And i.e., \sim counsel for believers in times of oppression/persecution, \sim 5:7-12.

▶▶Reference to the oppressive rich in the previous paragraph, ~ 77

Domay have led James to address believers' proper behavior while undergoing oppression.

▶▶In the immediate context, ~ he is referring ~ to how believers should act ~ 77

Dwhile undergoing oppression by wealthy unbelievers.

▶▶But in general, ~ this present paragraph counsels us ~ 77

Don how to behave when undergoing persecution from a broad-spectrum of unbelievers.

Observe here \sim returning \sim to his theme of endurance in trials \sim that he began with.

▶▶James 1:2-4, ~ NIV.

 \triangleright Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. \sim 77

 \rightarrow Let ~ [i.e., ~ you must let] ~ perseverance finish its work ~ [intended goal = sp. maturity] ~ so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything. 1/12

▶▶Recall the progression of events ~ that James wanted us to see ~ in the following pattern.

>> Trials >> Testing Of Our Faith >> Endurance >> Spiritual Maturity.

→ This ~ is the spiritual reality behind trials. ⇒ View through this grid.

And now, ~ in 5:7-12, ~ James returns to this theme ~ with counsel ~ 77

▶▶on how we are to behave ~ when undergoing persecution by unbelievers. $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow 9 = 4$ parts.

▶▶In Vv. 7-8, ~ James advises believers to exercise patience in view of Christ's return.

 $\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright$ In Vs 9, ~ James counsels us ~ to avoid the natural tendency of the afflicted ~ to unjustly blame those around us.

▶▶In Vv. 10-11, ~ James advises us ~ to look at 2 godly examples ~ of suffering and endurance in the past.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ And i.e., ~ with the purpose of ~ gaining strength in present circumstances.

►► And finally in vs. 12, ~ counsels us ~ to refrain from deceptive oaths and to maintain integrity in speech ~ while undergoing hostility.

<u>In Vv. 7-8, ~ Today, ~ James Advises Believers To Exercise Patience In View Of Christ's Return.</u>

In vs 7a, ~ James calls us to be patient.

▶▶This marks the believers' distinction from the oppressive world.

>>Retaliation is quite common in our day. 2/12

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>>Rom. 12:2a, ~ Do not be conformed to this world.
      \rightarrow \rightarrow I.e., ~ Don't copy the behavior and customs of this world.
   ▷ > > And 1 Pet. 1:14 ~ NIV.
      → As obedient children, do not conform to the evil desires you had when you lived in
      ignorance.
   >> Counter-cultural.
   >> We are citizens of heaven.
   >> And we are to live the way citizens of heaven are to live.
   >>No matter how weird it looks to the world.
▶▶Patience is a virtue that does not readily flourish in the heart of the natural person, ~
does it?
   >>In our human nature, ~ I think impatience ~ is our default position.
► The vb for ~ Be patient ~ used 3x in vv 7-8, ~ 77
   >> stresses the needed attitude as we confront hostile unbelievers.
      \rightarrow IOW, ~ not something optional for us. 3/12
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▶ But we are to be distinct from the world.

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▶▶The verb, ~ used quite literally here, ~ means being ~ "long-tempered" ~ 77
   Das contrasted to being ~ "short-tempered."
   >>It does not call ~ for a passive resignation to one's fate.
   \trianglerightIt calls ~ for an attitude of self-restraint ~ that enables one ~ 77
       → to refrain from hasty retaliation in the face of provocation.
   >>It is the opposite of an easily kindled wrath that readily lashes out in punishment.
   >>And it denotes ~ the thought of being long-tempered or patient ~ 77
       → in relation to people who cause personal distress or suffering.
▶▶In the LXX, ~ it is used quite commonly.
   >>It is mentioned as a commended virtue among people.
      \rightarrow E.g., ~ Prov. 19:11 (NIV), ~ A person's wisdom yields patience; it is to one's glory to
      overlook an offense.
          \rightarrow \rightarrow I.e., ~ they earn respect by overlooking wrongs.
▶▶Also in the LXX, ~ it is used of God's attitude of forbearance toward the sins and faults
of people.
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DDE.g., ~ Ps. 86:15, ~ But you, O Lord, are a God merciful and gracious, slow to anger and

abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness. 4/12

▶▶The NT presents ~ long-tempered ~ as an attribute of God Himself.

 $\triangleright E.g.$, ~ Rom. 2:4, ~ Or do you show contempt for the riches of his kindness, forbearance and <u>patience</u>, not realizing that God's kindness is intended to lead you to repentance?

▶▶And the NT urges its practice upon believers.

 $\triangleright \triangleright E.g.$, ~ 1 Thess. 5:14 (NIV), ~ in the context of relationships between believers.

 \rightarrow And we urge you, brothers and sisters, warn those who are idle and disruptive, encourage the disheartened, help the weak, <u>be patient</u> with everyone.

▶▶And here ~ in the context of oppressive unbelievers, ~ James stresses ~ 77

In vs 7b, ~ James says such patience will be necessary ~ until the Lord's coming.

- ▶▶The Lord here clearly refers to the Lord Jesus Christ in His second advent.
- ►►Jesus is returning.

 \triangleright \vdash He promised us this.

 $\rightarrow \rightarrow$ Jn. 14:2-3 ~ CSB, ~ In my Father's house are many rooms; if not, I would have told you. I am going away to prepare a place for you. ~~ 77

 $\rightarrow \rightarrow$ If I go away and prepare a place for you, I will come again and take you to myself, so that where I am you may be also. 5/12

$\triangleright \triangleright$ And James holds this out for us ~ as a motive for patience.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ All injustice and oppression against us will cease ~ when Jesus returns.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ Of course we should mention that ~ death will do the same for us ~ 7.7
→ → if Jesus does not return in our lifetime.
► The coming" ~ denotes a specific event, ~ a hope well known to James' original readers.
⊳⊳And ~ to us.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ It is ~ our blessed hope, ~ the appearing of the glory of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ.
>>Not wishful thinking.
⊳⊳Rather, ~ it's biblical hope.
→→Biblical hope ~ is the totality ~ 77
→→of what God has promised the believer at the end of this age \sim and \sim in the life to come.
\hookrightarrow It of course includes \sim the promise of Jesus' second coming.
→→And every part of this hope that we have ~ is 100% absolutely guaranteed ~ to be fulfilled. 6/12

►► So Jesus will return.

- ► In the NT epistles, ~ Grk wd for coming, ~ π apou σ ia ς ~ 77
 - $\triangleright \triangleright$ is one of the most frequently used terms for the return of Christ.
- ▶▶The term may have the sense of "coming" ~ as denoting His arrival.
 - >>But ~ its fuller significance ~ centers attention ~ 77
 - → on His presence with His people ~ as the result of His coming.
 - >>Remember Jesus' high-priestly prayer?
 - → Father, I desire that they also, whom you have given me, may be with me where I am, to see my glory that you have given me because you loved me before the foundation of the world.
 - >> And of the new earth John writes, ~ 77
 - → Look, God's home is now among his people! He will live with them, and they will be his people. God himself will be with them (NLT).
 - >> So when we read about Jesus' second coming, ~ don't just think about his arrival.
 - $\rightarrow \rightarrow It$ is the first stage of his presence with us for eternity.

Aware of how hard it is to be patient, ~ James undergirds his counsel with an illustration.

▶▶And ~ repeats his exhortation.

 \triangleright 7c-8a, ~ ^{7c} See how the farmer waits for the precious fruit of the earth, being patient about it, until it receives the early and the late rains. ^{8a} You also, be patient. 7/12

▶▶Christians need to exhibit the patience of the farmer ~ as we wait for the Lord's coming. >> We must be ~ like the wise and knowledgeable farmers ~ who must wait for the lifegiving rains for their crops. $\triangleright \triangleright I.e.$, ~ we must live in anticipation of our Lord's coming ~ 77 → and not become upset at adverse circumstances during the waiting. ▶▶However, ~ farmers hardly remain idle between the planting and the harvesting. >> But rather, ~ they worked hard ~ 77 →in weeding, hoeing, fertilizing, and doing whatever they can ~ to bring their crops to full fruition. >>Likewise, ~ we are not to remain idle while we wait for Jesus to return. → We must engage in kingdom work, ~ 77 → contributing all that we can ~ to the outworking of God's purposes in this world. ▶Furthermore, ~ waiting for Jesus' 2nd coming ~ is to have a practical impact ~ on how we live. $\triangleright \triangleright$ In his 2nd epistle, ~ Peter notes ~ that while we wait for the Day of the Lord and the new heaven and earth, ~ 77 → we must make every effort ~ to be found living peaceful lives ~ 77 \rightarrow that are pure and blameless in Jesus' sight (2 Pet. 3). 8/12

And while we wait for our Savior to return, ~ we must establish our hearts, ~ vs 8b.
►►Translated: ~~ Stand firm. ⇒⇒ Strengthen your hearts.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ To strengthen or establish one's heart is ~ to stand firm in the faith ~ 77
→ →and not to give in to doubt.
►►Asaph.
>>Wavered and began to doubt.
▶▶In the context of affliction, ~ 77
riangle James is calling us not to waver in the faith and not be overcome by doubt.
▶▶Suffering persecution, ~ whether major or minor, ~ is a given for Christians.
>>Jesus did not sugar coat it for us.
→→If they persecuted me, they will also persecute you.
$\triangleright \triangleright$ Luke tells us in Acts ~ that Paul & Barnabas were ~ 77
\Rightarrow strengthening the souls of the disciples, encouraging them to continue in the faith, and saying that through many tribulations we must enter the kingdom of God.
\triangleright And Peter tells us \sim Dear friends, don't be surprised when the fiery ordeal comes among you to test you as if something unusual were happening to you (CSB). 9/12

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\blacktriangleright \blacktriangleright And in the midst of persecution, \sim James calls us to \sim stand firm in the faith, \sim 77
     Datake courage, ~ don't doubt, ~ don't quit following Jesus.
In vs 8c, ~ James points ~ to what can help us stand firm in the faith and not give in to doubt.
 ▶▶For the coming of the Lord is at hand.
 ▶▶When the NT speaks of the nearness of the Lord's return, ~ it does not mean ~ 77
     Dhat it <u>has</u> to take place within a short period of time.
     \triangleright What is meant ~ is twofold.
        \rightarrow \rightarrow 1^{st}, ~ that Christ's 2^{nd} coming ~ is the very next event in God's timetable of
        redemption.
        \rightarrow And 2<sup>nd</sup>, ~ that it could take place ~ within a short period of time.
            → Every generation of believers lives ~ in the eager expectancy of that return.
  ▶▶The confident expectation of Jesus' return ~ will undergird the faint heart ~ and make it
 strong.
     >>In order ~ not to waver and doubt while undergoing adverse circumstances, ~~ 77
         → we must raise our gaze heavenward.
 ▶▶Psalmists reflected this attitude. 10/12
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\triangleright \triangleright Ps. 25:15, My eyes are ever toward the Lord, for he will pluck my feet out of the net.
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>> And Ps. 123:1, To you I lift up my eyes, O you who are enthroned in the heavens!

►► Also, ~ the author of Heb. tells us, ~ Heb. 1b-2a, ~ 77

 \triangleright Let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith.

- ▶▶For Christians, ~~ persecution, trouble, and affliction ~ are not the end.
- ▶ Beyond these, ~ there lies eternal glory.

 \triangleright And in the sure, ~ certain, ~ and real hope of that glory, ~ 77

- → Christians can endure anything that this world throws at us.
- ▶▶Jesus provides an example for us.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Heb. 12:2b tells us that \sim for the joy that was set before him, \sim 77

 \rightarrow Jesus endured the cross, \sim despising the shame, \sim and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God.

 $\triangleright \triangleright \mathsf{Continuing}$ & expanding on Steve's theme from children's msg & C. S. msg.

 $\triangleright \triangleright$ Jesus endured a cross, \sim the most cruel and disgraceful of deaths, \sim having despised the shame of it.

 \rightarrow I.e., ~ not allowing its shame to dissuade Him or cause Him to waver. 11/12

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\triangleright He did it ~ for the joy that was set before him.
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- → He looked past the cross ~ to His victory over sin and death, ~ 77
 - \rightarrow \rightarrow to providing salvation for us, \sim and \sim to his glorification, inheritance, and reign.
- >> And still speaking of Jesus, ~ the author of Hebrews exhorts us in vs. 3 to ~ 77
 - \rightarrow Consider him who endured from sinners such hostility against himself, \sim so that you may not grow weary or fainthearted.
- ▶▶It seems to be one of the basic facts of life ~ 77
 - Dhat a person can endure anything so long as they have something to look forward to.
 - \rightarrow And we, ~ my . . . , ~ have more to look forward to than anybody. 12/12
