RECONCILIATION, PT. 1; COL. 1:21a-c (Ed O'Leary)

INTRODUCTION.

TODAY WE BEGIN TO LOOK AT THE NEXT SECTION OF COLOSSIANS, ~ 1:21-23, ~ A very brief paragraph.

▶ In verse 20, ~ Paul talked about reconciliation. ~~ But he did it in a very general and brief way. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ Let's pick it up in verse 19.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, ~ and through him to reconcile to himself all things, ~ whether on earth or in heaven, ~ making peace by the blood of his cross. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ Notice the general nature of this.

▶▶In verses 21-23, ~ he expands on this theme of reconciliation.

>>And he does it in a very personal and specific way. ~~ He speaks to believers personally.

→→He goes from the general, ~ "all things," ~ to ~ "you." ~~ I.e., ~ each believer.

 \triangleright He says, ~ "Once ~ [i.e., ~ Formerly] ~ you were alienated and hostile in your minds, ~ as evident by your evil actions.

→→"you" is plural in the Greek text. ~~ Explain

 \rightarrow But it would apply to each and every believer.

 \triangleright So he's speaking to all believers on a personal level. ~~ And he's reminding each believer ~ of our own personal reconciliation to God.

 \triangleright He reviews for us our own spiritual experience and situation. 11 1/13

PAUL BEGINS THIS REVIEW ~ WITH OUR PRE-RECONCILIATION CONDITION. ~~ verse 21.

AND THIS IS WHAT WE'LL FOCUS ON TODAY. ~~ WHAT WE WERE ~ PRIOR TO salvation.

►► And we're going to split verse 21 into three parts.

VERSE 21a. ~~ ONCE ~ [I.E., ~ FORMERLY] ~ YOU WERE ALIENATED, ~ PAUL SAYS.

THE WORD "ONCE" ~ CONNECTS TO VERSE 20.

► So, ~ in vv. 20-21, ~ Paul is saying, ~ "Through his Son, ~ God reconciled to himself all things, ~ making peace by the blood of his cross. ~~ But here's the picture of you, ~ believer, ~ before being reconciled. ~~ You were alienated."

▶▶And of course, ~ the one who we were alienated from was God.

 \triangleright The NIV translation of verse 21a ~ brings out the meaning quite well here.

 $\triangleright \triangleright \circ$ Once ~ [or, ~ Formerly] ~ you were alienated from God.

IN VERSE 21a, ~ PAUL IS BASICALLY SAYING TO BELIEVERS, ~ 77

Deach of you, ~ before you became believers, ~ were alienated from God.

▶ Paul makes it very personal and includes every believer.

Each one of us, ~ personally, ~ were separated from God prior to our salvation. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ Extremely important to understand.

▶▶In our unsaved condition, ~ there was a complete absence ~ of any contact between us and God. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ Unsaved may think they have. ~~ But in reality ~ they don't. 11 2/13

NOW, ~ HERE IS SOMETHING THAT IS EXTREMELY IMPORTANT TO RECOGNIZE.

► Our alienation from God ~ began in our mother's womb.

▶▶More specifically, ~ it began at the second of conception.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ We do not become alienated by behavior or thought.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ We are by nature ~ separated from God.

▶▶In Ps. 51:5, ~ David wrote, ~ 77

>>"Behold, ~ I was brought forth in iniquity, ~ and in sin ~ did my mother conceive me.

>>David was not suggesting that his mother was committing sine, ~ like adultery, ~ here.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ His focus was not actually on his mother but on himself.

 $\triangleright \triangleright \mathsf{Ps.}$ 51 confession . . . $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ Focus on himself ~ not his mother.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ The verse could be translated as, ~ 77

 \rightarrow \rightarrow Look, ~ I was guilty of sin from birth, ~ a sinner ~ the moment my mother conceived me.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ David's point here ~ is that ~ he entered the world a sinner by nature ~ long before he became one in action.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ And notice exactly what David says.

 \Rightarrow a sinner ~ the moment my mother conceived me. 11 3/13

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ We see that David traced his sinfulness all the way back to the moment he came into existence.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ We are lost and separated from God ~ the moment we come into existence.

IT IS ALSO TREMENDOUSLY IMPORTANT TO UNDERSTAND ~ THAT ALL UNBELIEVERS are separated from God.

▶ There is no such thing as an innocent unbeliever.

►►And ~ all unbelievers will suffer separation from God for eternity ~~ unless they receive the reconciliation provided by Jesus.

bBut here's a warning. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ The offer of reconciliation with God through Christ ~ is good for this life only.

>>As Paul says elsewhere, ~ "Behold, ~ now is the acceptable time; ~~ behold, ~ now is the day of salvation!"

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ And as the author of Hebrews says, ~ "each person is destined to die once and after that comes judgment."

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ The offer of reconciliation with God through Christ ~ is good for this life only.

PAUL CONTINUES WITH HIS REVIEW OF OUR PRE-RECONCILIATION CONDITION.

IN VERSE 21b, ~ PAUL SAYS, ~ formerly ~ you were "hostile in your minds."

▶ The sentence continues here, ~ so God is the one we were hostile in mind toward.

▶ "hostile in your minds." ~~ I.e., ~ hostile toward God in thought and attitude. ↓↓ 4/13

▶ The phrase, ~ "hostile in your minds," ~~~ is a hard-hitting way of saying that at the heart of each one of us there is an inbred hostility to God.

▶▶Before we trusted Christ, ~ our entire way of thinking was contrary to God's.

► There is an inward bent in all humanity ~~ to hate the law of God, ~~ to hate the revelation of the character of God, ~~ to hate the truth of the gospel.

▷▷Don't believe me? ⇒⇒ Just bring up the name of Jesus . . .

▶ The human mind opposes the mind of God, ~ sets up a rival kingdom, ~ and organizes an active rebellion against the divine Ruler.

▶▶In Rom. 8:7, ~ Paul writes, ~~ The mind governed by the flesh is hostile to God; ~~ it does not submit to God's law, ~ nor can it do so (NIV).

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ It cannot submit to God's law ~~ because the mind is the seat of indwelling sin and is in permanent revolt against him.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ The unregenerate human mind ~~ instinctively recognizes in God's law ~ the danger of judgment, ~ and thus prefers willful ignorance.

>>People will come up with all sorts of ways to explain God and judgment away.

→→This is one reason why evolution is so popular

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ The unregenerate human mind ~~ instinctively recognizes in God's law ~ the danger of judgment, ~ and thus prefers willful ignorance.

PAUL CONTINUES WITH HIS REVIEW OF OUR UNSAVED CONDITION IN VS. 21c.

FOR CONTEXT, ~ WE'LL START WITH THE BEGINNING OF VERSE 21. 11 5/13

► Once ~ [i.e., ~ Formerly] ~ you were alienated and hostile in your minds, ~ as evident by your evil actions.

▶ Paul explains here ~ our hostility toward God was evident ~ by our evil behavior.

SOME TRANSLATIONS READ ~ "BECAUSE OF" ~ OR ~ "BY" ~ EVIL BEHAVIOR.

▶ While this is one way to interpret and translate it, ~ it's not the best way.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ That is so ~ because each of these readings seem to make our sins ~ the cause of our hostility toward God.

▶▶TPID, ~ from outward appearance ~ these translations that say "by" or "because of," ~ 77

>> could possibly cause someone to mistakenly assume ~ that our sinning causes our hostility toward God.

I THINK WE CAN SAFELY SAY THAT OUR SINNING ~ MAKES OUR HOSTILITY TOWARD God worse.

▶▶I.e., ~ we're doubly hostile toward God. ~~ Start out hostile ~ & goes down hill

▶▶But our sinning ~ does not cause our hostility toward God.

▶▶Sin begins in the heart ~ and manifests itself in overt deeds.

SCRIPTURE IS CLEAR ON THIS.

▶▶Jesus shows that sin begins in the heart.

 \triangleright You have heard that it was said, ~ 'You shall not commit adultery.' ~~ But I say to you ~ that everyone who looks at a woman with lustful intent ~ has already committed adultery with her in his heart. ~~ Matt. 5:27-28 11 6/13

▶▶Jesus shows us this in his discussion on what defiles a person, ~ recorded in Matt. 15:10-20,

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ And you can read the whole passage later for the full context.

▷▷Jesus says this in verses 19-20a.

→→For out of the heart come ~ evil thoughts, ~ murder, ~ adultery, ~ sexual immorality, ~ theft, ~ false witness, ~ slander. ~~ These are what defile a person.

►►And James weighs in on this as well.

 \triangleright But each person is tempted when he is lured and enticed by his own desire. ~~ Then desire when it has conceived ~ gives birth to sin, ~ and sin ~ when it is fully grown ~ brings forth death. ~~ James 1:14-15

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Notice the progression ~ and where it all starts.

UNBELIEVERS ARE NOT INWARDLY HOSTILE TOWARD GOD BECAUSE OF THEIR outward acts of sins.

▶▶They commit sins ~ because they are inwardly hostile toward God.

▶▶ TPID, ~ we are not sinners because we sin. ~~ We sin ~ because we are sinners.

ANOTHER AND MORE APPROPRIATE MEANING OF THE GREEK TEXT IN VIEW HERE, ~ 77

 \blacktriangleright is that our sinful behavior ~ gave evidence that we were hostile toward God. 11 7/13

►► And that's why I used the translation I did.

>>Once you were alienated and hostile in your minds, ~ as evident by your evil actions.

► Our evil actions ~ revealed our hostility toward God.

▶▶ TPID, ~ our sinful acts were ~ the outward expression ~ of our inward enmity toward God.

NOW, ~ WE SPENT A GREAT DEAL OF TIME ON THAT, ~ BUT PURPOSEFULLY SO.

▶▶It is extremely important that you understand this.

► And again, ~ it is my responsibility as an expository preacher/teacher ~~ to help you understand the Bible ~ correctly ~ and ~ as fully as possible.

▶▶I hope you never make the mistake of thinking, ~ "This is boring. ~~ Why do I need to know these things?"

►► And it is every believer's responsibility ~ to understand the Bible correctly ~ and as fully as possible.

OK, ~ TO NOT LOSE SIGHT OF THE FOREST FOR THE TREES, ~ 77

IN THIS NEXT PARAGRAPH, ~ COL. 1:21-23, ~ 77

>>Paul is reviewing for us ~ our own personal ~ spiritual experience and situation.

►►And he begins this review ~ by taking us on a trip down memory lane.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ He reminds us of the way we were before we were saved. 11 8/13

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Before we became believers, ~ we were alienated from God and hostile in mind toward him.

 \rightarrow \rightarrow And our evil deeds revealed that hostility.

▶ But it's a very short trip down memory lane here in Colossians.

PAUL GIVES A MUCH FULLER TREATMENT OF OUR UNSAVED CONDITION OVER IN Eph. 2.

TPID, ~ HE TAKES US ON A LONGER TRIP DOWN MEMORY LANE.

►►And I think we would do well in reviewing some of that, ~ in order to get a fuller picture of our unsaved condition.

▶▶I'll just highlight three points of Paul's review of our unsaved state there.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ This will get you started ~~ and then you can trace the rest of Paul's review on your own.

ONE POINT PAUL MAKES IN EPH. 2 IS THAT ~ IN OUR UNSAVED STATE, ~ WE "WERE by nature children of wrath." ~~ Eph. 2:3b

▶▶Now, ~ being a child of wrath is not a way of speaking about someone's ill temper.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Paul is not saying that, ~ when were unsaved, ~ we were wrathful or angry children.

► Greek word for "of wrath" here ~ should be understood as "destined for wrath."

 $\triangleright \triangleright I.e.$, ~ prior to salvation, ~ we were headed straight for God's wrath.

► The whole phrase "children of wrath" ~ was a saying that meant ~ those who were subject to, ~ deserving of, ~ and destined for ~ wrath. 11 9/13

>>And in the context of Eph. 2, ~ "wrath" refers to God's wrath.

▷▷Notice especially ~ the phrase "deserving of." ~~ Not deserve

▶▶In our natural, ~ or unsaved, ~ condition, ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Paul says ~ we were subject to, ~ deserving of, ~ and destined for ~ a horrifying and terrible eternity.

ANOTHER POINT IN EPH. 2 THAT PAUL MAKES IS THAT ~ IN OUR UNSAVED STATE.

► We had ~ "no hope."

▶ Paul is talking about biblical hope here.

▶ Recall from previous studies, ~ that biblical hope has an objective and a subjective meaning.

▶▶The objective meaning ~ is that the believer's hope ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ is the totality of what God has promised the believer at the end of this age ~ and in the life to come.

 \triangleright Which includes the promise of Jesus' second coming, ~ God's promise of our resurrection and glorification, ~ 77

 \rightarrow \rightarrow the inheritance that we obtained through Jesus, \sim and God's promise of a new universe.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ And every part of this hope that we have ~ is 100%, ~ absolutely guaranteed to be fulfilled. 11 10/13

▶ The subjective meaning of the believer's hope is that it is an attitude of expectancy, ~~ which is actually a result of the reality of the hope that comes from the totality of what God has promised.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ The certainty of God's promises to believers for the future ~ 77

→ → produces within us ~ a confident expectation ~ of the fulfillment of all that God has promised.

▶ Paul says ~ we had none of this prior to salvation.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ We had no promise of a glorious future ~ and therefore no confident expectation <u>of</u> a glorious future.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ For the believer, ~ life leads to a greater, ~ awesome life.

 \triangleright When we were unsaved, ~ life was leading to despair, ~ discouragement, ~ depression, ~ uncertainty for the future, ~ a fear of death, ~ and death itself.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ What a horrible condition we were in.

>>What a horrible condition those who are still separated from Christ are in.

AND THE THIRD AND FINAL POINT FROM PAUL'S REVIEW IN EPH. 2 OF OUR UNSAVED condition.

▶ Paul says ~ we were "without God in the world."

▶ Paul does not mean that we were necessarily atheists.

► The word translated as ~ "without God" ~ refers to not having a relationship with the one true God. 11 11/13

▶ We were living in this world without a relationship with the one true God.

▶ Think through some of the things that meant.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ We did not have Him guiding us, ~ blessing us, ~ or helping us.

>>We did not have His friendship. ~~ We did not have Him to turn to in times of trouble.

>>We did not have His word steering us through this sin-darkened world.

► How tragic.

▶▶And how tragic ~ for those who still do not have a relationship with the one true God.

CONCLUSION.

NOW, ~ WHY WOULD PAUL, ~ IN TWO PLACES NO LESS, ~ TAKE US ON A TRIP DOWN memory lane?

Certainly not to make us feel guilty or to drag us down.

▶ Rather, ~ no doubt Paul wants us to never forget our unsaved condition, ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ in order ~ that we develop a greater appreciation for our salvation and its accompanying blessings; ~~ 77

 \rightarrow in order for us ~ 77

 \rightarrow \rightarrow to come to a greater appreciation for the great things God has done for us ~~ and for how He has had mercy on us. 11 12/13

▶▶Remembering the way we were ~ will help prevent us from failing to appreciate Jesus' sacrifice on our behalf.

▶ Remembering the way we were ~ will help us begin to truly grasp and appreciate the infinite depth of God's love for us.

►►And remembering the way we were ~ will guard us against spiritual pride.

▷▷Because it will remind us of two things.

 \rightarrow \rightarrow 1st, ~ none of us ~ were saved because we were great people. ~~ Quite the contrary.

→→And the second thing remembering the way we were will remind us of: ~~ none of us ~ could get ourselves out of our spiritually dead predicament.

MY . . ., ~~ GOD SAVED US BY HIS GRACE.

▶ Eph. 2:4-10

▶ To God be the glory, ~ great things He hath done; ~~ So loved He the world that He gave us His Son,

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Who yielded His life an atonement for sin, ~ And opened the life-gate that all may go in.
