STAY FAITHFUL, PT. 6; COL. 2:13-15 (Ed O'Leary)

INTRODUCTION.

PRESENTLY, ~ WE ARE LOOKING AT PAUL'S REBUTTAL OF FALSE TEACHING.

►► And this ~ is within the much larger context ~ of his five exhortations, ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ calling believers ~ to stay faithful ~ and not buckle under the pressure ~ of false teaching.

→→Remember, ~ Paul expands on each one ~ with additional teaching.

▶ His rebuttal ~ is the outflow ~ of the second exhortation.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ And it makes up the largest portion of this whole section of five exhortations.

▶▶And, ~ in his rebuttal, ~ as we know, ~ he makes seven assertions.

TODAY, ~ WE'LL TAKE UP THE LAST TWO ASSERTIONS.

▶ And then ~ next week, ~ we'll take up the remaining three exhortations and their expanded teaching ~ and be done with Col. 2:6-23.

OK, ~ LET'S LOOK AT THE LAST TWO ASSERTIONS OF PAUL'S REBUTTAL.

VERSES 13-14, ~~ THE SIXTH ASSERTION OF PAUL'S REBUTTAL.

BELIEVERS ARE SPIRITUALLY ALIVE AND TOTALLY FORGIVEN. 11 1/15

▶ But Paul doesn't begin with that.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ He once again ~ reviews our condition when we were unsaved.

▶▶In verse 13a, ~ he says ~ And you, ~ who were dead ~ in your trespasses ~ and the uncircumcision of your flesh.

>>Keep in mind our previous discussion about spiritual circumcision in verse 11.

>>Once again ~ I believe Paul has that in view ~ and not a physical procedure.

 $\triangleright \triangleright Although \sim it can be interpreted that way.$

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ But I really don't think Paul would have switched ~ from the spiritual to the physical ~ without some indication of the switch.

► So Paul is saying ~ that ~ prior to salvation, ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright we$ "were dead in our trespasses ~ and were not free from the power of our sinful nature."

NOW, ~ NOTICE ~ I SAID ONCE AGAIN PAUL ~ reviews our prior spiritual condition.

▶ Recall that he did it in Ephesians, ~ in his discussion of salvation by grace.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ He also began ~ by taking us on a trip ~ down memory lane.

>>In Ephesians, ~ he gave us ~ a very full treatment of our unsaved condition.

 \Rightarrow \Rightarrow He took us on a long trip ~ down memory lane. 12/15

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ And we examined that passage when we looked at Paul's discussion ~ in Colossians ~ of our own personal ~ spiritual experience and situation.

►►Also, ~ recall ~ that Paul took us on a short trip down memory lane, ~ in his discussion of reconciliation, ~ in 1:21-23.

>>He reviewed for us ~ our own personal ~ spiritual experience and situation.

 \rightarrow \rightarrow And recall that ~ he began that review ~ by taking us on a trip ~ down memory lane.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ He reminded us of the way we were before we were saved.

 \Rightarrow Before we became believers, ~ he told us that ~ we were alienated from God and hostile in mind toward him.

 \rightarrow And our evil deeds ~ revealed that hostility.

▶ Since we just recently discussed the details of our unsaved condition, ~ we won't today.

THE QUESTION IS, ~ "WHY WOULD PAUL, ~ IN THREE PLACES NO LESS, ~ TAKE US ON a trip down memory lane?

► Certainly ~ not ~ to make us feel guilty ~ or to drag us down ~ or to bring about other negative effects in our lives.

► Apostle of joy.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ In Phil. 3 ~ he exhorts believers to ~ rejoice in the Lord.

▷▷And then in Phil. 4, ~ he encourages us to ~ Rejoice in the Lord always. ~~ I will say it again: ~ Rejoice! 11 3/15

▶ Rather, ~ no doubt Paul takes us on these trips down memory lane ~ 77

DDbecause of the positive results ~ that will occur in our lives.

THINK ABOUT IT.

▶ Remembering the way we were ~ will help prevent us ~ from failing to appreciate Jesus' sacrifice on our behalf.

▶ Remembering the way we were ~ will help us begin to truly grasp and appreciate ~ the infinite depth ~ of God's love for us.

▶▶Remembering the way we were ~ will guard us against spiritual pride.

▷▷Because it will remind us of two things.

 $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow 1^{st}$, ~ none of us ~ were saved because we were great people. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ Quite the contrary.

 \rightarrow And the second thing ~ remembering the way we were will remind us of.

 \rightarrow \rightarrow None of us ~ could get ourselves out of our spiritually dead predicament.

►►And remembering what God saved us from ~ will cause us ~ 77

>> to come to a greater appreciation ~ for the great things God has done for us ~ and ~ for how He has had mercy on us.

►So no doubt ~ Paul takes us on these trips down memory lane ~ because of the positive results ~ that will occur in our lives. 114/15

▶ We see ~ that ~ when we were spiritually dead and enslaved to our sinful nature, ~ 77

DOGod made us alive ~ together with Jesus ~~ and forgave all of our sins.

▶▶But notice the condition we were in ~ when God saved us.

▶▶There was ~ no preparation on our part ~ before we could be saved.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ There was no preparation ~ we could do.

►► Any teaching ~ that would even suggest such a thing ~ is false.

▶ Paul sets the record straight ~ here in Colossians ~ and elsewhere.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ In Rom. 5:6-8 CSB, ~ Paul writes this.

→→⁶ For while we were still helpless, at the right time, Christ died for the ungodly.⁷ For rarely will someone die for a just person—though for a good person perhaps someone might even dare to die.⁸ But God proves his own love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ And even more, ~ according to Paul later in Rom. 5, ~ we were God's enemies ~ at the time Jesus died for us.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ And remember, ~ we were ~ alienated from God ~ and hostile in mind toward him, ~ when Jesus died for us.

There was ~ no preparation on our part ~ before we could be saved. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ There was no preparation ~ we could do. 11 5/15

AND CONSIDER THIS AMAZING TRUTH.

▶ Jesus did not say to the Father, ~ "Die for these people? ~~ 77

>>>> Why, ~ they're ~ sinners, ~ hostile toward me, ~ and my enemies. ~~ No way."

 \blacktriangleright No, ~ he didn't.

▶▶1 Jn. 4:10.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ In this is love ~ [or, ~ This is real love], ~~ not ~ that we have loved God ~~ but ~ that he loved us ~ 77

 \rightarrow and sent his Son ~ to be the propitiation for our sins ~~ [i.e., ~ to be ~ the sacrifice ~ to take away our sins].

▶ Speaking of his life, ~ Jesus said, ~ No one takes it from me, ~~ but I lay it down of my own accord.

 $\triangleright \triangleright I.e.$, ~ he sacrificed it voluntarily.

►► Amazing truth.

OK, ~ BACK TO VERSE 13 ~ AND THE SIXTH ASSERTION OF PAUL'S REBUTTAL.

AFTER NOTING OUR PRIOR SPIRITUAL CONDITION IN VERSE 13a, ~ 77

▶▶In verse 13b, ~ Paul says that ~ believers ~ are now spiritually alive ~ and totally forgiven.

 $\triangleright \triangleright God$ made [us] alive together with him, ~ having forgiven us all our trespasses. 11 6/15

►► Although everything happens instantaneously at conversion, ~ forgiveness must precede new birth.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ There can be no spiritual rebirth ~ without forgiveness of sins.

→→And the Greek grammar points ~ to forgiveness preceding new birth.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Sin is a barrier ~ between humanity and God ~ and must be removed ~ before new life can begin.

Forgave all our sins. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ And, ~ as we'll see, ~ later in the letter Paul urges believers ~ to imitate ~ this act of God.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ as the Lord has forgiven you, ~ so you also must forgive.

► We've already talked at length ~ about ~ believers being raised to spiritual life, ~ 77

▷▷so I'll just comment on the phrase, ~ having forgiven us all our trespasses.

NOW, ~ AGAIN, ~ KEEP THE OVERALL CONTEXT IN MIND HERE.

▶ Paul is refuting false teaching.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ One of the tenets of that heresy ~ was that Jesus' sacrifice was not enough.

 \rightarrow And Paul is disproving that in a big way.

► How many of our sins were forgiven? ⇒⇒ All of them.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ None ~ are left for us ~ or for someone else ~ to clean up. 11 7/15

▶ Jesus did not say to us, ~~ "Ok, ~ I'll take care of 90% of your sins. ~~ 77

DDAnd you take care of the remaining 10%."

▶▶God the Holy Spirit, ~ speaking through Paul, ~ is clear.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ The Father has ~ forgiven us ~ all ~ our trespasses.

▶ The Greek word for all ~ means ~ 77

 $\bigcirc \bigcirc$ the totality ~ of any ~ object, ~ mass, ~ collective, ~ or extension ~~ 'all, ~ every, ~ each, ~ whole.'

 $\triangleright \triangleright I$ think perhaps ~ we get Paul's point.

▶ Good thing too ~ that Jesus took care of all of our sins.

NOTE DAVID'S REACTION TO HIS SINS BEING FORGIVEN.

▶ Ps. 32:1 (CSB). ~~ How joyful ~ is the one ~~ whose transgression ~ is forgiven, ~~ whose sin ~ is covered!

► Should this not be ~ our reaction too, ~ my?

THE GREEK WORD FOR ~ "FORGIVEN" ~ IS PART OF THE WORD-FAMILY ~ THAT ALSO includes ~ the term for "grace."

► The word for ~ "forgiven" ~ itself means ~ to forgive, ~ on the basis of one's gracious attitude toward an individual. 11 8/15

► The Greek word for ~ "forgiven" then ~ reminds us ~ 77

>> that this ~ is a gracious forgiveness on God's part, ~~ not in any sense ~ because of the merits of the sinner.

▶ Paul echoes this thought ~ in Eph. 2:4-5.

 $\triangleright \triangleright^4$ But God, ~ being rich in mercy, ~ because of the great love with which he loved us, ~ ⁵ even when we were dead in our trespasses, ~ made us alive together with Christ ~ by grace you have been saved.

VERSE 14 TELLS US ~ WHAT THIS FORGIVENESS INVOLVED.

(NIV) HAVING CANCELED THE CHARGE OF OUR LEGAL INDEBTEDNESS, ~~ which stood against us ~ and condemned us; ~~ he has taken it away, ~ nailing it to the cross.

▶ We had broken God's holy law. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ Whether Jew or Gentile, ~ all of us.

▶▶In Romans Paul says, ~ for all ~ have sinned ~ and fall short of the glory of God.

▶▶And Paul shows us here in Colossians ~ that there was a record of the charges against us.

▶▶This record ~ was like a handwritten ledger ~ of our trespasses against God's holy law.

WE COULD LOOK AT IT THIS WAY TOO.

▶ Because we broke God's holy law, ~~ we owed a debt ~~ a debt ~ that listed ~ all the rules we failed to follow.

PAUL SAYS ~ THIS LEDGER STOOD AGAINST US AND CONDEMNED US. 11 9/15

▶▶It stood as a testimony against us ~ and legally condemned us ~ in every way.

▶▶And James tells us ~ that even the slightest offense will condemn us to hell.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ James 1:10. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ For whoever keeps the entire law, ~ and yet stumbles at one point, ~ is guilty of breaking it all.

 $\triangleright \triangleright I.e.$, ~ for the person who keeps all of God's laws ~ except one ~ is as guilty as a person who has broken all of God's laws.

► We had a real problem on our hands.

AND THE PROBLEM WAS EVEN WORSE.

► Humanity ~ could not pay the debt for these offenses.

▶▶It takes a sinless human being to pay the debt.

▶ We fail ~ from the moment our mother conceives us.

 $\triangleright \triangleright As$ David puts it, ~ Indeed, ~~ I was guilty when I was born; ~~ I was sinful when my mother conceived me.

(VERSE 14) ~~ GOD, ~ HOWEVER, ~ HAS DONE SOMETHING ABOUT THE PROBLEM.

 \blacktriangleright 1^{st} , ~ he canceled the ledger.

 \blacktriangleright And 2nd, ~ he has taken it away.

 \blacktriangleright And it was all done ~ through the sacrifice of his beloved Son on the cross. $11 \frac{10}{15}$

1st, ~ HE HAS CANCELED THE CHARGES THAT WERE AGAINST US.

►► Christ's death ~ was sufficient ~ to cancel the charges against the sinner completely.

► Jesus paid our debt for us. ⇒⇒ An old hymn.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ I had a debt I could not pay, ~~ He paid the debt He did not owe, ~~ I needed someone, ~ to wash my sins away. ~ 77

And now ~ I sing a brand new song, ~ "Amazing grace" all day long, ~~ Christ Jesus paid the debt, ~~ that I could never pay.

▶ The Greek word for ~ "canceled" ~ means ~ to cause something to cease ~ by obliterating any evidence.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Wow, ~ that's quite a statement Paul is making.

▶ When a person repents ~ and turns to Jesus for salvation, ~ God the Father ~ obliterates the charges against them.

 \triangleright Through Isaiah, ~ God says in Is. 43:25, ~ I, ~ I am he ~ who blots out your transgressions for my own sake, ~~ and I will not remember your sins.

(VERSE 14) ~~ 2nd, ~ GOD HAS TAKEN THE LEDGER AWAY.

▶▶I.e., ~ this ledger that stood as a testimony against us ~ and legally condemned us ~ in every way.

▶▶This ledger formed a barrier between God and humanity.

⇒⇒Through Jesus' sacrifice on the cross, ~ God has removed it from its position as a barrier between Himself and sinners. 11/15

▶ The tense of the Greek verb for ~ "he has taken" ~ implies ~ not only the historic act of Christ's sacrifice ~~ but its permanent effects.

►►IOW, ~ It is still so! => Been permanently removed.

STRETCH YOUR MEMORIES HERE.

▶▶I believe ~ what Paul is saying here, ~ is the same as the objective aspect of reconciliation, ~ which we discussed back in 1:20.

▶ The ongoing result of Jesus' sacrifice ~ is that ~ there remains ~ no obstacle ~ 77

>>> in the way of a person having peace and a relationship with God.

▶►All may come to the Father through Jesus, ~ be reconciled to him ~ and be at peace with him now and for eternity.

►►All people need to do, ~ and this is the subjective side of reconciliation, ~ 77

DDall people need to do is accept the reconciliation ~ that Jesus has achieved.

▶▶This barrier that God removed, ~ shall never be placed between him and humanity again.

▶ The only thing now ~ that can hinder a person's salvation ~ is the person himself.

► God has made it possible ~ for all to come.

 $\triangleright \triangleright Jn. 3:16-17$, ~~ For God so loved the world, ~ that he gave his only Son, ~ that whoever believes in him ~ should not perish ~ but have eternal life. ~~ For God did not send his Son into the world ~ to condemn the world, ~ but ~ in order that the world ~ might be saved through him. 11/15 ▷▷And it is God's desire ~ that all be saved. ⇒⇒ Ezek. 33:11.

 \Rightarrow \Rightarrow Say to them, ~ As I live, ~ declares the Lord God, ~~ I have no pleasure in the death of the wicked, ~~ but that the wicked turn from his way and live.

(VS. 14) ~~ THE PHRASE ~ NAILING IT TO THE CROSS ~ INDICATES ~ THE MEANS ~ 77

▶▶ by which Jesus ~ obliterated believers' sins ~ and removed the barrier between God and man.

▶▶Jesus nailed the ledger to the cross ~ and it perished with him.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Jesus rose from the dead, ~ but the ledger stayed dead.

►►Onlookers at the cross ~ saw the superscription bearing Jesus' name ~ and the alleged charge against Him.

▶ Believers are invited ~ to see their sins nailed there, ~ a debt nevermore to be assessed against them, ~ according to Paul here.

▶▶Furthermore, ~ a person can look and see that the sin barrier is removed ~ and through Jesus, ~ access to God is available.

AND NOW THE SEVENTH AND FINAL ASSERTION OF PAUL'S REBUTTAL.

VERSE 15 (NIV).

► And having disarmed the powers and authorities, ~ he made a public spectacle of them, ~ triumphing over them ~ by the cross.

▶▶I.e., ~ Jesus disarmed the spiritual forces of evil. ↓↓ 13/15

► Jesus not only paid the penalty to atone for sin, ~ 77

 \triangleright but he also won a decisive victory ~ over Satan and all the host of supernatural beings who are in league with him.

▶ The author of Hebrews tells us ~ that Jesus took on flesh ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ so that ~ through his death ~ he might destroy ~ the one holding the power of death ~~ that is, ~ the devil.

 \blacktriangleright And in his first epistle, ~ John tells us ~ The reason the Son of God appeared ~ was to destroy ~ the works of the devil.

JESUS DISARMED THE SPIRITUAL FORCES OF DARKNESS.

▶ He shamed them publicly ~ by his victory over them on the cross.

THE PICTURE COMES FROM A COMMON ROMAN MILITARY PRACTICE.

▶ When a general won a victory, ~~ a triumphal procession made its way through the streets, ~~ with the successful general leading the way.

▶▶His army followed, ~ singing songs of conquest ~ and reveling in their victory.

▶ Bringing up the rear ~ would be the defeated king and his warriors, ~ subjected to public ridicule ~ and paraded for all to see.

ON THE CROSS, ~~ JESUS WON A DECISIVE VICTORY, ~ 77

>> making clear to the universe ~ that Satan is a vanquished foe. $11 \frac{14}{15}$

▶▶This does not mean that we will not have conflict.

▶ Peter tells that ~ the devil prowls around like a roaring lion, ~ seeking someone to devour.

▶ The devil has been defeated, ~~ but he has not yet conceded defeat.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ He has been overthrown, ~~ but he has not yet been fully eliminated.

Satan continues to harass us.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ But we don't have to buckle under his attacks.

▶ He has no power over believers, ~ unless we give it to him.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Paul exhorts us in Ephesians ~ to not give the devil a foothold.

 \rightarrow \rightarrow We do so ~ when we sin.

► And James tells us, ~ in James 4:7, ~ Submit yourselves therefore to God. ~~ Resist the devil, ~~ and he will flee from you.

Eventually, ~ Satan and all his demons ~ will be thrown into the lake of fire.

CONCLUSION.

AND THAT BRINGS US TO THE END OF PAUL'S SECOND EXHORTATION AND REBUTTAL.
