A POSTCARD FROM PAUL, PT. 10; PHILE. 1:21-25 (Ed O'Leary)

INTRODUCTION.

TODAY ~ WE BRING OUR STUDY OF PHILEMON TO A CLOSE.

► Verses 21-25 ~ contain Paul's ~ final remarks, ~ greetings, ~ and benediction.

►►Dig right in.

IN VERSE 21, ~ PAUL EXPRESSES HIS CONFIDENCE ~ THAT PHILEMON WILL DO THE right thing.

AND THAT IS ~ TO FORGIVE AND RECONCILE WITH ONESIMUS.

THOUGH PAUL ISSUED ~ NO SPECIFIC COMMANDS, ~ PHILEMON'S ACTIONS ~ WERE ~ a matter of obedience.

▶ But not ~ obedience to Paul.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Remember, ~ Paul went out of his way ~ to note that ~ he would not use his apostolic authority.

 \Rightarrow \Rightarrow So, ~ obedience to Paul ~ would not fit the context.

▶ Rather, ~ no doubt Paul was talking about ~ behaving ~ in accord ~ with the will of God.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Paul had confidence ~ in Philemon's obedience ~ to Christ. 11 1/7

WE CAN ASSUME, ~ SAFELY I THINK, ~ THAT PHILEMON ~ WAS WELL INSTRUCTED ~ in the theology ~ of forgiveness.

► He knew ~ the principle taught in Matthew 6, ~ 77

DD that the believer's relational forgiveness from God ~ depends ~ on his willingness ~ to forgive others.

→→We know it too ⇒⇒ Matt. 6:14-15

▶ Philemon knew ~ that our Lord had taught ~ that there must be ~ no limits ~ to forgiveness.

 $\triangleright \triangleright We know it too \dots$

▶▶And Philemon ~ no doubt was familiar ~ with Paul's teaching on forgiveness.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ And we are as well ~ from our study of Ephesians and Colossians. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ As the Lord has forgiven you, ~ so you also must forgive.

▶▶Most likely, ~ because Philemon was aware of the theology of forgiveness, ~ 77

DDPaul does not repeat the teaching here.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ And Paul was confident ~ that Philemon would put it into action ~~ in the situation between himself and Onesimus.

And since we too ~ are aware ~ of the theology of forgiveness, ~ it is incumbent upon us ~ to put it into ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ loving and voluntary action ~ in our lives. 11 2/7

BACK TO PHILEMON.

▶▶In keeping with the tone of Paul's letter, ~ we can say this.

► Voluntarily, ~~ not because of law, ~~ nor out of fear, ~ but because of love, ~ 77

DDPhilemon is to obey the God who commanded him to forgive.

▶▶And that ~ is how the Lord wants ~ all of us to obey.

 $\triangleright \triangleright Not \sim out of fear or grudging obligation, \sim or because it's a rule to obey.$

 \Rightarrow Rather, ~ he wants us to voluntarily, ~ because of our love for him ~ live according to his will.

IN 1 JN. 5:3 (CSB), ~ JOHN WRITES, ~ 77

▶▶For this ~ is what love for God is: ~~ to keep his commands. ~ 77

DDAnd his commands ~ are not ~ a burden.

>> The added words ~ And his commands are not a burden ~ explain ~ 77

>>> the place ~ of these commands ~ in the experience ~ of the obedient believer.

▶ The negative assertion ~ that they are ~ not a burden ~ points out ~ 77

 \triangleright that the believer ~ does not find them ~ to be an intolerable burden ~ which he seeks to avoid. 11 3/7

▶ They are not like the ~ heavy loads that are hard to carry ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ that the Pharisees placed ~ on people's consciences.

▶ Rather, ~ love-prompted obedience ~ finds ~ that God's statutes ~ are not ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ a crushing burden ~ which ~ exhausts one's strength ~ and destroys one's sense of freedom in Christ.

The believer finds ~ that the new life in Christ ~ implants in him ~ a desire ~~ to do the will of God ~ 77

>>>> and finds ~ that love ~ makes obedience to God's commands rewarding.

► Why is that?

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Because, ~ when we truly love God, ~ we come to realize ~ 77

→ → that God has given his word ~ for our protection and true well-being.

 $\triangleright \triangleright \forall$ We find in his precepts ~ guidance concerning ~ his ~ good, ~ pleasing, ~ and perfect ~ will.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Love-prompted obedience ~ finds ~ that God's commands ~ become songs.

 \rightarrow \rightarrow And that his statutes ~ prove to be ~ the stepping stones to freedom.

BEFORE MOVING ON TO VERSE 22, ~ NOTE THE PHRASE, ~ 77

knowing ~ that you will do ~ even more ~ than I say. 11 4/7

► We don't know what Paul meant by this.

▶ The main things are the plain things. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ And the plain things are the main things.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ This is neither ~ plain nor main.

PAUL CONTINUES HIS CLOSING REMARKS IN VERSE 22.

AT THE SAME TIME, ~ PREPARE A GUEST ROOM FOR ME, ~ FOR I AM HOPING ~ THAT through your prayers ~ I will be graciously given to you.

▶ That Paul would ask Philemon ~ to prepare a guest room in his home ~ indicates ~ that Paul expected to be released.

▶ Philippians

WHAT WAS PAUL'S MOTIVE?

▶ Reminder of apostolic authority? ⇒⇒ No, ~ doesn't fit context.

► To check up on Philemon? => No, ~ doesn't fit context.

▶ Paul went out of his way

▶▶It is more likely ~ that Paul was simply hoping ~ 77

DD to eventually visit these believers ~ who had been praying for him.

► Think contextually. 11 5/7

THE WORDS ~ YOUR AND YOU ARE PLURAL.

►►No distinction in English

▶ Paul here is focusing on ~ Philemon, ~ Apphia, ~ Archippus, ~ and ~ the church in Philemon's house.

 \blacktriangleright A reminder that ~ this was not a private letter. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ The church is to be involved

BACK TO VERSE 22.

▶ Paul says, ~ for I am hoping ~ that through your prayers ~ I will be graciously given to you.

▶ The Greek word translated ~ given means ~ to give freely as a favor, ~ give graciously.

▶ The point here ~ is that Paul ~ may be given to them ~ as an act ~ of grace, ~ or ~ Divine favor

▶▶For Philemon and the church in his home ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ to have their prayers answered with a visit from Paul ~ would indeed ~ be a gift of grace.

LESSON.

Every answered prayer ~ is a gift of God's grace

▶ Praying itself ~ is a gracious gift from God. 11 6/7

EPAPHRAS, ~ MY FELLOW PRISONER IN CHRIST JESUS, ~ sends greetings to you, ~ 77

▶▶and so do Mark, ~ Aristarchus, ~ Demas, ~ and Luke, ~ my fellow workers.

<u>PAUL CONCLUDED ~ ALL 13 OF HIS EPISTLES ~ WITH A ONE-SENTENCE BENEDICTION</u> <u>~ similar to the one here in verse 25.</u>

THE GRACE OF THE LORD JESUS CHRIST BE WITH YOUR [PL.] SPIRIT ~ [i.e., ~ your inner spiritual self].

▶▶In verse 3, ~ Paul prayed ~ that the believers meeting in Philemon's house ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ would continue ~ to experience God's grace, ~ i.e., ~ unmerited favor, ~ and the peace that flows from it.

► Here ~ Paul most likely was concerned ~ that they be encompassed ~ 77

DDwith God's enabling grace, ~ for their daily walk before others.

► Something ~ we definitely need as well, ~ for our ~ daily walk ~ and daily spiritual battles.

<u>LET'S PRAY 7/7</u>
