A POSTCARD FROM PAUL, PT. 6; 1:12-16 (Ed O'Leary)

INTRODUCTION.

WE ARE CURRENTLY STUDYING THE ~ VERY BRIEF ~ LETTER OF PAUL TO PHILEMON.

▶▶This little letter, ~ more like a postcard, ~ is the shortest ~ of all of Paul's writings.

>>Not ~ "wish you were here." >> Serious matter dealing with relationships

AS NOTED WHEN WE BEGAN, ~ PERHAPS ~ WE CAN SUMMARIZE THE LETTER ~ THIS way.

▶▶A runaway slave, ~ Onesimus, ~ has met up with Paul and been converted, ~~ 77

Dand Paul sends him back ~ to his former master, ~ Philemon, ~ with a letter, ~ 77

who is now a brother in Christ.

PRESENTLY, ~ WE ARE MAKING OUR WAY THROUGH ~ PAUL'S GENERAL APPEAL ~ ON behalf of Onesimus, ~ verses 8-16.

- ▶▶To bring us up to speed, ~ let's review ~ the overall paragraph.
- ▶▶In verses 8-11, ~ looked at, ~ Paul makes his general appeal ~ by first ~ describing ~ 77

>> the remarkable change ~ 77

→ → that has happened ~ to Onesimus. 11 1/10

- ▶▶In verses 12-14, ~ Paul explains ~ how helpful ~ 77
 - DOOnesimus would be to him ~ in his imprisonment.
 - ⇒⇒But Paul knew ~ he should send ~ Onesimus back ~ to reconcile with Philemon.
- ▶ Paul then suggests, ~ in verses 15-16, ~ that God ~ has been sovereignly involved ~ in this situation, ~ 77
 - >> so that ~ Philemon may receive Onesimus back now ~ as a fellow Christian.
- ▶▶Today ~ we'll finish up ~ Paul's general appeal ~ on behalf of Onesimus, ~ verses 12-16.

AGAIN, ~ N VERSES 12-14, ~ PAUL EXPLAINS ~ HOW HELPFUL ONESIMUS WOULD BE TO him ~ in his imprisonment.

BUT PAUL KNEW ~ HE SHOULD SEND ~ ONESIMUS BACK ~ 77

▶▶to reconcile with Philemon.

IN VERSE 12, ~ PAUL INFORMS PHILEMON THAT HE'S SENDING ONESIMUS BACK.

- I AM SENDING HIM BACK TO YOU, ~ SENDING MY VERY HEART.
 - ▶ The idea here is this.
 - DPhilemon, ~ I am sending Onesimus back to you ~ as a part ~ of myself.
 - ▶▶Basically, ~ Paul is saying ~ he is sending ~ his own self ~ to Philemon. 11 2/10

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▶▶And ~ he expects Onesimus ~ to be treated as such.
    >> A fact Paul makes clear ~ in verse 17 . . . .
MOREOVER, ~ TO DESCRIBE A SLAVE AS ~ "MY VERY HEART" ~ identifies Onesimus ~ 77
 within the new frame of reference ~ in Christ.
 ▶▶This identification ~ serves ~ to force Philemon ~ 77
    DD to accept Onesimus's new status ~ a brother in the Lord.
    >>Human social status did not change.
    >>But this new relationship supersedes it ....
 ►► Additionally, ~ this would force Philemon to realize that now ~ 77
    Dhe must deal with Onesimus ~ with Christ-like love, ~ not human emotion . . . .
THAT PAUL ~ IS SENDING ONESIMUS BACK ~ SHOWS US ~ THE IMPORTANCE ~ OF
reconciliation, ~ and ~ of forgiveness.
 ▶▶The reconciliation ~ that Jesus achieved ~ between God and humanity ~ 77
    Domakes it possible ~ for believers ~ truly to be reconciled ~ to one another.
 ►► As evidence ~ of being reconciled to God, ~ 77
    \triangleright \triangleright believers are called ~ to pursue reconciliation ~ with others. 11 3/10
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▶ Rom. 12:18, ~ CSB ~ If possible, ~ as far as it depends on you, ~ live at peace with
everyone.
   \triangleright \triangleright As noted when began Philemon, ~ we are to be peacemakers, ~ not troublemakers.
   \triangleright \triangleright And we are to do all that we can, ~ short of moral and theological compromise, ~ 77
       → to live in peace with everyone ~ and ~ to promote peace in our church.
▶ Pursuing reconciliation with others ~ is so important ~ 77
   >> that Jesus warns his followers ~ that failure to do so ~ can cause a rift ~ in their own
   fellowship with God.
▶ Jesus in sermon on mount.
   >>If you ~ refuse to forgive others, ~~ your Father ~ will not ~ forgive your sins.
   >>Personal fellowship with God ~ is in view in these verses ~ not ~ salvation from sin.
   >> A believer cannot ~ 77
       → walk in fellowship with God ~ if he refuses ~ to forgive others.
       \rightarrow \rightarrow Is. 59:2 (CSB), \sim But your iniquities \sim are separating you \sim from your God,
      ~~ and your sins ~ have hidden ~ his face from you ~~ so that ~ he does not listen.
▶▶That is why ~ in the Lord's Prayer ~ God's people are to pray, ~~ 77
   >> Forgive us our sins, ~ for we also forgive ~ everyone who sins against us (Luke 11:4)
   NIV). 11 4/10
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- $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright$ Since God has forgiven us \sim for our rebellion against him, $\sim \sim$ we are to forgive others \sim who have wronged us.
- \blacktriangleright As Paul says in Colossians, \sim Just as the Lord has forgiven you, \sim so you are also \sim to forgive {Col. 3:13, CSB}.

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>>Not optional . . . .
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 $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright$ As noted, \sim No matter how much \sim a person has done against us, \sim it does not come close \sim 77

DD to what we had done ~ against God.

 $\rightarrow \rightarrow$ Yet, ~ through Jesus, ~ God the Father ~ has ~ freely, ~ graciously, ~ and willingly ~ forgiven all those who

 \blacktriangleright Believers are even instructed \sim to seek reconciliation with others \sim before worshiping God.

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→ → Matt. 5:23-24 . . . .
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▶ There is even ~ an implied challenge for believers ~ to forgive those ~ who do not ask for it.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Jesus did so \sim on the cross.

▶▶Father, ~ forgive them, ~ for they do not know ~ what they are doing.

>> And Stephen followed ~ his Master's example ~ as he was martyred.

→ Lord, ~ do not hold this sin ~ against them. 11 5/10

    \triangleright • • Church divisions .... \Rightarrow \Rightarrow • Focus is off the gospel ....
       ⇒⇒ • Hurts personal witness .... ⇒ ⇒ • Open door for Satan ....
 ▶▶Hope picture forming of importance of forgiveness & recon. ⇒⇒ How seriously God . . . .
IN VERSE 13, ~ PAUL NOTES HIS DESIRE ~ FOR ONESIMUS ~ TO STAY IN ROME WITH
him. ⇒⇒ Read vs. 13 . . . .
PAUL, ~ AS AN APOSTLE, ~ COULD HAVE THE RIGHT ~ TO CLAIM THIS SERVICE.
 ▶Nevertheless, ~ he does not want, ~ under any circumstances, ~ to encroach upon the
 decision ~ 77
 >> which only Philemon, ~ as Onesimus' rightful master, ~ can make.
THE APOSTLES ~ WERE NOT ~ SOME OVERBEARING DICTATORS, ~ THROWING THEIR
weight around.
 ▶▶They never abused their authority.
 ► Mk. 10:42-45 . . . .
 ▶► Models of church leadership.
    >>Peter summarizes the leadership model ~ every church leader is to follow.
       → → 1 Pet. 5:1-4 . . . . 11 6/10
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- \triangleright Elders and pastors ~ are to lead ~ by example, ~ not ~ by force.
 - → They are never ~ to ~ abuse their authority ~ or ~ bully or steamroll people.
 - \rightarrow And no believer ~ should submit to any pastor/elder ~ that's abusing his authority.
 - → Rather, ~ they should get rid of that leader.

IN VERSE 14, ~ PAUL TELLS PHILEMON THAT ~ HE WILL DO NOTHING ~ WITHOUT Philemon's consent.

PAUL DOES NOT WANT PHILEMON ~ TO FEEL ~ THAT HE IS BEING FORCED ~ 77

- ▶ to forgive and reconcile with ~ Onesimus.
- ▶▶No doubt ~ Paul wants him to be encouraged ~ to let Christ-like love ~ do its work.
 - >> For Christlike love ~ will definitely ~ lead Philemon to ~ willingly ~ forgive and reconcile w/ Onesimus.
- ▶▶This, ~ however, ~ cannot happen ~ if Philemon is compelled ~ to act ~ against his own will.
 - \triangleright Christ-like love ~ can only express itself concretely ~ on the basis ~ of a decision ~ 77
 - → that is ~ freely ~ arrived at.

AS WE NOTED AT THE BEGINNING, ~ IN VERSES 12-14, ~ PAUL EXPLAINS ~ 77

THEN IN VERSES 15-16, ~ TO WHICH WE NOW TURN, ~ PAUL SUGGESTS ~ 77 THAT GOD ~ HAS BEEN SOVEREIGNLY INVOLVED ~ IN THIS SITUATION, ~ 77 ▶▶so that ~ Philemon may receive Onesimus back now ~ as a fellow Christian. ► Verses 15-16 LET'S TAKE THE PHRASE, ~ "HE WAS SEPARATED." ▶▶Theological passive. >>Use of the passive voice of a verb ~ ~ with God ~ as the implied agent. ▶▶IOW, ~ the passive verb for ~ he was separated ~ plainly implies ~ that Onesimus ~ 77 Dwas separated from Philemon ~ in the ~ providential and hidden ~ outworking ~ of God's will. ▶▶TPID, ~ Paul acknowledged ~ that God ~ was at work behind the scenes ~ 77 Din this separation ~ of Onesimus and Philemon. NOW, ~ PLEASE DON'T MISUNDERSTAND. ▶▶What Onesimus did ~ was wrong. 11 8/10

▶ But Paul knew ~ he should send ~ Onesimus back ~ to reconcile with Philemon.

▶▶But ~ God can overrule wrong ~ and use it ~ to accomplish His ultimate purpose. ▶ Rom. 8:28. >> And we know ~ that for those who love God ~ all things ~ work together for good, ~~ for those who are called ~ according to his purpose. ▶▶In his testimony to ~ the sovereign, ~ providential direction of God, ~ Joseph said this ~ to his fearful brothers. DDGen. 50:20, ⇒ CSB ~ You planned evil against me; ~ God planned it for good ~ to bring about the present result ~ the survival of many people. PAUL ACKNOWLEDGED ~ THAT GOD WAS AT WORK ~ BEHIND THE SCENES ~ 77 ▶▶in this separation ~ of Onesimus and Philemon. $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright$ God carried out his hidden purpose, \sim the salvation of Onesimus, \sim even \sim in the apparent turmoil ~ of human events. LOOKING AT THE BEGINNING OF VERSE 15, ~ NOTICE WHAT PAUL SAYS. ▶▶For perhaps ~ this is why ~ he was separated from you. ▶▶The word for ~ "perhaps" ~ does not ~ express doubt or uncertainty. ▶▶Rather, ~ it calls for ~ further deliberation ~ and the need ~ to see beyond ~ what is apparent. ▶ We need to learn this lesson 11 9/10

AND WHEN WE FACE DIFFICULT TIMES, ~ WE MUST TRUST ~ IN GOD'S LOVING CARE ~ and ~ in his wisdom and power ~ over all events.

- \blacktriangleright He may be using the difficulty \sim to bring people to himself, \sim to develop character, \sim and to help us grow.
- ▶ When thro' fiery trials ~ thy pathway shall lie, ~~ My grace, ~ all-sufficient, ~ shall be thy supply; \sim ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ The flame shall not hurt thee; \sim I only design \sim Thy dross to consume, \sim and thy gold to refine.
