## INTRODUCTION.

WE ARE CONTINUING OUR EXAMINATION ~ OF COL. ~ 3: ~~ 12-17.

► Today, ~ we'll take up ~ the next two examples ~ of what we are to embrace and practice ~ as new creations in Christ.

>>Stated differently, ~ the next two ~ illustrations ~ of what godliness looks like.

▶▶And these are found in verse 15.

 $\triangleright$ In verse 15a, ~ Paul writes, ~ And let the peace of Christ ~ rule ~ in your hearts.

>>And in verse 15c, ~ he says, ~ And be thankful.

▶▶Again keep in mind, ~ while we are ~ to embrace and practice godliness ~ in private ~ and ~ in relation to unbelievers and believers alike, ~ 77

Din this paragraph ~ Paul ~ is primarily talking about ~ our relationships ~ with other believers ~ in our local church.

OK, ~ LET'S UNPACK THESE NEXT TWO EXAMPLES ~ OF THE TYPE OF THINGS ~ 77

▶▶that are to replace ~ ungodliness ~ in every area ~ of our lives.

## <u>FIRST, ~ VERSE 15a.</u>

And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts. 11 1/14

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▶▶Unavoidable ⇒⇒ Grasp ⇒⇒ Help you follow along.
▶▶First of all, ~ Older translations ~~ "peace of God."
   ▷ "peace of Christ" ~ better translation.
       →→Think you'll see why.
▶▶2<sup>nd</sup>, ~ phrase: ~~ "peace of Christ."
   >>Lit. trans.
   \triangleright \triangleright Sub. gen . . . .
       → The peace ~ brought by Christ, ~ or ~ the peace ~ that comes ~ from Christ.
   >>Read verse.
       → And let the peace ~ brought by Christ ~ rule in your hearts.
   \triangleright \triangleright As we go through the message, \sim I'II explain what this peace is.
▶▶3<sup>rd</sup>, ~ need to talk about "let."
   >> Familiar to some. 11 2/14
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>> The form of the Greek verb.
    >> This is easily confused in English ~ with a permissive idea.
        ⇒⇒Someone might think ~ that ~ this is a suggestion ~ or ~ something optional.
           →→For instance, ~ they might think it means, ~ "If you feel like it, ~ let the peace
        that comes from Christ ~ rule in your hearts."
     \triangleright The Greek is stronger.
        ⇒⇒It indicates ~ that ~ this is ~ not something optional.
           \rightarrow Tt's not a suggestion ~ or a recommendation.
               \hookrightarrow Command.
    >> Trans.: ~~ And the peace ~ brought by Christ ~ must ~ rule in your hearts.
 ▶▶Ok, ~ those are our three initial comments.
    >> And this sentence ~ or paraphrase, ~ will stand ~ as our starting point, ~ upon which ~
     we'll build.
OK, ~ THE PEACE ~ BROUGHT BY CHRIST ~ MUST ~ RULE IN YOUR HEARTS.
 ▶ But ~ what is this peace?
     \triangleright Paul does not define .... \Rightarrow \Rightarrow So, ~ thinking caps on. 11 3/14
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▶▶In Phil. ~ 4: ~~ 6b-7 . . . . *
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- \* $\triangleright$ Simply put, ~ when we continually, ~ seriously, ~ specifically, ~ and with a thankful attitude, ~ pray ~ about every situation in which we find ourselves, ~ 77
  - $\rightarrow$  the promised result  $\sim$  is that the Lord will give us  $\sim$  an inner peace  $\sim$  an internal calmness,  $\sim$  right in the midst  $\sim$  of the situation.  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$  Subjective.
- ▶▶But I don't think ~ this is what Paul has ~ primarily ~ in mind ~ in Col. ~ 3: ~ 15a.
- ▶▶As we'll see, ~ here he is talking about ~ an objective peace.
  - >>Specifically, ~ the peace we have with God ~ through Christ.
    - →→Through Jesus' sacrifice on the cross, ~ there is a relationship of concord ~ between believers and God.
      - → Jesus ~ brought us peace ~ with God
  - DDAnd I believe that ~ this ~ is the peace ~ that Paul has in mind here. ⇒⇒ Objective.
- MY SUPPOSITION ~ IS BASED ON ~ THE IMMEDIATE AND WIDER CONTEXTS OF COL.
  - ▶►Keep in mind ~ that in the immediate context of this paragraph, ~ Paul is dealing ~ with our relationships with each other ~ in our local church.
    - >> So peace here ~ has to do ~ with our relationships ~ with our fellow believers.
    - >> Most likely then, ~ pointing us ~ toward having peaceful relationships with each other.
      - → Objective. 11 4/14

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>> And the model for this, ~ that Paul is presenting here, ~ is then ~ objective as well.
      \rightarrow I.e., ~ the peace we have with God.
   >>IOW, ~ part of the point Paul is making, ~ I would suggest, ~ 77
       →is that ~ our relationships with each other ~ is to mirror ~ our peaceful relationship
      with God.
▶▶2^{nd}, ~ in the wider context, ~ Paul already introduced this objective peace. \Rightarrow \Rightarrow 1: ~ 20.
   >>Objective peace is in view, ~ specifically ~ the peace believers have with God.
   >> Believers in Jesus Christ ~ are no longer ~ at war with God.
      → We are no longer ~ alienated and hostile in mind toward him. ⇒ Not enemies.
         → Through Jesus' sacrifice ~ believers and God ~ are now at peace.
   >>In Rom. ~ 5: ~ 1, ~ Paul says, ~ Therefore, ~ since we have been justified by faith, ~~
   we have peace with God ~~ through ~ our Lord Jesus Christ.
      ⇒ I.e., ~ we have peace with God ~ because, ~ and only because, ~ of what Jesus
      Christ our Lord ~ has done for us.
   >> And I would argue that ~ since Paul did not indicate ~ a different peace, ~ i.e., ~
   subjective peace, ~ 77
       → the wider context ~ guides and restricts ~ our interpretation of ~ 3: ~ 15a.
          \rightarrow Objective peace we have with God is ~ primarily ~ in view ~ in 3:15a. 11 5/14
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 $\blacktriangleright$  And  $\sim$  if we widen our scope to Isaiah,  $\sim$  he says something very interesting,  $\sim$  that factors into my thinking here.

 $\triangleright \triangleright \text{Is.} \sim 53: \sim 5a \text{ (NIV)}, \Rightarrow \Rightarrow \text{ But he was pierced } \sim \text{ for our transgressions, } \sim \sim \text{ he was crushed } \sim \text{ for our iniquities; } \sim \sim \text{ the punishment that brought us peace [i.e., } \sim \text{ peace with } God] \sim \text{ was } \sim \text{ on him.}$ 

⇒⇒Remember, ~ in Col. ~ 3: ~ 15a, ~ it's the peace ~ that Jesus brought.

▶▶Now coming back to Col. ~ 3: ~ 15a, ~ we can build on our starting point.

>>Paul saying, ~ the peace we have with God ~ through Christ ~ must rule in your hearts.

NOW, ~ BEFORE MOVING ON, ~ WE NEED TO SOUND ~ TWO CAUTIONARY NOTES.

 $\triangleright \triangleright 1^{st}$ , ~ this peace we have with God ~ can easily be taken for granted ~ by those who come to know personally ~ the forgiving grace of God.

>> We can quickly grow accustomed ~ to our privileged status.

 $\triangleright$  That ~ this type of thing can happen, ~ we see in Moses' warning to the Israelites ~ on the eve of possessing the land.  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$  Deut. ~ 6: ~~ 10-12 . . . .

>> This peace we have with God ~ can easily ~ be taken for granted.

 $\triangleright \triangleright 2^{nd}$  cautionary note.  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$  The danger of thinking  $\sim$  we earned or deserved  $\sim$  this peace.

⊳⊳Deut. ~ 8: ~~ 17-18a.

 $\rightarrow$  The peace we have with God ~ was achieved by Jesus ~~ and given to us ~ by the grace of God. 11 6/14

▶ Because of these two dangers. ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$  we must ~ constantly remind ourselves ~ of God's anger and judgment ~ upon all ~ that is unholy.

>> We must never forget ~ that we, ~ were once ~ like all unbelievers.

 $\rightarrow \rightarrow$  I.e., ~ separated from Christ, ~ without hope, ~ lacking a relationship with God, ~ and subject to his wrath.

>> And we must always ~ remember Paul's wonderful words in Eph. ~ 2: ~ 4-6 . . . .

 $\triangleright \triangleright A$  healthy memory of these things, ~~ will lead us ~ to treasure this peace we have with God ~ for the precious gift ~ that it is.

 $\rightarrow$  Then we won't  $\sim$  take our peace with God for granted  $\sim$  or think we earned or deserved it.

NOW LET'S RETURN ~ TO ~ 3: ~ 15a.

- ▶ Paul says, ~ the peace we have with God ~ through Christ ~ must ~ rule in your hearts.
- ▶▶And again, ~ this is in relation to other believers in our local fellowship.
- ▶▶The sense of "rule" here is ~ "to be the factor ~ determining an outcome."
- ▶▶Basically, ~ if I understand it correctly ~ Paul is saying here that, ~ specifically, ~ 77

 $\triangleright$ the peaceful relationship believers have with God ~ is to be ~ the determinative factor ~ in our decision-making ~ in dealing with our fellow believers. 11 7/14

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\trianglerightE.g., ~ the peace achieved by Jesus' sacrifice ~ should be the decisive factor ~~ 77
        →in determining ~ what course should be followed ~ in difficult decisions for our
       church ~ 77
           → and ~ how the tensions of community relations ~ may be resolved.
 ▶▶And more generally, ~ I would suggest, ~ Paul is saying ~ that ~ 77
    bthe peaceful relationship we have with God ~ is to be reflected ~ in our relationship
    with other believers.
       →→IOW, ~ our peace with God ~ is to be ~ a primary influence ~ in our relationships ~
       with other believers.
PERHAPS, ~ WE CAN SUM IT UP THIS WAY.
 ▶▶This peace we have with God ~ through Christ ~ is to govern ~ our relationships ~ with our
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brothers and sisters in Christ.  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$  Example of what we are to embrace & practice.

ROM. ~ 14: ~ 19 ~ GIVES US THE LOGICAL CONCLUSION TO ALL OF THIS.

▶▶The Greek verb for ~ "pursue" ~ indicates more ~ than a slight interest.

eagerly, ~ earnestly endeavor to acquire." 11 8/14

after, ~~ to pursue."

▶▶So then ~ let us pursue ~ what makes ~ for peace ~ and for mutual upbuilding.

>> The verb means ~ "to run swiftly ~ in order to catch some person or thing, ~~ to run

>>Metaphorically, ~ the way Paul uses it here in Romans, ~ it means ~ "to seek after

- ▶▶It is the responsibility ~ of those at peace with God ~ to make every effort ~ 77
  - DD to do what ~ promotes, ~ strengthens, ~ and maintains peace, ~ with other believers.
    - $\rightarrow$  Paul says in Rom. ~ 12: ~ 18, ~~ If possible, ~ so far as it depends on you, ~ live peaceably with all.
- ▶▶We are to do all that we can ~ to live in peace with our fellow believers.
- NOW,  $\sim$  IT IS  $\sim$  EXTREMELY IMPORTANT  $\sim$  TO UNDERSTAND  $\sim$  THAT PAUL  $\sim$  IS NOT  $\sim$  calling us to peace at all costs.
  - ▶ E.g., ~ we are not to sacrifice doctrinal purity and biblical truth ~ in order ~ to have peace in our church.
  - ▶▶Furthermore, ~ we are not to tolerate sin ~ in order ~ to have peace in the church.
    - $\triangleright$ In 1 Cor. 5, ~ Paul, ~ who insists ~ that we be at peace with our fellow believers, ~ 77
      - was very harsh ~ with the Corinthian church ~ because ~ they were tolerating sin in their fellowship.
      - $\rightarrow$  He tells them, ~ And you are arrogant! ~~ Ought you not ~ rather to mourn? ~~ Let him who has done this ~ be removed ~ from among you.
      - →→A few verses later, ~ he says, ~ 77
        - $\rightarrow$  you are to deliver this man to Satan  $\sim$  for the destruction of the flesh,  $\sim$  so that  $\sim$  his spirit may be saved  $\sim$  in the day of the Lord.
      - → And he finishes up by saying, ~ Remove the evil person from among you. 11 9/14

- ▶▶ The sense of Paul's instruction  $\sim$  is <u>not</u>  $\sim$  that believers should hold  $\sim$  exactly  $\sim$  the same opinions.
  - $\triangleright \triangleright$ Or talk the same  $\sim$  or dress the same,  $\sim$  or agree on every minor point of doctrine and interpretation of Scripture.
    - $\rightarrow \rightarrow$  But ~ that we should think and act ~ in ways ~ that promote ~ harmony and agreement.
      - →→In essentials unity, ~~ in non-essentials liberty, ~~ in all things charity.
- ▶▶I would like to say ~ that I think everyone here at NHCC ~ does an excellent job ~ in thinking and acting in ways ~ that promote harmony and agreement.
  - >> And ~ that preserve and protect our unity, ~ as I've said before.
  - DDBut we must never ~ let our guard down. ⇒⇒ We must always ~ be vigilant.
    - $\rightarrow \rightarrow As$  Peter warns us in 1 Pet. 5:8, ~ "Be sober-minded; ~~ be watchful. ~~ Your adversary the devil ~ prowls around ~ like a roaring lion, ~ seeking ~ someone to devour."

<u>IN VERSE 15b, ~ PAUL TELLS US ~ WHY ~ THE PEACE WE HAVE WITH GOD ~ THROUGH</u> Christ ~ is to govern ~ our relationships ~ with our brothers and sisters in Christ.

TO WHICH INDEED YOU WERE CALLED IN ONE BODY.

▶▶Trans.: ~~ For as members ~ of one body ~ you are called ~ to live in peace. ▶▶ 10/14

 $\blacktriangleright$  I.e., ~ as members of the body of Christ, ~ the church, ~ we are <u>called</u> by <u>God</u> ~ to live in peace with each other.

▶ Paul says this in ~ Rom. ~ 12: ~ 16a as well. ⇒⇒ Live in harmony ~ with one another.

#### NEXT EXAMPLE ~ OF WHAT GODLINESS LOOKS LIKE ~ IS IN VERSE 15c.

AND BE THANKFUL.

- ▶▶Six times in this letter, ~ Paul calls on believers ~ to be ~ a thankful people.
- ▶▶We've already looked at two of them.

 $\triangleright$ In ~ 1: ~ 12, ~ Paul called us to ~ joyfully give thanks to the Father.

 $\rightarrow \rightarrow As$  noted, ~ this is a heartfelt, ~ genuine thankfulness ~~ that grows ~ out of the experience of salvation.

 $\triangleright$ And recall  $\sim$  in  $\sim$  2:  $\sim$  7,  $\sim$  abounding in thanksgiving  $\sim$  is one of the safeguards  $\sim$  that will protect us from false teaching.

 $\rightarrow \rightarrow As$  we noted, ~ the implication is that ~ believers ~ who lack a deep sense of thankfulness to God ~ are especially vulnerable ~ to false teaching.

 $\rightarrow$  However, ~ when we abound in thanksgiving to our heavenly Father ~ it's less likely ~ that we will abandon sound doctrine.

 $\blacktriangleright$  We see it here in 3:15.

And we'll see it in ~ 3: ~~ 16-17. ⇒ ⇒ And 4:2. 11 11/14

THE REPETITION ~ OF THE CALL TO BE THANKFUL PEOPLE ~ HIGHLIGHTS ~ THE importance ~ 77

▶▶of being grateful to God ~ and ~ of expressing that thanks ~ in word and deed.

#### WHY REPETITION?

- ▶► Could it be ~ that by nature ~ we hard-wired to be ~ ungrateful people?
- ▶ Speaking of the unsaved ~ in the opening chapter of Romans, ~ Paul asserts, ~ For although they knew God, ~ they did not ~ honor him as God ~ or ~ give thanks to him.
- ▶▶It is a sign of the last days. ⇒⇒ 2 Tim. ~ 3: ~ 2.

>> For people will be ~ lovers of self, ~ lovers of money, ~ proud, ~ arrogant, ~ abusive, ~ disobedient to their parents, ~ ungrateful, ~ unholy.

▶▶Israel's repeated ingratitude to the Lord.

BACK TO VERSE 15c.

- ▶ Paul commands us, ~ to be thankful. ⇒⇒ What godliness looks like. ⇒⇒ Emb. & Pract.
- ▶▶The tense of the Greek verb ~ shows this ~ to be a continual thing.

 $\triangleright$ It could be translated as ~ And always be thankful.

⇒⇒Believers ~ are to have a continual ~ attitude ~ of gratitude ~ toward the Lord.

- ▶▶For access to God in prayer. ▶▶For God's love, ~ mercy, ~ grace, ~ and goodness toward us. ▶▶For ~ who Jesus is ~ and what he has done for us. ▶▶For every one ~ of God's infallible promises. ▶▶Yes, ~ we have all of this ~ and much, ~ much, ~ more ~ to be thankful for. ▶▶When we, ~ believers, ~ continually consider all that God has done for us, ~ what he has rescued us from, ~ 77 Downat he has promised for this and the life to come, ~~ how could we not ~ joyfully and continually ~ give our heavenly Father thanks? AND ALWAYS BE THANKFUL, ~ PAUL SAYS. ▶▶But wait, ~ we are to be thankful ~ even in the hard times? ►►Yes. ▶▶In Eph.  $\sim 5$ :  $\sim 20$ ,  $\sim$  Paul writes that  $\sim$  we are to  $\sim 77$ 
  - ightharpoonup give "thanks ~ always ~ and for everything ~ to God the Father ~ in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.
  - ▶▶No matter how bad it gets for us, ~ we always have something to be thankful for ....

- ightharpoonup A lack of gratitude toward Jesus  $\sim$  shows  $\sim$  that we lack a good understanding of the gospel.
- $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright My \dots$ , ~~~ how can we <u>not</u> ~ be thankful to Jesus, ~~ for his awesome mercy, ~ love, ~ and grace ~ shown to us in the gospel?
- ▶▶How can we not ~ be 100% grateful to Jesus ~ for taking our place on the cross?
- ►►How can we  $\underline{not}$  ~ be thankful to the Lord ~ for purchasing us from the slave market of sin?
- ►►How can we <u>not</u> ~ be grateful ~ to the One who conquered sin, ~ death, ~ and all the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places,  $\sim 77$ 
  - Dand who now holds the keys ~ of Death and Hades?
- ▶▶How can we <u>not</u> ~ be thankful to our heavenly Father ~ 77
  - $\triangleright \triangleright$  for rescuing us ~ from the domain of darkness ~~ and transferring us ~ to the kingdom of his beloved Son?
- ►► And ~ how can we <u>not</u> ~ be thankful ~ to the One ~ who ~ always lives ~ to make intercession for us?
