INTRODUCTION.

Christian. ⇒⇒ Coincidence?

THIS A.M., ~ we'll begin to look at Paul's ~ 4 th ~ prison epistle, ~ Philemon.
▶▶This little letter, ~ more like a postcard, ~ is the shortest ~ of all of Paul's writings.
▷▷Not ~ "wish you were here." ⇒⇒ Serious matter dealing with relationships
▶▶Today ~ overall picture
ET'S BEGIN ~ BY LOOKING AT ~ 77
THE PURPOSE AND HISTORICAL SETTING ~ OF THE LETTER.
▶ Philemon
▶▶At some point, ~ Onesimus, ~ one of Philemon's bondservants, ~ fled to Rome.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ Possibly having stolen ~ money or property ~ from Philemon ~ and now a fugitive, ~ 7.3
→ Onesimus was living ~ in the most populated city of the Roman Empire, ~ hoping to escape detection.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ In a rather remarkable set of circumstances, ~~ not recounted in the letter ~ but certainly reflective of God's sovereignty, ~~ 77
→ →Onesimus ~ somehow came into contact with the apostle Paul ~ and became a

- \blacktriangleright Getting back to Onesimus, ~ as he grew in Christ, ~ he spent much time and effort helping Paul, ~ 77
 - Downho was severely constrained by his imprisonment.
- $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright$ As much as Paul ~ would like to have retained the services of Onesimus, ~ he felt obligated ~ to return him to his master.
 - $\triangleright \triangleright$ But he wanted to spare Onesimus ~ the wrath of Philemon.
 - → So he wrote ~ this carefully orchestrated plea for leniency.
 - \rightarrow And returned the runaway in the company of Tychicus.
 - \triangleright Such a plea was in order \sim because Roman law \sim placed no limits \sim on how masters might treat their slaves.
 - \rightarrow They might ~ punish them, ~ torture them, ~ or kill them ~ in the cruelest possible ways.

BOILED DOWN, ~ PERHAPS WE CAN SUMMARIZE THE LETTER ~ THIS WAY.

- ▶▶A runaway slave, ~ Onesimus, ~ has met up with Paul and been converted, ~~ 77
 - $\triangleright \triangleright$ and Paul sends him back ~ to his former master, ~ Philemon, ~ with a letter, ~ 77
 - → → explaining ~ how Paul wants Philemon ~ to handle the situation of a returned slave ~ who is now a brother in Christ.
 - →→Forgiveness, ~ Acceptance, ~ Reconciliation, ~ Family. 11 2/10

<u>WITH THE OVERALL PICTURE IN MIND, ~~ PAUL'S LETTER TO PHILEMON ~ IS THE ~</u> <u>most personal ~ of his letters.</u>

AND IS ~ ACCORDINGLY SIMPLE ~ IN STYLE AND FOCUS.

 \blacktriangleright Given the sensitive nature of the situation ~ that occasioned the letter, ~ 77

Dhis piece of correspondence ~ is a masterpiece of ~ tact ~ and ~ indirect persuasion.

PAUL KNEW ~ EXACTLY ~ HOW TO APPROACH AND ADDRESS ~ PHILEMON.

▶▶We see ~ in Paul's approach to the situation, ~ he had an excellent grasp ~ 77

▶▶Also, ~ Paul, ~ I would suggest to you, ~ was a student ~ of human nature ~ in general~ 77

Dand ~ of the nature of the believers he was acquainted with ~ in particular.

 $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright I$ would further submit, \sim he understood that ~ 77

when dealing with Christian relationships, ~ there is not a ~ one-size-fits-all approach ~ to them.

 \rightarrow He knew ~ he was dealing ~ with individuals ~ and an individual situation, ~ and acted accordingly. 1 3/10

WE NEED ~ TO LEARN PAUL'S EXAMPLE ~ on how to approach ~ people & and situations.
▶▶This would entail ~ situations involving ~ unbelievers ~ and believers alike.
▶▶In relation to unbelievers.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ Our speech ~ must manifest ~ a sensitivity to and awareness of ~ the needs of each individual.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ The content of the gospel ~ must never change.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ But the manner in which it is presented ~ must be adapted ~ to give an answer ~ 7.7
→→suitable ~ for ~ each occasion ~ and each need ~ to each separate individual unbeliever.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ So ~ as we noted, ~ we need ~ to better understand ~ unbelievers in general ~ 77
→ → and the ones we are talking to ~ in particular.
▶▶And more to the point in Philemon, ~ our approach ~ in relation to believers.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ We're not just ~ to barrel in ~ and say ~ whatever pops into our minds.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ We need to take into account ~ what we've just observed about Paul, ~ 77
→ → and apply it ~ to our relationships ~ with our fellow believers.

▶▶And of course, ~ in all of this, ~ we need wisdom from God. 11 4/10

PAUL ~ HAD THE AUTHORITY AS AN APOSTLE ~ TO TELL PHILEMON WHAT TO DO.

- ▶▶Yet Paul chose ~ to appeal to his friend ~ in Christian love ~~ rather ~ than to order him ~ what to do.
- ▶ Paul clearly ~ made his desires known.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ But, ~ he treated Philemon ~ with great respect, ~ as a peer and fellow believer.

TACTFUL PERSUASION ~ WILL ACCOMPLISH MUCH MORE ~ THAN STRONG COMMANDS or language ~ when dealing with people.

▶▶So let's remember ~ to be courteous toward fellow believers ~ and ~ to treat them with great respect.

MOVING ON IN OUR OVERVIEW OF PHILEMON, ~ THIS LETTER ~ SERVES ~ AS A MODEL ~ of Christian compassion.

IN MANY WAYS, ~ IT PARALLELS JESUS' PARABLE OF THE PRODIGAL SON.

- ▶ The letter speaks of ~ failure, ~ the need for intercession, ~ returning, ~ forgiveness, ~ and ~ restoration.
- $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright$ Getting relationships straight \sim is just as important \sim as getting doctrine straight.
- ▶▶We are to relate to our fellow believers ~~ with ~ grace, ~ forgiveness, ~ and encouragement. 11 5/10

NEXT IN OUR GLANCE AT PHILEMON	N, ~~ IN THIS	BRIEF LETTER,	~ PAUL V	VAS URGING
mercy ~ for a runaway slave.				

CONSEQUENTLY, ~ THIS CONCISE MISSIVE ~ IS A REMINDER ~ OF GOD'S LOVE AND advocacy ~ for the lowly.

- ▶▶Slavery was widespread across the Roman Empire.
 - >> But Paul urges Philemon ~ to regard the escaped but returning slave Onesimus ~ 77
 - "no longer as a bondservant \sim but more than a bondservant, \sim as a beloved brother" (v. 16).
 - >>Philemon should receive Onesimus ~ as he would receive Paul (v. 17).
 - \triangleright In fact, ~ Paul is confident ~ Philemon will do even more ~ than Paul requests (v. 21).
 - \rightarrow This may very well mean ~ to grant Onesimus his freedom, ~ which Paul would view as a good thing. (1 Cor. 7:21)
- ►► All this ~ underscores God's care ~ for those whom society ~ looks down upon and abuses, such as ~ widows, ~ orphans, ~ and the poor.
 - $\triangleright \triangleright$ As part of its mission, ~ the church is called ~ 77
 - →→to reflect God's compassion and provision ~~ 77
 - →→in its care for members ~ and ~ in its outreach to the world. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ Matt. 14:13-14

VERSES 1, ~ 2, ~ 7, ~ 16, ~ 20

- ▶▶We've talked about this before, ~ and it bears repeating.
- ▶▶There is no caste system ~ in the kingdom of God.
- ▶▶There is no spiritual elite ~ in the kingdom of God.
- ▶▶There are no second-class citizens ~ in the kingdom of God.
- ▶▶In God's kingdom ~ there is no ~ spiritual superiority or inferiority.
- ▶▶In Gal. 3:28, Paul writes, ~ "There is neither Jew nor Greek, ~ there is neither slave nor free, ~ there is no male and female, ~~ for you are all one ~ in Christ Jesus."
- ▶▶Being citizens of heaven ~ makes us all ~ united and equal.
- ▶▶All believers share the same standing before God.
- ▶▶While leadership structures do exist and are legitimate, ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ in Christ ~ all believers ~ are on an equal spiritual footing.

MOVING ON IN OUR OVERVIEW OF PHILEMON, ~ ONE OF THE IMPLICATIONS OF THE gospel ~ is that believers ~ are to grow more and more ~ Christlike.

AS PAUL SAYS IN ROMANS, ~ 77

►►For those he foreknew ~ he also predestined to be conformed ~ to the image of his Son, ~~ so that ~ he would be the firstborn ~ among many brothers and sisters. 11 7/10

►First, ~ two people were in need of reconciliation, ~ 77
$ riangle$ and Paul sought a way to accomplish it, \sim just as Jesus did.
▶▶Second, ~ Paul pleaded the case of Onesimus, ~ taking the side of the guilty ~ in calling for forgiveness.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ Similarly, ~ Jesus pleaded the case of sinners, ~ bringing them to the Father.
\blacktriangleright Third, ~ Paul offered to pay the debt Onesimus owed, ~~ even though ~ it was not Paul's responsibility.
⊳⊳Verses 18-19a
$\triangleright \triangleright$ Jesus took the debt of sinners ~ and paid it on our behalf.
▶▶Fourth, ~ the reconciliation was, ~ in essence, ~ effected in Paul.
hdHe was the tie ~ that brought Philemon and Onesimus together.
⊳⊳Through Paul, ~ harmony was restored.
⊳⊳Paul's consistent theme ~ "in Christ" ~ reveals ~ 77
$ ightharpoonup$ that he thought the same way \sim regarding the God-human relationship.
>>In Christ, ~ humanity and deity are reconciled. 11 8/10

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→ In Col., ~ Paul writes, ~ 77
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 \rightarrow For in him ~ all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, ~ and through him ~ to reconcile to himself ~ all things, ~ whether on earth or in heaven, ~ making peace ~ by the blood of his cross.

IN THE CONFLICT BETWEEN PHILEMON AND ONESIMUS, ~ Paul acted like Christ did.

▶▶In this epistle, ~ Paul demonstrated ~ that he understood ~ 77

bthe implications of the gospel.

▶▶Apart from personal salvation, ~ nothing equals Christlikeness ~ in attitudes and actions.

 \triangleright The gospel demands it.

▶▶In the Epistle to Philemon, ~ Paul demonstrated it.

ALL BELIEVERS ~ ARE TO ~ GROW IN ~ AND DEMONSTRATE ~ CHRISTLIKENESS ~ IN A comprehensive sense.

- ▶▶I.e., ~ in every area of our lives in general. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ God takes this very seriously.
- ▶▶Note that ~ 1 of the reasons ~ Jesus gave spiritually gifted leaders to the church, ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ is to help us grow ~ more and more like Him (Eph. 4:13).

IN THE CASE OF PHILEMON AND ONESIMUS, ~ PAUL DEMONSTRATED ~ 77

▶▶the specific ~ Christ-like characteristic ~ of peacemaker. 11 9/10

- ▶▶Like our Savior, ~ the Prince of peace, ~ believers are to be mediators.
- $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright$ In brief, ~ we are to be peacemakers, ~ not troublemakers.
- ▶▶And we are to do all that we can, ~ short of moral and theological compromise, ~ 77
 - Do live in peace with everyone ~ and ~ to promote peace in our church.
- ▶ Rom. 12:18, ~ "If possible, ~ so far as it depends on you, ~ live peaceably ~ with all."
- ►► And Prov. 12:20 says, ~ NIV ~ "Deceit ~ is in the hearts of those ~ who plot evil, ~~ but those who promote peace ~ have joy.

CONCLUSION.

JUST A COUPLE OF CLOSING THOUGHTS ~ TO WRAP UP OUR OVERVIEW OF PHILEMON.

- \blacktriangleright This letter ~ offers a picture ~ of how believers should live ~ in relationship to one another.
 - \triangleright The keynotes are ~ accepting one another as equal recipients of forgiveness in Christ, ~ giving generously, ~ 77
 - → thinking the best ~ of fellow believers, ~ and ~ seeking the best ~ for them.
- ▶ Paul's missive to Philemon ~ also teaches that ~ a person's relationship with Christ ~ affects ~ all other relationships.
