INTRODUCTION.

TODAY ~ WE BEGIN THE FIRST MAJOR SECTION OF JAMES, ~ 1:2-27.

► As the outline indicates ..., ~~ this section consists ~ of a collection of proverbs ~ on a wide range of subjects.

► Again, ~ the format of this paragraph ~ does not have ~ the logical flow of an essay, ~ with a continuous line of argument.

▶ We'll be taking the subjects ~ as James presents them.

▶ James' overall purpose ~ is to instill ~ correct thinking ~ and right behavior ~ in believers.

THIS A.M., ~ WE'LL BEGIN ~ TO ZERO IN ON ~ VERSES 2-4 ~ OF JAMES, ~ CHAPTER 1.

THE LORD WANT US ~ TO VIEW EVERY ASPECT OF OUR LIVES ~ FROM A BIBLICAL perspective.

►► This is viewing our lives ~ accurately.

▶▶To look at our lives from a biblical perspective, ~ we must perceive ~ 77

▶▶But far too often, ~ we adopt an ~ "under the sun" ~ viewpoint.

▷▷Ecclesiastes ⇔⇒ Asaph 11/10

SO AGAIN, ~ WE MUST PERCEIVE ~ THE SPIRITUAL REALITIES ~ BEHIND ~ EACH circumstance, ~ each event ~ in our lives.

►► And even if we can't identify them, ~ we must trust that ~ 77

>>>God is at work, ~ carrying out his good purposes for our lives.

→ Paul not lying. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ And we know ~ that for those who love God ~ all things ~ work together for good, ~~ for those who are called according to his purpose.

▶▶IOW, ~ no matter what, ~ we must have ~ a biblical perspective ~ on our lives.

THIS IS ESPECIALLY IMPORTANT ~ IN FACING TRIALS OF VARIOUS KINDS.

▶▶And this ~ is what James deals with ~ in 1:2-4, ~ a biblical perspective on trials.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Holding a biblical perspective on trials ~ is the correct way ~ to think about trials.

 \rightarrow And this correct thinking ~ will lead ~ to right behavior ~ within trials.

▶ ² Count it all joy, ~ my brothers ~ [ἀδελφοί], ~~ when you meet trials ~ of various kinds, ~~ [strange & unexpected] ~~ [why:] ³ for you know ~ that the testing of your faith ~ produces steadfastness. ~~ ⁴ And let steadfastness ~ [endurance] ~ have its full effect, ~~ that you may be perfect ~ [mature] ~ and complete, ~ lacking in nothing.

▶▶In this, ~ James wants us to see ~ a progression of events ~ in the following pattern.

▶▶Trials ≫ Testing Of Our Faith ≫ Endurance ≫ Spiritual Maturity.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ This ~ is the spiritual reality behind trials. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ View through this grid. 11 2/10

AND ~ IT IS THIS END GOAL, ~ SPIRITUAL MATURITY, ~ THAT IS ~ THE SOURCE ~ of our joy, ~ 77

▶▶not ~ the trial, ~ but ~ what the trial ~ ultimately produces. ⇒⇒ Joy set before him

► Additionally, ~ this ultimate goal, ~ spiritual maturity ~ will give us motivation ~~ to persevere ~ when our faith is tested ~ by trials of various kinds.

▶ So we see the biblical perspective on trials ~ laid out for us. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ Need to apply it.

PAUL ~ BROADENS THE SCOPE ~ OF CORRECT THINKING ABOUT TRIALS ~ TO INCLUDE ~ all that's in store for us ~ in eternity.

▶ Rom. 8:18, ~ For I consider ~ that the sufferings of this present time ~ are not worth ~ comparing with the glory ~ that is to be revealed to us.

▶ 2 Cor. 4:16-18, ~ ¹⁶ So we do not lose heart. ~~ Though our outer self ~ is wasting away, ~~ our inner self ~ is being renewed day by day. ~~ ¹⁷ For this light momentary affliction ~ is preparing for us ~ an eternal weight of glory ~ beyond all comparison, ~ ¹⁸ as we look ~ not ~ to the things that are seen ~ but to the things ~ that are unseen. ~~ For the things that are seen ~ are transient, ~~ but the things that are unseen ~ are eternal.

 \blacktriangleright Hardships are temporary. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow$ They are not ~ eternal realities.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ And they are easier to bear ~ when put ~ in the perspective of eternity.

▶ The goal of sp. maturity ~ & the promise of eternity ~ produce joy in present trials.

BACK TO JAMES.

►Now let's begin to look at the details, ~~ in order ~ to get an even better understanding ~ of what James is saying. ⇒⇒ Verse 2 today. 11 3/10

VERSE 2a.

COUNT IT ALL JOY.

►►A state of delight and well being ~ that results ~ from knowing and serving God.

▶▶TPID, ~ joy ~ is the fruit ~ of a right relationship with God.

TRANSLATED ~~ CONSIDER IT ~ A GREAT JOY.

▶ Boiled down, ~ here's James' point.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ We should look at trials ~ as occasions ~ for great joy.

▶ Now, ~ it's important here to understand ~ also what James is not saying.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ He is not saying ~ trials are to be viewed ~ as occasions ~ 77

→ → for no other emotional response ~ <u>except</u>joy, ~ 77

 \rightarrow \rightarrow as though grief ~ is never to be ~ experienced ~ or expressed.

▶▶If James did mean that, ~~ he would be contradicting Peter.

CALL YOUR ATTENTION TO 1 PET. 1:6.

▶▶In this you rejoice, ~ though now for <u>a little while</u>, ~ if necessary, ~ you have been <u>grieved</u> ~ by various trials. ↓↓ 4/10

▶ The verb form of the word Peter uses for "grieved" ~ means ~~ to cause pain, ~ to cause to sorrow, ~ to put to grief.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ The word expresses ~ not suffering ~ but the mental effect ~ of suffering.

▶▶Notice ~ Peter acknowledges ~ that trials can cause us ~ mental pain, ~ sorrow, ~ and grief.

▶▶Notice too, ~ he does not ~ rebuke believers ~ for feeling this way.

► Observe further, ~~ that ~ pain, ~ sorrow, ~ and grief ~ can exist ~ simultaneously ~ with joy ~ in the Christian life.

▶ When a person walks with the Lord, ~ the person can continue to rejoice ~ even when troubles come.

>>Jesus spoke ~ of those who could rejoice ~ even when persecuted and killed

→ Matt. 5:11-12, ~ NIV ~ Blessed are you ~ when ~ people insult you, ~ persecute you ~ and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of me. ~~ Rejoice and be glad, ~ because great is your reward in heaven, ~ for in the same way ~ they persecuted the prophets who were before you.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ They left the council ~ rejoicing ~ that God had counted them worthy ~ 77

→ → to suffer disgrace for the name of Jesus.

BACK TO JAMES.

▶▶James is telling us ~~ we should look at trials ~ as occasions ~ for great joy. ↓↓ 5/10

▶ We could express it ~ this way as well.

>>James is telling us ~~ "Look at trials ~ from the bright side, ~ as capable ~ of being turned ~ to our highest good."

▷▷●Glass ⇒⇒ @Joseph

 $\triangleright \triangleright \bullet$ Should we accept ~ only good from God ~ and not adversity?" ~~ Throughout all this ~ Job did not sin ~ in what he said.

▶▶This ~ is looking at trials ~ from God's perspective.

▶ We should never ~ consider trials as ~ a punishment, ~ a curse, ~ or ~ a calamity.

►►And ~ we must avoid ~ being like Job's "counselors" ~ when a fellow believer ~ is going through a trial.

JAMES CONTINUES, ~ VERSE 2b.

WHEN YOU MEET TRIALS OF VARIOUS KINDS.

▶ The Greek word for trials here ~ can refer ~ to internal temptations.

 \blacktriangleright The inner temptation ~ is expressed in ~ 1: ~ 13 ~ by the verb form of this word.

▶ The context makes clear ~ the term is ~ not used ~ in vs. 2 with this sense.

▶ But rather ~ the other primary meaning for the word ~ is used here.

 $\triangleright \triangleright I.e.$, ~ the external trials of daily life ~ that believers encounter. 11 6/10

▶ The reference cannot be ~ to inner temptations to sin ~ as in 1:13-14, ~~ 77

Disince such experiences ~ <u>could not</u> be urged ~ as a ground for rejoicing.

→→Let there be ~ sadness instead of laughter, ~ and gloom instead of joy. (NLT)

▶ Furthermore, ~ as we'll see, ~ the word for ~ "meet" ~ brings out ~ 77

DD the externality of the temptation ~ 77

→ → in opposition to the internal temptation ~ arising from our evil desires.

CONTINUING IN VERSE 2b ~ LET'S NOTE THREE OBSERVATIONS.

1^{s†}, ~ WHEN YOU <u>MEET</u> TRIALS OF VARIOUS KINDS.

▶ The Greek verb for ~ meet ~ occurs only twice elsewhere ~ in the New Testament.

▶▶In Lk. 10:30 (CSB), ~ Jesus used it ~ of the man ~ 77

Downo went down ~ from Jerusalem to Jericho ~ and <u>fell into the hands</u> of robbers.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ The verb ~ pictures the man ~ as being surrounded by the thieves ~ on all sides, ~ 77

with no way of escape, ~~ and thus unavoidably ~ falling victim ~ to their assaults.

>It also occurs ~ in Acts 27:41 ~ of the ship that unexpectedly ~ struck a sand bar ~ and ran aground. 17/10

▶▶So the idea ~ that James is getting at here is ~ of suddenly ~ finding ourselves ~ 77

DD surrounded ~ by unanticipated difficulties.

▶▶Trials ~ may be around the next corner.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ We can seldom anticipate them, ~ which may of course be just as well.

 \Rightarrow \Rightarrow At any moment ~ we may meet ~ an old difficulty ~ or ~ a new one.

▶ The unexpected nature of trials ~ makes it all the more necessary ~ 77

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ that we should be prepared beforehand ~ with the knowledge ~ of how to react to them.

 \rightarrow And this ~ is what James is helping us with. \Rightarrow See his pastor's heart?

2nd OBSERVATION FROM VERSE 2b, ~~ TRIALS ARE ~ UNAVOIDABLE.

When ~ not if ~ you meet trials of various kinds.

▶▶1 Pet. 4:12, ~ Beloved, ~ do not be surprised at the fiery trial ~ when it comes upon you to test you, ~ as though something strange ~ were happening to you.

 $\triangleright \triangleright \mathsf{Context}$, ~ persecution, ~ but covers

▶ The implication here ~ is that fiery trials in our lives ~ should be expected, ~ 77

DD not treated ~ as something out of the ordinary. 11 8/10

▶ But we do at times ~ act shocked ~ in a way that suggests ~ 77

>>> that we think something strange ~ or unusual ~ were happening to us, ~ don't we?

▶ We do so ~ because ~ that's what comes ~ naturally to us.

▶ We consider fiery trials ~ to be an abnormal state of life ~ that should be avoided ~ 77

DD if at all possible ~ and at all costs.

►► And if they can't be avoided, ~ then they should be dealt with swiftly ~ 77

>>> so that normal ~ quote/unquote ~ life can resume.

▶ Well, ~ Jesus, ~ Peter, ~ and James have news for us.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Fiery trials ~ <u>are</u> ~ the normal state of life ~ for a Christian.

▶ Therefore, ~ we should never react to them ~ in a way that suggests ~ 77

DD that we think something abnormal were happening to us.

▶ Rather, ~ our reaction should be, ~ 77

DD "Ah, ~ yes, ~ I've been expecting this."

AND THE 3rd OBSERVATION FROM VS. 2b. ~~ TRIALS COME ~ IN DIVERSE FORMS.

► When you meet trials <u>of various kinds</u>. 11 9/10

► The Greek adjective, ~ translated as ~ <u>of various kinds</u> ~ 77

DD does not describe ~ the great number ~ but ~ the <u>diversity</u> ~ or manifold forms ~ of trials.

► Original meaning of the adjective was ~ "many colored, ~ variegated," ~ like Joseph's coat of many colors. →→ Septuagint

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ It was used ~ of stones of many colors ~ or ~ of a piece of cloth ~ 77

→→that had been embroidered with many different colors.

► The adjective, ~ <u>of various kinds</u> ~ thus stresses ~ the great variety ~ of the trials that befall believers.

►►Large, ~ small. ~~ Long, ~ brief.

>> The good new is ~ God's grace ~ is sufficient ~ for <u>all</u> varieties of trials.

▶ Furthermore, ~ this exhortation leaves ~ no trial ~ out.

 $\triangleright \triangleright \mathsf{IOW}$, ~ we cannot pick and choose ~ which trial we will count as great joy.

 $\triangleright \triangleright All$ trials, ~ no matter the intensity or duration, ~ lead us along the road to spiritual maturity.

 \rightarrow And that means, ~ we're becoming more and more ~ like Jesus.

 \rightarrow And that is certainly ~ reason to rejoice ~ in the midst of trials.
