INTRODUCTION. ⇒ ⇒ TODAY CONTINUE OUR STUDY OF PHILEMON.

THE FIRST SEVEN VERSES, ~ WHICH WE'VE LOOKED AT, ~ WERE INTRODUCTORY.

►►1-3, ~ greetings. ⇒⇒ Philemon ⇒⇒ Apphia ⇒⇒ Archippus ⇒⇒ Church (not private)

▶▶4-7, ~ Paul's statement of appreciation ~ for his friend Philemon.

 $\triangleright \triangleright \Box$ Genuine faith. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ Christlike love $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ Generosity $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ Refreshing influence.

▶▶In relation to statement: ~~ Ours ~ is very much ~ an action faith.

>>When we live out our faith, ~ we will grow spiritually, ~~ and we will deepen ~ 77

→ →our understanding and experience ~ of all the spiritual blessings we enjoy.

IN VERSES 8-16 OF PHILEMON, ~ WE FIND ~ Paul's general appeal ~ on behalf of Onesimus.

►► And then in verses 17-20, ~~ Paul gets into ~ specific requests.

TODAY, ~ WE'LL BEGIN ~ TO FOCUS ~ ON VERSES 8-16, ~~ PAUL'S GENERAL APPEAL ~ on behalf of ~ Onesimus.

Simple overview.

▶ Paul makes his general appeal ~ by first ~ describing ~ the remarkable change ~ 77

▷▷ that has happened ~ to Onesimus, ~ verses 8-11. ⇒⇒ Today
11/11

▶▶In verses 12-14, ~ Paul explains ~ how helpful ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Onesimus would be to him ~ in his imprisonment.

→→But Paul knew ~ he should send ~ Onesimus back ~ to reconcile with Philemon.

▶ Paul then suggests ~ that God ~ has been sovereignly involved ~ in this situation, ~~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ so that ~ Philemon may receive Onesimus back now ~ as a fellow Christian, ~ verses 15-16.

 \rightarrow \rightarrow Onesimus will therefore be ~ all the more useful ~ to Philemon.

OK, ~ FIRST, ~ THE REMARKABLE CHANGE ~ THAT HAS HAPPENED TO ONESIMUS, ~ verses 8-11.

<u>VERSE 8; ~~ CSB</u>, ~ 77

FOR THIS REASON, ~ ALTHOUGH ~ I HAVE GREAT BOLDNESS IN CHRIST ~ to command you ~ to do what is right.

▶ The phrase, ~ "for this reason," ~ carries on the thought ~ from verse 7.

 \blacktriangleright The implication here ~ no doubt ~ is that ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ the love, ~ generosity, ~ and ~ encouragement ~ Philemon had shown to other believers ~ ought to be extended ~ 77

→ → to include Onesimus, ~ regardless ~ of what he had done ~ to Philemon. 11 2/11

▶▶IOW, ~ we are not free ~ to pick and choose ~ which believers deserve ~ 77

Doto receive our ~ forgiveness, ~ love, ~ generosity, ~ and encouragement.

► We should extend these things ~ to every believer ~ regardless ~ of what they've done to us.

► Our heavenly Father ~ is our model here of this

THEN PAUL ~ REFERENCES ~ HIS APOSTOLIC AUTHORITY.

► He says, ~ although ~ I have great boldness in Christ ~ to command you to do what is right/proper.

▶ This is probably not ~ a veiled threat

Simply acknowledging that he has this authority as an apostle, ~ but, ~ as we'll see, ~ 77

DD he is refusing to use it ~ in this situation.

▶ Rather, ~ Paul wanted Philemon ~ to draw ~ his own conclusions ~~ and to make ~ his own decision ~ 77

Dabout what is fitting ~ for a Christian to do.

NOW, ~ PAUL DOES NOT SPELL OUT FOR US ~ WHAT HE MEANS BY PROPER HERE.

▶ But the context indicates ~ what Paul means.

 \blacktriangleright He wants Philemon ~ to forgive and be reconciled to ~ Onesimus. 11 3/11

▶▶So, ~ the proper thing for Philemon to do ~ is forgiveness and reconciliation.

PHILEMON'S CULTURE ~ HAD CONDITIONED HIM ~ TO VIEW SLAVES ~ AS LESS THAN full persons ~ 77

who were deservedly consigned ~ to their lot by fate.

▶▶And Philemon ~ would have been expected ~ to exact revenge ~ on one who ran away.

▶ But ~ what was culturally permissible ~ for dealing with a runaway slave ~ 77

▷ ▷ was at odds ~ with what is fitting ~ in God's kingdom. ⇒ ⇒ Same today

FORGIVENESS ~ WAS NOT ~ THE NORM ~ IN PHILEMON'S WORLD.

▶ But ~ it is ~ a fundamental requirement ~ for Christians.

▶ Paul makes that clear ~ in Col. 3:13b.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ There ~ Paul tells us ~ we are to forgive ~ anyone ~ who offends us.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ And then ~ he tells us why.

→ → The Lord forgave you, ~ so you must ~ forgive others.

►►Not something optional.

▶▶No matter how much ~ a person has done against us, ~ it does not come close ~ 77

DD to what we had done ~ against God. 11 4/11

▶ Yet, ~ through Jesus, ~ God the Father ~ has ~ freely, ~ graciously, ~ and willingly ~ forgiven all those who

►►And, ~ like his love, ~ his forgiveness ~ doesn't end at conversion.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ It continues unabated. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ No expiration date. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ When we confess our sins

▶▶Furthermore, ~ there are ~ no limits ~ on God's forgiveness of us.

PAUL CONTINUES ~ HIS GENERAL APPEAL ON BEHALF OF ONESIMUS, ~ VERSE 9.

YET FOR LOVE'S SAKE I PREFER TO APPEAL TO YOU—I, PAUL, AN OLD MAN AND NOW A prisoner also for Christ Jesus.

►►As noted, ~ although Paul ~ certainly had the authority ~ to tell Philemon what to do, ~ 77

>>> he preferred ~ not to use his authority ~ in this particular situation.

▶ He wanted Philemon ~~ to make ~ the final decision.

RATHER THAN APOSTOLIC AUTHORITY, ~ PAUL'S APPEAL ~ was on the basis of love.

▶▶Based on the context, ~ most likely ~ he was talking about ~ 77

>>>Philemon's well-known Christ-like love ~ for the believers.

▶ Paul is saying that ~ to ~ receive back ~ and ~ forgive ~ Onesimus ~ would be ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ a commendable expression ~ of Philemon's Christ-like love ~ to both ~ Onesimus and Paul. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ And would set example 11 5/11

Dur thinking, ~ attitudes, ~ and behavior ~ toward one another ~ are to be ~ 77

D characterized and governed by ~ $\dot{\alpha}\gamma\dot{\alpha}\pi\eta$, ~~ i.e., ~ Christ-like love.

▶ Furthermore, ~ our Christ-like love ~ will cause us ~ 77

>>> to always do ~ what is proper ~ in our relationships with other believers.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ On the other hand, ~ nothing good ~ is produced by ~ thoughts of revenge and hurt feelings.

 \rightarrow In contrast, ~ love will find a way ~ to do right.

▷ ▷ Paul understood this

AT THE END OF VERSE 9, ~ PAUL ADDS A PARENTHETICAL COMMENT.

Here he describes himself ~ two ways.

►►As ~ an elderly man ~ and now also as a prisoner of Christ Jesus.

>Paul could indeed have been considered ~ an old man ~ because ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ he was about sixty or older ~ in a society ~ where the normal lifespan ~ was almost certainly under forty.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ And the hard life he had lived ~~ and the sufferings he had endured for the sake of the gospel ~ 77

 \rightarrow no doubt ~ had taken their toll ~ and prematurely aged him. 11 6/11

 \triangleright This fact, ~ should cause Philemon ~ to respond in sympathy and love ~ 77

→ → for the valiant old warrior ~ who had led him to Christ.

▶▶If that were not enough to elicit Philemon's sympathy, ~~ 77

DPaul reminds him ~ that he is a prisoner of Christ Jesus.

>>Philemon could not possibly ~ turn down a request ~ from a believer in such honorable suffering.

► Age is not respected ~ in this society in which we live

<u>IN VERSES 10-11, ~ PAUL BRINGS UP ~ THE SUBJECT OF HIS REQUEST, ~ ONESIMUS, ~</u> <u>and describes him ~ two ways.</u>

1st, ~ IN VERSE 10 ~ PAUL NOTES ~ THAT ONESIMUS ~ IS NOW A CHRISTIAN.

▶ He met up with Paul ~ and Paul led him to the Lord.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ He became Onesimus' spiritual father.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Paul often used ~ the father/child analogy ~ for those he had led to Christ.

▶▶But think about this. ~~ Paul did not have to word it like this

▷▷Making larger point

2nd, ~ PAUL DESCRIBES ONESIMUS ~ AS TRANSFORMED. 11 7/11

▶▶In verse 11. ~ he tells Philemon, ~ 77

>>>Formerly ~ he was useless to you, ~ but now ~ he is indeed useful ~ to you and to me.

▶▶In Colossians, ~ Paul calls him ~ our faithful and dearly loved brother.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ He is no longer that useless slave, ~ he is now ~ useful.

► He is a new creation in Christ, ~ Paul says.

▶ The name ~ 'Onesimus' means ~ 'useful' or 'profitable', ~ 77

D so ~ with a touch of humor, ~ Paul tells Philemon ~ that Onesimus ~ is finally living up ~ to his useful name.

A SIGN OF GENUINE CONVERSION ~ IS THAT ~ OF A PURPOSEFUL, ~ USEFUL, ~ AND ~ fruitful life.

▶► Talked about this recently, ~ and perhaps it bears repeating.

▶ Whereas ~ we are most definitely ~ saved ~ by faith ~ and not by works, ~~ 77

▷▷true faith ~ definitely works!

 \triangleright For we ~ are his workmanship, ~ created in Christ Jesus ~ for good works, ~ which God ~ prepared ahead of time ~ for us to do (Eph. 2:10).

>>True Christian good works ~ are not a matter of slavish obedience, ~ but motivated ~ 77

DD from a heart of gratitude ~ for benefits and blessings received. 11 8/11

COMING BACK TO ONESIMUS, ~ HE IS AN ILLUSTRATION ~ OF THE CHANGE ~ THE gospel makes.

► From "useless" ~ to "useful."

▶ What a wonderful change ~ in my life has been wrought, ~ since Jesus ~ came into my heart', ~ an old hymn says.

► Conversion ~ makes us ~ children of God.

► Conversion ~ reconciles us ~ to our Creator.

Conversion ~ changes our direction, ~ from eternal death ~ to eternal life.

Conversion ~ enables us ~ to live a fruitful life.

Conversion ~ motivates us ~ to want to live ~ a life that is pleasing to God.

Ezek. 36:26, ~ CSB ~ I will ~ give you a new heart ~ and put a new spirit within you; ~~ I will ~ remove your heart of stone ~ and give you a heart of flesh.

 \triangleright This happens ~ when we accept Jesus ~ as Savior and Lord.

 $\triangleright \triangleright At$ that moment, ~ God ~ removes our sin-hardened hearts, ~ 77

→ gives us "a new heart," ~ and puts "a new spirit within" us.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ "a new heart" and "a new spirit," ~ which by instinct ~ 77

→ wish ~ to please, ~ to live for, ~ and to serve God. 11 9/11

► Additionally, ~ in Ezek. 36:27 (NIV), ~ God says, ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ And I will put my Spirit in you ~ and move you ~ to follow my decrees and be careful to keep my laws.

▶▶Perhaps put this way, ~ our new nature, ~ in conjunction with God the Holy Spirit ~ 77

DDdraws us toward holiness.

▶▶Sin and our sinful nature, ~ no longer wields the power over us ~ they once did.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Their stranglehold over us ~ has been broken.

→→There in the ground His body lay, ~ Light of the World by darkness slain. ~~ Then bursting forth in glorious day, ~ Up from the grave He rose again! ~~ 77

→→And as He stands In victory, ~ Sin's curse ~ has lost Its grip on me; ~~ 77

→ → For I am His and He is mine ~ Bought with the precious blood of Christ.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Freedom ~ from and death to ~ sin ~ allows us ~ 77

→ → to offer ourselves ~ as willing servants ~ of the Lord Jesus Christ, ~ 77

→→who continues ~ to work in us ~ to make us more like Him.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ And we have this promise. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ Phil. 1:6

→→And I am sure of this, ~ that he ~ who began a good work in you ~ will bring it to completion ~ at the day of Jesus Christ. ↓ 10/11
