow At$ death, ~ the believer goes straight to be with Jesus, ~ and will eventually spend a glorious eternity on the new earth.
 - $\rightarrow \rightarrow$ In contrast, \sim the unbeliever goes straight to hell, \sim and eventually will be sent to the lake of fire.

 \triangleright So our brothers and sisters who have gone home before us, ~ still exist. ~~ We just can't see them or be with them at this time.

▶ Furthermore, ~ in life sleep speaks of something temporary. ~~ We sleep only a certain number of hours and then wake up. 112/7

 \triangleright Similarly, ~ the separation of our spirits from our bodies at death is only temporary. ~~ We're going to get them back at the resurrection.

 \triangleright Only with a huge difference. ~~ At the resurrection, ~ our bodies will be new and improved models.

→Paul explains in 1 Cor. 15:35-44 . . . .
```

CONTINUING IN VERSE 13, ~ PAUL SAYS, ~ "THAT YOU MAY NOT GRIEVE AS OTHERS do who have no hope."

▶►Notice that Paul does not put a period after the word "grieve." ~~ This is extremely important to notice.

```
>>He does not say, ~ "that you may not grieve (period)" ~~ Or, ~ "you're not supposed to."
```

 \triangleright And Paul does not belittle their sorrow. ~~ He doesn't say, ~ "You are Christians, ~ so you have no business grieving, ~ what's the matter with you?"

 \triangleright Of course we grieve. ~~ Of course we have sorrow when a believing loved one goes home to be with the Lord.

- >> And as we'll see later in Philippians, ~ Paul told the Philippians that he would have had "sorrow upon sorrow" had their messenger and his coworker Epaphroditus died.
- ▶ What' Paul's point then? ~~ Well, ~ his point is that we don't grieve in the same way unbelievers do. ~~ That's who "others" refers to in verse 13.
- ▶ Both believers and unbelievers rightly express grief at the loss of a loved one. ~~ The distinction that is highlighted in verse 13 is that the unbeliever has "no hope."

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ "no hope" could be the inscription on every unbeliever's tombstone.

▶ Believers have the confident expectation of reunion with the believers who have gone before us, ~ of resurrection, ~ of a glorious eternity spent in the fellowship and presence of Jesus, ~ 77

Dand of "an inheritance that can never perish, ~ spoil, ~ or fade."

→ Unbelievers don't. 11 3/7
```

- ▶ Believers will therefore still have sorrow at the death of a fellow believer, ~ because our fellowship with them has been interrupted.
 - $\triangleright \triangleright$ But our hope alleviates and transforms our grief, \sim because one day our fellowship will be restored.
 - → Death's sting is removed from our grief, ~ because the temporary separation of death will yield to the eternal fellowship of the Lord's people.

AT THIS TIME I WOULD LIKE TO CALL OUR ATTENTION TO VERSE 14 . . .

THREE OBSERVATIONS HERE.

- $\triangleright \triangleright 1^{st}$, ~ Paul notes that "Jesus died and rose again." ~~ Believers can have a confident expectation of resurrection because of what happened to Jesus.
 - Decause Jesus died and was raised to life again, ~ believers can have absolute trust that we too will be raised, ~ and that our brothers and sisters who have died will also be raised.
 - \triangleright The guarantee of our resurrection is Jesus's resurrection. ~~ Jesus' resurrection guarantees that we <u>will</u> be raised from the dead and <u>will</u> receive our resurrection bodies.
 - >>In Jn. 14:19, ~ while speaking to the disciples on the night of His arrest, ~ Jesus said, ~ "Yet a little while and the world will see me no more, but you will see me. Because I live, you also will live."
 - → Let's break this down. ~~ "Yet a little while and the world will see me no more," ~ His death. ~~ "but you [i.e., ~ the disciples] will see me," ~ His resurrection.
 - \rightarrow Then He states the implications for all believers. ~~ "Because I live, ~ you also will live."
 - \triangleright \triangleright Without Jesus' resurrection, ~ we would have a dead hope.
 - $\rightarrow \rightarrow As$ Paul says in 1 Cor. 15:19, ~ "If in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied."
 - $\triangleright \triangleright$ But Jesus has been raised from the dead. ~~ And through His resurrection believers have "a living hope" as Peter puts it in his first epistle.

- ► The 3rd observation from verse 14.
 - >>Believers who have died are presently with the Lord.
 - $\triangleright \triangleright$ More next week ~~ Just say this. ~~ They are not forgotten. ~~ Not lost. ~~ They are with Jesus.
 - >>And when Jesus returns, ~ they will accompany Him.
 - \triangleright They won't miss out on anything. ~~ All of us, ~ believers, ~ will participate in that grand event. ~~ If Jesus were to come back this afternoon
 - $\triangleright \triangleright$ And this truth should certainly alleviate and transform our sorrow when a believing loved one goes home to be with the Lord.

NOW LET'S LOOK AT VERSES 15-17

IN VERSE 15a, \sim PAUL INDICATES THAT THE TEACHING HE OFFERS IS BASED ON THE authority of Jesus himself.

- ▶▶"we declare to you by a word from the Lord."
- ▶▶This may refer to Jesus' teaching about his return, ~ particularly His assurance that at his coming he will gather together all of his people
 - \triangleright Mk. 13:26-27, ~ "²⁶ And then they will see the Son of Man coming in clouds with great power and glory. ²⁷ And then he will send out the angels and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven."
- ▶ The point we want to highlight here is that Paul's teaching is not made up of his opinions or uninformed speculations.
 - >> What Paul is speaking is the absolute truth. ~~ It comes from Jesus Himself.
 - \rightarrow As Peter says in 2 Pet. 1:20-21, \sim "NIV \sim ²⁰ Above all, you must understand that no prophecy of Scripture came about by the prophet's own interpretation of things. ²¹ For prophecy never had its origin in the human will, but prophets, though human, spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit."
 - \triangleright (Display 1 Thess. 4:15-17) \sim My brothers & sisters, \sim 15-17

- ▶ Believers who have died are raised first, ~ then believers who are alive at the time of Jesus' return.
- ▶▶In 1 Cor. 15:51-53, ~ Paul elaborates on this

IN VERSE 17, ~ PAUL TELLS US THAT THERE WILL BE A GREAT REUNION.

- ▶►If the Lord tarries and does not return in our lifetime, ~ then we will be reunited at our death with those who have gone before us.
- ▶ The generation of believers still alive when Jesus returns will at that time be reunited with those who have gone home before them.
- ▶▶But either way, ~ we will be reunited with those who have been called home before us.
- ▶▶And in that we can rejoice. ~~ A glorious reunion awaits us.

BUT EVEN MORE GLORIOUS IS WHAT PAUL SAYS AT THE END OF VERSE 17.

- > "and so we will always be with the Lord."
- ▶▶"we," ~ i.e., ~ all believers "will always be with the Lord."
 - $\triangleright \triangleright$ All believers will make it across the finish line. ~~ No one who has confessed . . . ~ will be lost.
 - \triangleright In Jn. 6:39, ~ Jesus said, ~ NIV ~ "And this is the will of him who sent me, that I shall lose none of all those he has given me, but raise them up at the last day."
 - >>Remember what Paul said in Phil. 1:6?
 - →→ "And I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ."
 - \triangleright My brothers and sisters in Christ, ~ no matter what we go through, ~ no matter what happens to us in this life, ~ 77
 - the outcome will be the same, ~ we will cross the finish line and enter into our Lord's presence.
- ▶▶(Display verse 17) ~ "and so every believer will always be with the Lord."
 - $\triangleright \triangleright$ And Jesus desires us to be with Him. 11 6/7

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Jn. 17:24. ~~ "Father, I desire that they also, whom you have given me, may be with me where I am, to see my glory that you have given me because you loved me before the foundation of the world."

>>Every believer longs to be in the presence of Jesus.

- →→How comforting and encouraging to know that Jesus desires us to be in His presence.
 - → And we will be forever.
