THIS PARAGRAPH ~ CAN BE OUTLINED ~ LIKE THIS.

►► And we see a familiar pattern.

 $\triangleright \triangleright \vdash Exhortations$ , ~ in this case 3, ~ with expansions.

 $\blacktriangleright$  The 1<sup>st</sup> exhortation ~ is in verse ~ 5a.

 $\triangleright$  Put to death ~ therefore ~ what is earthly ~ in you.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Paul follows that ~ with examples ~ of what is earthly ~ in us.

→→Verse ~ 5b, ~~ sexual immorality, ~~ impurity, ~~ passion, ~~ evil desire, ~~ and covetousness, ~ which is idolatry.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ In verses 6-7, ~ he gives ~ two reasons ~ for the exhortation ~ to put to death ~ what is earthly in us. 11 2/16

 $\rightarrow$   $\rightarrow$  1<sup>st</sup>, ~ <sup>6</sup> On account of these ~ the wrath of God is coming.

 $\rightarrow$  And 2<sup>nd</sup>, ~ <sup>7</sup> In these ~ you too once walked, ~ when ~ you were living in them.

 $\rightarrow$  J.e., ~ "you ~ used to practice these things ~ in the life you once lived."

► The  $2^{nd}$  exhortation is in verse 8a.  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow 1^{st}$  exhortation ~ using different words.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ But now ~ you must put them ~ [i.e., ~ what is earthly in us] ~ all ~ away.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  Then ~ Paul gives ~ more examples ~ of what ~ is earthly ~ in us.

→→Verse ~ 8b, ~~ anger, ~~ wrath, ~~ malice, ~~ slander, ~~ and obscene talk from your mouth.

► The  $3^{rd}$  exhortation ~ is in ~ verse 9a.  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$  Do not ~ lie ~ to one another.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Lying, ~ of course, ~ belongs to our earthly nature.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ In verse 9b-11, ~ he lists ~ two reasons ~ for ~ the 3<sup>rd</sup> ~ exhortation.

 $\rightarrow \rightarrow 1^{st}$ , ~ seeing that ~ you have put off ~ the old self ~ with its practices ~~ and have put on the new self, ~ which is being renewed ~ in knowledge ~ after the image ~ of its creator.

 $\rightarrow$  And 2<sup>nd</sup>, ~ Here ~ there is not ~ Greek and Jew, ~ circumcised and uncircumcised, ~ barbarian, ~ Scythian, ~ slave, ~ free; ~~ but Christ is all, ~ and in all.

TODAY, ~ WE'RE GOING TO JUST COVER ~ THE 1<sup>ST</sup> EXHORTATION, ~ THE EXAMPLES that go with it, ~ and the reasons for it. ~~ 3:5-7. ⇒ Rather long introduction, ~ but purposeful. 11 3/16 ALL ~ OF THE SINFUL ~ CHARACTERISTICS, ~ THOUGHTS, ~ SPEECH, ~ ATTITUDES, ~ and ~ patterns of behavior ~ of ~ our sinful nature.

► Verse 5a.

 $\triangleright$  Put to death ~ therefore ~ what is earthly ~ in you.

► The phrase, ~ what is earthly in you," ~ is talking about ~ what belongs ~ to our earthly ~ or sinful ~ nature.

► Some translations use the phrase ~ "the members of your earthly body" ~ 77

>>> or something similar ~~ instead of ~ "what is earthly in you."

► Greek text ~ simply reads, ~ "Put to death ~ therefore ~ the members ~ on ~ the earth."

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  Definitely calls ~ for interpretation ~ on the part of translators.

▶ The phrase, ~ "what is earthly in you" ~ is obviously ~ figurative.

>>Paul ~ is not ~ calling for us ~ to do ourselves ~ or others ~ bodily harm ~ in this verse.

**\blacktriangleright** It most likely then ~ refers, ~ as we noted, ~ to what belongs ~ to our earthly ~ or ~ sinful ~ nature.

▶▶It can ~ be translated ~ this way: ~~ 77

DD"Put to death, ~ therefore, ~ whatever belongs ~ to ~ your sinful nature." 11 4/16

 $\triangleright$  This translation ~ helps us better understand ~ what Paul ~ is saying.

BUT WHAT SPECIFICALLY ~ DOES HE MEAN ~ BY THE PHRASE, ~ "whatever belongs ~ to ~ your sinful nature"?

▶ Based ~ on the wider context ~ of verses 5-11, ~ I think we can say that ~ 77

Paul ~ is talking about ~ the sinful ~ characteristics, ~ thoughts, ~ speech, ~ attitudes,
~ and ~ patterns of behavior ~ that belong ~ to ~ our sin nature.

THESE ~ WE ARE ~ TO PUT TO DEATH.

▶ The phrase, ~ "Put to death," ~ is also obviously figurative.

>> Again, ~ Paul is not calling for us ~ to do ourselves ~ bodily harm.

NOW, ~ THE VERB PAUL USES HERE ~ FOR ~ "PUT TO DEATH" ~ IS VERY STRONG.

► And the translation ~ "Put to death" ~ is ~ an excellent translation.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Because ~ it brings out the force ~ Paul is getting at here.

 $\triangleright \triangleright Grab$  our attention.

▶ The idea here ~ is to ~ eliminate from our lives ~ or ~ to break with ~ all ~ JJ

 $\triangleright$ of the sinful ~ characteristics, ~ thoughts, ~ speech, ~ attitudes, ~ and ~ patterns of behavior ~ that belong ~ to ~ our sin nature.

**b**But ~ there is an implication ~ in this verb ~ that we must not miss. 115/16

► The fuller idea is this.

 $\triangleright \triangleright c$ ompletely break ~ with all ~ of the things ~ that belong ~ to your sinful nature.

 $\triangleright$  With the implication ~ of extreme measures taken ~ to guarantee ~ such ~ a break.

IOW, ~ THIS MANDATED BREAK ~ WITH ALL ~ OF THE SINFUL ~ 77

Characteristics, ~ thoughts, ~ speech, ~ attitudes, ~ and ~ patterns of behavior ~ of our sinful nature ~ 77

DD is to be ~ radical, ~ decisive, ~ and ~ final.

OUR BREAK ~ WITH WHAT BELONGS ~ TO OUR SIN NATURE ~ IS ~ TO BE ~ RADICAL.

▶ Paul's words~ are very similar to ~ and carry the same idea as ~ Jesus' words ~ in Matthew, ~ Chapter 5, ~ verses 29 ← 30.

▷▷If your right eye ~ causes you to sin, ~ tear it out ~ and throw it away. ~~ For ~ it is better ~ that you lose ~ one of your members ~ than ~ that your whole body ~ be thrown ~ into hell. ~~ And ~ if your right hand ~ causes you to sin, ~ cut it off ~ and throw it away. ~~ For ~ it is better ~ that you lose ~ one of your members ~ than ~ that your whole body ~ go into hell.

▶ Jesus, ~ of course, ~ like Paul ~ is speaking figuratively.

▶▶But again, ~ like Paul's language, ~ Jesus' strong choice of words ~ grabs our attention.

► Shows ~ how important this is.  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$  How ~ vital it is to do this.

 $\triangleright \triangleright Jesus & Paul \sim want us \sim to take this \sim very, \sim very seriously. 11 6/16$ 

▶▶And it shows us ~ that ~ we are to take ~ extreme measures ~ against ~ all ~ 77

DD of the sinful ~ characteristics, ~ thoughts, ~ speech, ~ attitudes, ~ and ~ patterns of behavior ~ that belong ~ to our sin nature.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  Spoil fun?  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$  No,  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$  For our good.

OUR BREAK ~ WITH WHAT BELONGS ~ TO OUR SIN NATURE ~ IS ~ TO BE ~ DECISIVE.

Must not waver.

▶ We must not ~ be like Lot's wife, ~ who looked back ~ to Sodom.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ By looking back ~ she demonstrated ~ her affections ~ for her life ~ in Sodom.

▶ We should mention ~ Elijah's challenge ~ to the Israelites.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ It fits ~ with Paul's exhortation here.  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow 1$  Kings, ~ Chapter 18, ~ verse 21a (CSB).

→→Then Elijah approached all the people and said, ~~ "How long ~ will you waver ~ between two opinions? ~~ If the Lord is God, ~ follow him. ~~ But if Baal, ~ follow him."

▶▶Joshua's challenge ~~ fits here as well ~ as we consider ~ that our break ~ with what belongs to our old nature ~ is ~ to be ~ decisive.

⊳⊳Joshua, ~ chapter 24, ~ verse 15.

And ~ if it is evil in your eyes ~ to serve the Lord, ~ choose this day ~ whom you will serve, ~ whether the gods your fathers served ~ in the region beyond the River, ~ or the gods of the Amorites ~ in whose land you dwell.  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$  But as for me and my house, ~ we ~ will serve the Lord. 117/16

AND ~ OUR BREAK ~ WITH WHAT BELONGS ~ TO OUR SIN NATURE ~ IS ~ TO BE ~ final.

▶▶1 Peter, ~ chapter 4, ~ verse 3.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  For the time that is past ~ suffices ~ for doing ~ what the Gentiles [unbelievers] ~ want to do.

▶ Peter declares, ~ "Don't ~ involve yourselves ~ in the things you did ~ in your unsaved life."

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  "You have had ~ enough ~ in your past life ~ of the evil things ~ that non-Christians ~ desire."

▶▶Driving the point home ~ that ~ the past ~ is the past.

 $\triangleright \triangleright \mathsf{Over} \sim \mathsf{and} \mathsf{ done} \mathsf{ with}.$ 

▶ There must be ~ no going back ~ to the things we were involved in ~ before ~ we came to Christ.

▶ There must be ~ a complete break ~ with every part ~ of our unsaved lifestyle.

►► After the exodus, ~ the Israelites ~ were often tempted ~ to return to Egypt

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  So we might be tempted ~ to return ~ to our unsaved lifestyle.

▶▶However, ~ Peter shows us ~ that ~ that ~ is not ~ a valid option for us.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  We are not to look back ~ but rather ~ forward.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Remember what Hebrews, ~ chapter 12, verses 1 - 2a ~ says. 11 8/16

→→Therefore, ~ since we are surrounded ~ by so great a cloud of witnesses, ~ let us also lay aside ~ 77

 $\rightarrow$   $\rightarrow$  every weight ~ [or, ~ hindrance], ~ and sin ~ which clings so closely ~ [i.e., ~ sin that so easily ensnares us], ~ 77

rightarrow rightarrow with endurance ~ the race ~ that is set before us, ~ looking to ~ [or, ~ keeping eyes on] ~ Jesus, ~ the founder and perfecter ~ of our faith.

▶▶ is ~ to be ~ radical, ~ decisive, ~ and ~ final.

IN ROMANS, ~ CHAPTER 13, ~ verse 14b, ~ PAUL WRITES, ~ 77

>> "and ~ make no provision ~ for the flesh, ~ to gratify ~ its desires."

▶ Paul counsels us ~ against ~ allowing any opportunity whatsoever ~ for gratifying ~ the evil desires ~ of our sinful nature.  $(1 \sim 2 \sim 3)$ 

New life in Christ ~ stands ~ diametrically opposed ~ to the old life, ~ which was controlled ~ by earthly passions.  $(1 \sim 2 \sim 3)$ 

▶ The believers' current behavior ~ should be ~ the polar opposite ~ of what ~ it once was.

▶ While the appetites of sin ~ will be with us throughout this life, ~~ we are to deny them ~ any opportunity ~ of expression.  $(1 \sim 2 \sim 3)$ 

We are not ~ even to consider ~ the possibility ~ of allowing them ~ to fulfill ~ their evil intentions through us.  $(1 \sim 2 \sim 3)$  139/16

IN VERSE 5b, ~ PAUL GIVES US ~ FIVE EXAMPLES OF WHAT BELONGS TO OUR SIN nature ~ 77

THAT WE ARE TO ~ RADICALLY, ~ DECISIVELY, ~ AND FINALLY ~ BREAK WITH.

Sexual immorality, ~~ impurity, ~~ passion, ~~ evil desire, ~~ and ~~ covetousness, ~ which is idolatry.

THE FIRST 4 EXAMPLES ~ PRIMARILY CONCERN ~ SEXUALLY RELATED SINS.

▶▶I don't think ~ we need to go over each one.

▶ We can just look ~ at the big picture ~ and get the point.

▶ The Bible ~ strictly forbids ~ any sexual activity ~ outside the marriage bond between a man and a woman.

1 Thessalonians, ~ chapter 4, ~ verses 3 - 8.

► Comment as we go.

 $\triangleright \triangleright^3$  For this is the will of God, ~ your sanctification ~ [i.e., ~ for you to be holy]: ~~ that you abstain from sexual immorality; ~~ <sup>4</sup> that each one of you ~ know how to control his own body ~ in holiness and honor, ~ 77

 $PP^5$  not in the passion of lust like the Gentiles who do not know God ~ [i.e., ~ Don't let your sexual desires control you like the people who don't know God]; ~ 77

 $DD^6$  that no one transgress and wrong his brother in this matter ~ [idea here seems to be: ~~ one must not ~ transgress against and take advantage of ~ a brother or sister ~ in this manner], ~ 77 11 10/16

Dbecause the Lord is an avenger in all these things ~ [i.e., ~ The Lord will punish all those who commit such sins], ~~ as we told you beforehand and solemnly warned you. ~ 77

 $DD^7$  For God has not called us for impurity, but in holiness ~ [i.e., ~ For God did not call us to be impure, ~ but to live a holy life]. ~ 77

 $D^{8}$  Therefore whoever disregards this, ~ disregards not man ~ but God, ~ who gives his Holy Spirit to you.

→→I.e., ~ anyone ~ who rejects this instruction ~ does not reject a human being, ~~ 77

→→but ~ is rejecting God, ~ who gives his Holy Spirit to you.

THE BIBLE ~ STRICTLY FORBIDS ~ ANY SEXUAL ACTIVITY ~ OUTSIDE THE MARRIAGE bond between a man and a woman.

▶ This would include thoughts ~ as well as actions.

Recall Jesus' words in Matthew, chapter 5, verses 27 = 28.

 $\triangleright$  You have heard ~ that it was said, ~ 'You shall not ~ commit adultery.' ~~ But I say to you ~ that everyone ~ who looks at a woman ~ with lustful intent ~ has already committed adultery with her ~ in his heart.

THIS, ~ OF COURSE, ~ FLIES IN THE FACE ~ OF THE SOCIETY ~ IN WHICH WE LIVE.

Sexual immorality ~ is running rampant ~ in this society.

 $\triangleright \triangleright And \sim it's$  getting worse.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  The world ~ approves of ~ and glorifies ~ any and all ~ sexual immorality. 11/16

▶ But ~ we ~ are not to follow the world.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  We ~ are to follow God ~~ and stay faithful ~ to him ~ and ~ to his word.

▷▷Apostles: ~~ "We must obey God ~ rather than men."

►► And when we do live ~ as God wants us to, ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  and we don't engage ~ in the sexual immorality of this world, ~ people will look at us ~ as odd.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  And that's ok.

 $\rightarrow$   $\rightarrow$  Christians ~ are supposed to look odd ~ to the people of the world.  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$  Drummer.

AND NOW THE 5th EXAMPLE ~ OF WHAT BELONGS ~ TO OUR SIN NATURE ~ 77

THAT WE MUST ~ RADICALLY, ~ DECISIVELY, ~ AND FINALLY ~ BREAK WITH.

>> At the end ~ of verse 5b, ~~ covetousness, ~ which is ~ idolatry.

► We are ~ to eliminate greed ~ from our lives ~ completely.

NOTICE THAT PAUL ~ SAW COVETOUSNESS ~ AS BEING ~ TANTAMOUNT ~ to idolatry.

▶▶Idolatry ~ is not limited ~ to the worship of false images, ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  but it is placing ~ anything or anyone ~ before God ~ as the object of ~ allegiance and devotion. 11 12/16

 $\triangleright \triangleright A$  greedy person's insatiable desire ~ to acquire more and more, ~ 77

 $\rightarrow$   $\rightarrow$  whatever the object, ~ and regardless of need, ~ causes them ~ 77

 $\rightarrow$   $\rightarrow$  to put money and earthly things ~ before God ~ as the object ~ of their ~ allegiance and devotion.

 $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright$  Money and earthly things ~ become the false gods ~ that a covetous person ~ worships and serves ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  in the place ~ of the true God.

▶▶In Matthew, ~ chapter 6, ~ verse 24, ~ Jesus said, ~ 77

DD"No one ~ can serve two masters, ~~ for either ~ he will hate the one ~ and love the other, ~ 77

 $\rightarrow$   $\rightarrow$  or ~ he will ~ be devoted to the one ~ and despise the other. ~~ You cannot ~ serve God and money."

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ It is possible ~ to devote oneself wholly ~ to the service ~ of God.

 $\rightarrow$  And it is possible ~ to devote oneself wholly ~ to the service ~ of acquiring money and earthly things.

 $\rightarrow$  But it is not possible ~ to devote oneself wholly ~ to the service ~ of both.

 $\triangleright \triangleright \mathsf{O}\mathsf{f}$  course, ~ many people ~ do ~ try to do both, ~ 77

 $\rightarrow$   $\rightarrow$  but ultimately ~ one ~ will eventually win out ~ and exercise control ~ over ~ the person's life. 13/16

RADICALLY, ~ DECISIVELY, ~ AND FINALLY ~ BREAK ~ WITH WHAT BELONGS ~ TO OUR sin nature.

FIRST, ~ VERSE 6.

▶▶On account of these ~ the wrath of God is coming.

▶▶I.e., ~ there is to be a radical, ~ decisive, ~ and final ~ break ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  with all ~ of the sinful ~ characteristics, ~ thoughts, ~ speech, ~ attitudes, ~ and ~ patterns of behavior ~ that belong ~ to our sinful nature ~ 77

→ → because ~ of the negative consequences ~ continuing in a sinful lifestyle ~ will bring.

▶▶Now, ~ Paul was writing to believers, ~ so I'm not sure why ~ he used this wording.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ He tells us in 1 Thess. ~ that Jesus ~ delivers believers ~ from the wrath to come.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ It very much could be ~ he said it this way ~ to grab our attention.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  And, ~ as a believer reading this, ~ it should.

 $\rightarrow$  It should stop us ~ dead in our tracks ~ and cause us ~ to think.

▶▶I think Paul is showing us, ~ in a very dramatic way, ~ that sinning brings negative consequences.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Paul shuts down ~ any arguments ~ to the contrary. 11 14/16

 $\triangleright$  Here he's refuting arguments ~ that justify ~ any sinful behavior, ~ 77

→ → that say ~ believers can take sin lightly, ~ or ~ that we can continue ~ in the sinful lifestyle ~ of our unsaved life.

►►A sinful lifestyle ~ is incompatible ~ with ~ our new life in Christ.

▶▶Sinful behavior ~ brings ~ the wrath of God ~ on unbelievers.

▶▶And for believers, ~ it breaks fellowship with God ~ and brings His discipline down on us.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Isaiah, ~ chapter. 59, ~ verse 2, ~ "but your iniquities ~ have made a separation ~ between you and your God, ~~ and your sins ~ have hidden his face from you ~ so that ~ he does not hear."

 $\triangleright$ Hebrews, ~ chapter 12, ~ verses 5b - 6, ~ "My son, ~ do not regard lightly ~ the discipline of the Lord, ~~ nor be weary ~ when reproved by him. ~~ For the Lord disciplines ~ the one he loves, ~~ and chastises ~ every son ~ whom he receives."

▶▶1 more thing, ~~ if sinful behavior brings down the wrath of God upon unbelievers, ~ 77

 $\triangleright$  why would we, ~ believers, ~ ever think ~ that sinful behavior ~ is compatible ~ with our new life in Christ, ~~ 77

 $\rightarrow$   $\rightarrow$  or ~ that we could justify ~ any sinful behavior, ~ 77

 $\rightarrow$   $\rightarrow$  or ~ that we could take sin lightly, ~~ or ~ that we could continue ~ in our unsaved lifestyle.

NOW, ~ VERSE 7 AND THE SECOND REASON ~ WHY ~ WE MUST ~ 77

>radically, ~ decisively, ~ and finally ~ break ~ with what belongs to our sin nature. 11 15/16

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ In these ~ you too once walked, ~ when you were living in them.

▶►I.e., ~ there is to be ~ a radical, ~ decisive, ~ and final ~ break ~ with all ~ of the sinful ~ characteristics, ~ thoughts, ~ speech, ~ attitudes, ~ and patterns of behavior ~ 77

D that belong ~ to our sinful nature ~~ because ~~ these things ~ belong ~ in the past.

▶ They have ~ absolutely ~ no place ~ in our life ~ as new creations.

▶ The two verbs, ~ "walked" ~ and ~ "were living" ~ both past tenses, ~ emphasize ~ 77

 $\nearrow$  that ~ what belongs to our sin nature ~ belonged to ~ and characterized ~ our unsaved past ~ 77

 $\rightarrow$  and ~ that the believer ~ should ~ be done with them.

▶▶In his first epistle, ~ Peter tells us ~ that ~ we have had enough in the past ~ of the evil things ~ that unbelievers desire.
