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- ▶ But before forging ahead, ~ we're going to take a step backward ~ and review what we've learned so far, ~ from 1:1 through 2:5.
- ▶▶This will help us keep the big picture in mind, ~ as we slowly go through the details.
- ▶▶Doing this review ~ was actually at the prompting of Meg.
- ▶ Detail-oriented . . . .

SO HERE WE GO. ~~ COLOSSIANS SO FAR.

## PAUL SEEMS TO HAVE HAD TWO OVERARCHING PURPOSES FOR WRITING.

1st, ~ TO REFUTE FALSE DOCTRINE.

- $\blacktriangleright$  The believers in Colossae and the surrounding region  $\sim$  were being plagued by false teaching.
  - >> And Paul wrote ~ to defend the faith.
- ▶▶Now, ~ Paul does not identify the heresy. ~~ He simply offers a rebuttal.
  - $\triangleright$ But from what Paul says within the letter, ~ the heresy seems to have been a mixture ~ of Jewish ritual practices, ~ and ~ pagan beliefs and practices. 11 1/15

▶▶Some examples.
hd The heresy undermined the supremacy and sufficiency of Christ.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ It looks like the heresy included strict rules about ~ permissible food and drink, ~~ religious festivals, ~~ and circumcision.
⊳⊳All matter is evil. ⇒⇒ Creation. ⇒⇒ God becoming man.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ And $\sim$ it looks like the heresy included the notion $\sim$ that through self-torture $\sim$ or self-denial $\sim$ a person can attain exalted spirituality. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ Impossible.
▶▶Paul did not take kindly to false teaching. ⇒⇒ And neither should we.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ There can be ~ no compromise on our part ~ with false teaching, ~~ any more than a surgeon ~ could compromise ~ with a cancerous tumor in a patient's body.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ False teaching $\sim$ is to be exposed $\sim$ and rooted out $\sim$ when we hear it.
▶▶And make no mistake about it, ~ if false teaching ~ is left unopposed, ~ it will end badly ~ for a local church ~ and ~ for individual believers. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ Destructive.
PAUL'S SECOND PURPOSE FOR WRITING ~ WAS TO INSTRUCT BELIEVERS ~ ON HOW ~ to live a godly life. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ 3:1-4:6.
▶▶But we can also look at this section ~ a little differently.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ Paul may have also been setting up a contrast ~ between the false way of living ~ taught by the heretics ~ 7.7
→ and what the Christian life ~ is really supposed to look like. 11 2/15

▶▶Sound doctrine >> teaches and leads to godly lives. ► False teaching >> ungodly living.  $\triangleright$ Jude tells us that they falsely claim that God's grace  $\sim$  allows us  $\sim$  to live immoral lives. ▶▶The false teachers ~ were ~ most likely, ~ trying to lead the believers in Colossae and the surrounding region astray, ~ not only in doctrine, ~ but also in practice. >> The same as false teachers today. ▶ Subsequently, ~ we could say, ~ then, ~ that the whole epistle to the Colossian church ~ is a rebuttal of false teaching.  $\triangleright \triangleright$  And Paul does so  $\sim$  by means  $\sim$  of presenting sound doctrine,  $\sim$  by means  $\sim$  of exhortations to stay faithful to sound doctrine, ~~ 77 → and ~~ by showing us ~ what the Christian life is really supposed to look like. ▶▶The only way ~ to not be taken in by false teaching ~ is to ~ be grounded in ~ and stay faithful to ~ sound doctrine ~ and ~ sound practice. >> Sound practice meaning ~ the Bible's teaching ~ on godly living. THE FIRST MAIN SECTION OF COLOSSIANS IS ~ 1: ~ 3-8. IN THIS PARAGRAPH, ~ PAUL EXPRESSED GRATITUDE FOR THESE BELIEVERS ~~ AND

▶▶In this paragraph ~ we made ~ seven observations ~ about the true gospel. 11 3/15

then ~ expanded on his statement of gratitude.

- $ightharpoonup 1^{st}$ ,  $\sim$  we observed that the gospel is the good news  $\sim$  that Jesus has solved the problem of sin and death  $\sim$  through his death,  $\sim$  burial,  $\sim$  and resurrection.
- $\triangleright \triangleright 2^{nd}$ , ~ we noted that Paul set forth the essential nature of the gospel:  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$  abs. truth.
- ▶▶ $3^{rd}$ , ~ we observed that in our unsaved state we do not seek God.  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$  God seeks us.
- $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright 4^{th}$ , ~ we noted that ~ the gospel ~ is for everyone in the whole world, ~ not just one nation or ethnic group.
- $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright 5^{th}$ , ~ we observed ~ that the gospel ~ is the living and enduring word of God ~ and it bears fruit.
  - >>I.e., ~ it produces salvation in all who call upon Jesus for salvation.
- ▶▶6<sup>th</sup>, ~ we noted ~ that the gospel ~ is going out into all the world without restriction.
- ▶▶And  $7^{th}$ , ~ we observed ~ that Paul emphasized and reminded us ~ that God's grace ~ is at ~ the center ~ of the gospel message.
  - $\triangleright$  The false teachers ~ were denying the doctrine ~ of salvation by grace alone, ~~ and were teaching ~ some kind of salvation by ~ human works or human merit.
  - $\triangleright\triangleright$  So Paul reinforced the truth  $\sim$  of the doctrine of salvation by grace alone.

# THE NEXT MAIN SECTION IS 1:9-14.

IN THIS PARAGRAPH, ~ PAUL TALKED ABOUT PRAYER FOR THESE BELIEVERS.

▶► He informed them ~ that he and his missionary team were continually praying for them, ~ what they were praying for, ~ and why they were praying this particular prayer. 11 4/15

▶▶The reason was ~ that ~ Paul wanted believers, ~ all believers, ~ to live a life ~ that was pleasing to God. ▶▶And then he listed ~ four characteristics of a life that is pleasing to the Lord.  $\triangleright \triangleright 1^{st}$ , ~ Paul made the point that ~ good works ~ in the life of the believer ~ please God. → Remember, ~ Good works ~ follow ~ becoming a new creation in Christ.  $\rightarrow G$ ood works are not the means of earning salvation. → They are ~ a natural result ~ and proof of ~ salvation. TPID, ~ genuine saving faith in Christ ~ results in ~ and is proven by ~ good works. >> The 2<sup>nd</sup> characteristic. → The Lord is pleased ~ when believers ~ continue to grow in their knowledge about him. → Not an some ego trip . . . . → Lack of knowledge about Jesus ~ opens us up ~~ to being taken in by false teachers, ~ to stagnating in our spiritual growth, ~ 77 → and ~ to falling victim to Satan, ~ our sin nature, ~ and this evil world. >>In brief, ~~ if we are not continually growing in our knowledge about the Lord, ~~ we

will be destroyed spiritually. 11 5/15

>> The 3<sup>rd</sup> characteristic.

 $\rightarrow \rightarrow A$  life ~ that is fully pleasing to Jesus ~ is one ~ in which there is total dependence ~ on his power ~ rather than our own ~ in order to endure and to be patient.

>> And the 4th characteristic.

 $\rightarrow$  Joyfully and continually giving thanks to the Father is pleasing to him.

 $\rightarrow$  When we, ~ believers, ~ continually ~ consider ~ all that God has done for us, ~ what he has rescued us from, ~ 77

→ → what he has promised for this and the life to come, ~ how could we not ~ joyfully and continually ~ give our heavenly Father thanks?

▶▶Then building on the  $4^{th}$  characteristic, ~ Paul gave us four reasons ~ for joyfully and continually ~ giving thanks to our Heavenly Father.

 $>>1^{st}$ , ~ He has qualified/enabled believers ~ to share in the inheritance that he has reserved for his people.

 $\triangleright \triangleright 2^{nd}$ , ~ for ~ rescuing us from the domain of darkness ~ and transferring us ~ to the kingdom ~ of his beloved Son.

 $\triangleright \triangleright 3^{rd}$ , ~ for ~ "redemption."

 $\Rightarrow$  Before we were saved,  $\sim$  we were  $\sim$  hopelessly and helplessly enslaved  $\sim$  to sin.  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$  So,  $\sim$  we were in need of redemption,  $\sim$  but could not redeem ourselves.

- $\rightarrow \rightarrow$  We needed a redeemer,  $\sim$  i.e.,  $\sim$  someone to pay the required price to set us free.
  - $\rightarrow$  Jesus paid the required price to effect our release. 11 6/15

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  And 4<sup>th</sup> reason to give thanks.  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$  "the forgiveness of sins."

### IN 1:15-20, ~ PAUL DISCUSSED THE PERSON AND WORK OF JESUS.

THE FALSE TEACHERS, ~ AS ALL FALSE TEACHERS DO, ~ WERE ATTACKING and distorting the Person and work of Jesus.

▶▶And in this paragraph, ~ Col. ~ 1: ~ 15-20, ~ Paul lays out the truth about the Person and work of Jesus.

HE PRESENTS  $\sim$  TEN  $\sim$  PROFOUND AND SWEEPING ASSERTIONS  $\sim$  about Jesus' Person and work.

▶▶1st, ~ Jesus is ~ the image of the invisible God

 $\triangleright \triangleright I.e.$ , ~ Jesus made visible the invisible nature of God.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  By his person, ~ words, ~ and actions ~ Jesus has revealed the Father to us.

 $\triangleright \triangleright 2^{nd}$ , ~ Jesus is ~ the firstborn over all creation.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  I.e., ~ Jesus ~ is supreme over all creation.

 $\triangleright 3^{rd}$ , ~ by him all things were created.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  And this is why  $\sim$  he is supreme over all creation.

▶▶4<sup>th</sup>, ~ Jesus ~ is before all things.

 $\triangleright$ Eternality. 11 7/15

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▶▶5<sup>th</sup>, ~ by him all things hold together.
   >>Not only is Jesus the Creator of all things, ~ all things continue to exist because of
   him.
   >> Jesus keeps the cosmos ~ from becoming a chaos.
   >> Without him, ~~ electrons ~ would not continue to circle nuclei, ~~ gravity ~ would
   cease to work, ~~ the planets ~ would not stay in their orbits.
   >> Jesus is the one ~ who makes the sun shine.
      → He is the one ~ who causes the earth to rotate on its axis and orbit the sun.
      → Jesus is the one ~ who continues to grant life to our bodies.
      → Our very creation and continued existence depends on Jesus.
▶▶6<sup>th</sup>, ~ Jesus is ~ the head of the body, the church.
   >> This simply means that Jesus ~ is supreme over the church.
   DDNo believer ~ is the head of the church. ⇒⇒ This position ~ is reserved exclusively ~
   for Jesus.
   >>Pastors and elders are under-shepherds.
▶▶7<sup>th</sup>, ~ Jesus is ~ the beginning.
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 $\triangleright$  Boiled down, ~ this means ~ that Jesus brought the church into existence. 11 8/15

- >> The church is the work of God ~ and not the work of human beings.
  - $\rightarrow$  And that's why the church can never be destroyed,  $\sim$  because it's existence does not depend on us  $\sim$  but on God.
- ▶▶8<sup>th</sup>, ~ Jesus is ~ the firstborn from the dead.
  - $\triangleright$ Jesus ~ was the first in time ~ to emerge from the realm of the dead with a glorified resurrection body, ~ never to die again.
    - $\rightarrow Guarantees$ ...
  - $\triangleright$ Plus, ~ by virtue of his resurrection, ~ Jesus has been elevated in rank ~ to a position ~ higher ~ than any of the other resurrected dead will experience.
    - $\rightarrow$  The author of Heb. tells us ~ that after making purification for sins, ~ Jesus sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high.
- $\triangleright \triangleright 9^{th}$ , ~ In Jesus ~ all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell.
  - $\triangleright \triangleright$  Boiled down ~~ the point Paul is making ~ is this: ~~ Jesus ~ is God in human flesh.
    - $\rightarrow$  TPID, ~~ God the Son, ~ in his full and complete deity, ~ stepped onto the historical scene ~ as a human being.
    - $\rightarrow$ In the beginning was the Word,  $\sim$  and the Word was with God,  $\sim$  and the Word was God.  $\sim$  And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us.
  - $\triangleright$  $\triangleright$ The Bible teaches ~ that Jesus is fully God and fully man ~ in one Person and will be so forever
    - → He has two distinct natures. ~~ He is not half man and half God. 11 9/15

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→ Jesus' two natures are not mixed together, ~ nor are they combined into a new
      God-man nature.
      → His divine nature ~ was not changed ~ when he took on a human nature.
      \rightarrow God, ~ in all his fullness, ~ became human.
      → He just allowed his humanity to cover his deity.
         → Veiled in flesh the Godhead see, ~ Hail the incarnate Deity!
▶▶And now for the 10<sup>th</sup> sweeping and profound assertion about the person and work of
Jesus.
   >>Jesus ~ is the one who reconciles all creation through his death.
   >> God the Father ~ chose to send his Son ~ for the designated purpose of reconciling all
   creation, ~~ and in particular fallen humanity, ~ to himself.
      → Focus on the humanity aspect in our review.
   >>Because Jesus is God, ~ He was able to do ~ what no mere man could ever do: ~~
   reconcile lost sinners to the Father.
   >>Obviously, ~ the means by which this was accomplished ~ was Christ's sacrificial death
   on the cross.
   >>He made "peace ~ by the blood of his cross."
      ⇒⇒Substitutionary sacrifice. 11 10/15
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 $\triangleright$  Now, ~ it is extremely important to understand ~ that reconciliation ~ is not equivalent ~ to salvation.

 $\triangleright$ Rather, ~ reconciliation ~ refers ~ to the removal of the barrier ~ between God and humanity ~ through Christ's sacrificial work ~ 77

⇒ ⇒ so that ~ God can deal with sinners ~ in a new way.

 $\triangleright$ Reconciliation has both ~ an objective ~ and ~ a subjective ~ side.

 $\rightarrow$ Objectively, ~ from God's side, ~~ the barrier between humans and God created by  $\sin$  ~ has been removed by Jesus' sacrificial death, ~ 77

→ so that ~ the way is open ~ for sinners to come to Him.

 $\rightarrow$ But reconciliation does not eliminate the need of individuals to respond in faith to this work of God.

 $\rightarrow \rightarrow On$  the subjective side,  $\sim$  people must accept the reconciliation that God has offered.

⇒⇒Not universal salvation.

PAUL'S MENTION OF RECONCILIATION ~ LEADS HIM INTO A VERY BRIEF EXPANSION of the topic, ~ 1:21-23.

IN THIS BRIEF PARAGRAPH, ~ PAUL IS REMINDING EACH BELIEVER ~ OF THEIR OWN personal reconciliation to God.

>>He reviewed for us ~ our own personal ~ spiritual experience and situation.

- $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright$  We were ~ separated from God ~ and were ~ hostile toward him in thought and attitude.
- ▶▶And our hostility toward him ~ was shown ~ or proven ~ by ~ our evil behavior.
- BUT ~ FOR BELIEVERS, ~ THAT HAS ALL CHANGED.
  - ▶▶We have accepted ~ the reconciliation ~ that God has provided.
  - ▶ We are now ~ holy and blameless and above reproach before him.
  - ▶ Paul was not speaking here ~ about the believer's progressive sanctification, ~ but about his or her status in Christ.
    - >> More on Progressive Sanctification in a moment.
  - ▶▶I.e., ~ in God's sight, ~ believers are ~ holy ~ and blameless ~ and above reproach."
- RECALL FROM OUR STUDY OF PHILIPPIANS, ~ WE DISCUSSED SANCTIFICATION.
  - ▶▶We noted that ~ sanctification ~ is God's work ~ in causing us ~ 77
    - >> to progressively become more and more like Jesus.
  - $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright$  More specifically,  $\sim$  that is progressive sanctification.
  - $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright$  And  $\sim$  as we said there,  $\sim$  God's work in us is ongoing,  $\sim$  long-term,  $\sim$  and will be completed.

WHAT PAUL HAS IN VIEW HERE IN COLOSSIANS ~ HOWEVER, ~ IS OUR POSITIONAL sanctification, ~ or ~ our justification. 11 12/15

▶▶When one puts their faith in Jesus Christ, ~ instantly, ~ at that very moment ~ they become ~ "holy and blameless and above reproach" ~ in God's sight.
▶▶This is what we are ~ in reality before God.
►►And Jesus' work of reconciliation ~ makes us this way.
MY, $\sim$ RIGHT NOW, $\sim$ WHEN THE FATHER LOOKS AT US, $\sim$ he doesn't see us $\sim$ in ou prior status.
▶▶He sees us ~ clothed ~ in the righteousness ~ of his beloved Son.
►►We talked about much of this in Philippians.
>>And we should never stop talking about it.
▶▶"those whom he justified ~ he also glorified, ~ Paul writes in Romans.
⊳⊳Past tense. ⇒⇒ Yes.
>>And very important to understand.
⇒⇒In the Father's eyes, ~ we are already glorified.
▷▷Tapestry
▶▶When the Father looks at us, ~ he sees his ~ glorified, ~ beloved children, ~ 77
$\nearrow \nearrow$ who are clothed ~ in the righteousness ~ of his beloved Son. 11 13/15

▶▶My fellow believers, ~ every morning ~ let's look into the mirror ~ and remind ourselves of this. >> And then ~ let's live out our day ~ accordingly. >>I.e., ~ we are to live lives ~ that are ~ "holy and blameless and above reproach." →→TPID, ~ we are to live lives that are glorifying and pleasing to the Lord. A QUICK NOTE HERE IN PASSING ~ REGARDING PROGRESSIVE SANCTIFICATION. ▶▶The process of spiritual growth ~ involves becoming in practice ~ what we are in reality before God. AND THAT BRINGS US ~ TO THE SECTION WE JUST FINISHED, ~ 1:24-2:5. PAUL'S ACCOUNT OF HIS APOSTOLIC MINISTRY ~ TO THE CHURCH. ▶▶Since we just finished this, ~ a lot of it ~ may still be fresh in people's minds, ~ 77 ▷ so I'll just give the overall picture. ▶▶ As we are well aware of, ~ his account ~ can be split into three parts. >> The first part ~ was Paul's ministry of suffering on believers' behalf, ~ 1:24.  $\triangleright$  The second part ~ was the character of his ministry, ~ 1:25-29.  $\triangleright$  And the third part, ~ which is found in 2:1-5, ~~ Paul's pastoral concern ~ for believers. 11 14/15
